Begin Survey For Paving Of Local Streets

Engineers moved in this week to begin a preliminary survey for the new street paving scheduled for Robert Lee.

Contract for engineering on the project was let to Parkhill, Smith & Cooper, consulting engineering firm of Lubbock. The contract signed by the Coke County Commissioners Court was recommended by County Judge W. W. Thetford and Fern Havins, Commissioner in Precinct 1.

They will perform all the engineering services required in connection with the proposed street and roadway improvements within the City of Robert Lee and adjoining the city. They will establish grades, plan drainage and prepare plans and specifications for contractors to bid on. They will also supervise construction and their fee will be 4.05 per cent of the cost of the project.

S. C. Cooper represented his firm in signing with the county. He was the engineer when Mountain Creek Dam was built by the FCRA here a few years ago.

A bond issue of \$150,000 was voted by Precinct 1 for the paving project. After the bonds were defeated in April by a close vote, a second election was called for June 27 when the bonds carried by a vote of 309 to 147. The result was 15 more votes than the required 2 to 1 majority.

The bonds have been purchased by Municipal Securities Corp., represented by Bob L. Davis, and the interest rate ranges from 3 3/4 to 3 1/2 per cent. Interest rates went up after Mr. Davis made his first commitment before the April election, but he gave Coke County the benefit of the same lower rate.

The bonds are to be paid off over a period of ten years and a levy for that purpose will be added to the 1959 taxes.

74 Coke Residents Collect \$198,067 For 1958 Incentive Wool Payments

Wool incentive payments for 1958 were mailed July 10 to Coke County sheep men. Checks numbering 74 and amounting to a total of \$198,067.22 were handled through Coke County ASC office.

In addition there were 117 checks for unshorn lamb payments which amounted to \$23,463.21.

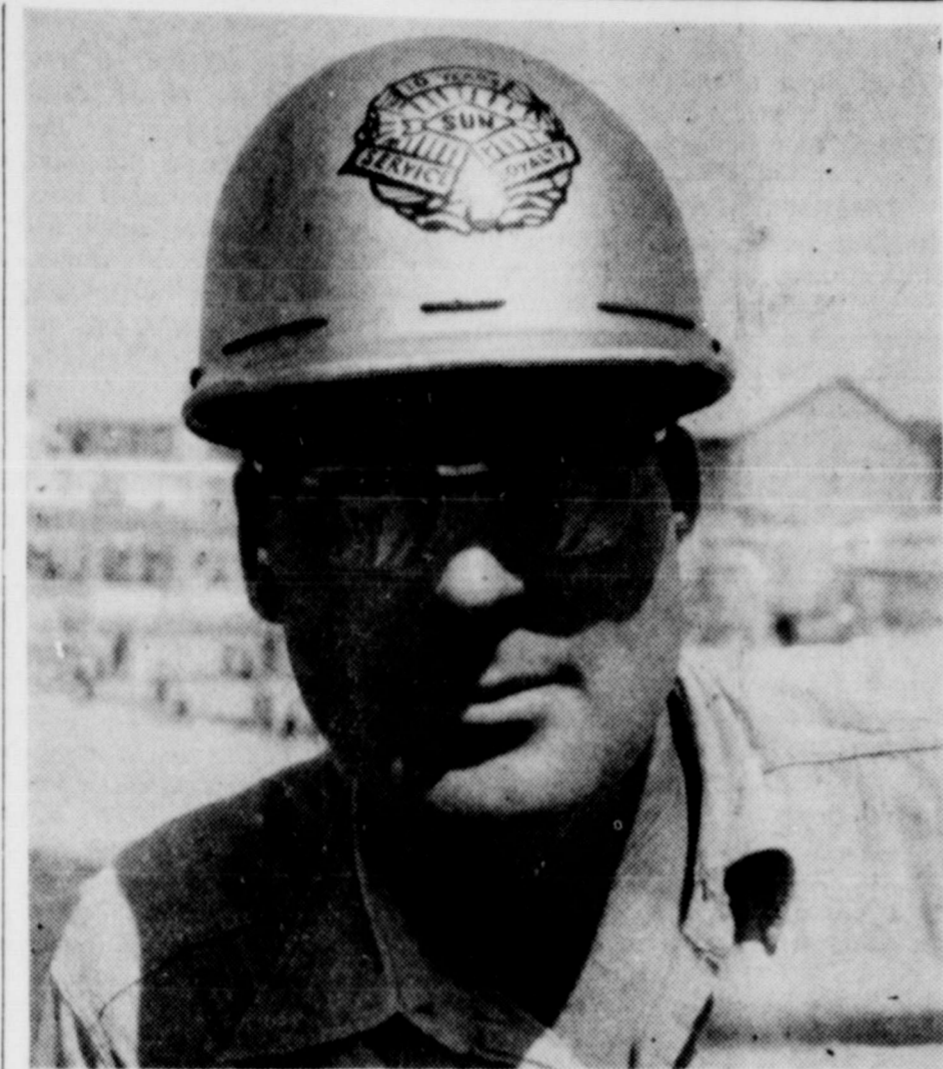
About one-half the wool payments ranged from \$100 to less than \$1,000. There were 85 in this group and the total was \$35,925.13.

Forty-three growers got less than \$100 for a total of only \$1,631.99.

Payments from \$1,000 to just under \$3,000 went to 38 persons for a total of \$59,029.45. More than half the money went to 18 wool growers who claimed \$101,480.65.

Largest check was for \$17,217.17. This is not the Coke County total since several big sheep raisers filed claims in other counties.

Payment on unshorn lambs resulted in 69 persons receiving less than \$100 each, the total being

Golf Course To Be Discussed Here Thursday

Initial step toward the formation of a Coke County golf course has been taken by the Robert Lee Board of Community Development.

Because of increased interest in the matter a preliminary meeting has been called for Thursday night of this week at the court house. Time is 8 p. m.

The BCD has invited the following persons to be present: Glenn Hodge, Truman Hines, Paul Gilbert, Hale Kincaid and John Conley of Silver; Douglas Snead, Luther McCutchen, Bob Wilson, Horace Griggs and Howard Brock of Bronte; Bill Allen, Cumbie Ivey, Jr., Fern Havins, W. W. Thetford, Lew Heuvel and Bill Callaway of Robert Lee.

All other persons interested in golf are invited to attend and take part in the preliminary discussions.

A possible site for a golf course is the 200-acre tract a mile east of town which is owned by the

City of Robert Lee. Experts in recent years have gone over the site and announced it would provide an excellent 9-hole layout.

Water would be available from two lakes on the property and a water well which formerly supplied the city.

Mayor W. D. McAdams reported the city and county commissioners were about to come to an agreement on purchasing a new fire siren since the old one cannot be repaired. Only siren now in use is mounted on the fire truck.

McAdams indicated the city was ready and willing to spray city streets and alleys to combat mosquitoes. The city owns fogging equipment and a supply of spray material. BCD members expressed opinions that a spraying program should be carried out in the near future.

Model Airplane Shop Destroyed At S. Jay Home

Fire of unknown origin was discovered at 5 a. m. Tuesday at the Sam Jay home in the south part of town. Mr. Jay was awakened as he slept in an adjoining room and heard flames crackling in a 16 x 26 foot addition.

He alerted his wife and called to his son, Robert Lewis, who resides next door. Mr. Jay hurried to the city hall and drove the fire truck to his home, and returned to get the hose truck.

Mr. Jay is the fire chief. Other firemen arrived soon and extinguished the flames, but not until the addition had been badly burned and its contents entirely destroyed.

The loss on the building was covered by insurance and there was some insurance on the contents.

The room was used as headquarters of the Model Airplane club which has been supervised by Mrs. Jay. The club has 22 members and used the headquarters as a work shop.

A large quantity of material and property owned by the various members was destroyed.

Some club members were in the workshop late Monday night. Mr. Jay said the fire seemed to have started in an upholstered sofa in one corner of the room.

Silver Man Dies In Gas Explosion

One man was killed and two more injured, one critically, in a butane explosion and fire Saturday noon at Sun Oil Company's Jameson natural gasoline plant loading rack at Silver.

Dead is C. E. Butcher, 42, who received third degree burns over his entire body and succumbed at 5:30 p. m. in a San Angelo hospital.

Still in serious condition, but expected to recover, is Willie James Wenetschlaser, 32, of Ballinger whose truck was being loaded with liquid petroleum gas when the explosion occurred.

Less seriously hurt was Tom Allen, 37, Sun employee in charge of the loading rack. He received minor burns and shock.

The fire occurred a few minutes before 1:00 p. m. Without warning a blaze was touched off, causing a considerable concussion but no loud noise. Flames shot many feet in the air as the vapor fumes ignited.

Sun employees working nearby hurried to the scene and by closing a number of emergency valves the entire plant was shut down within a few minutes.

Mr. Butcher was near the edge of the fire when he was rescued and Wenetschlaser was also dragged from the flames. They were brought to Coke County Memorial Hospital in Robert Lee by Richard Constant and Charles Sommers, summer roustabouts at the plant.

After undergoing treatment a couple of hours the men were removed to San Angelo hospitals in Cliff ambulances. Butcher was taken to Shannon and Wenetschlaser to St. John's. Allen was taken to the hospital in Colorado City where he resides.

Mr. Butcher was in charge of plant operations on the day shift.

RETURNS TO MEXICO

Jenaro Garcia, young national from Ciudad Acuna, is back home due to the generosity of a number of Robert Lee folks. The young man, who was up this way without proper papers, became ill the previous week and was admitted to Coke County Hospital. Nature of his illness was not determined, but his condition seemed serious. His mother heard of his illness and with her daughter drove to Robert Lee in a taxicab to see Garcia. They made arrangements for taking him home, Sam Williams making the trip Sunday in the Cliff ambulance. Donations toward covering the expense included: Francisco Alabos \$2, Luterio Lara \$2, V. C. A well known stock farmer of the Sylvester community, Mr. Hitt died Friday night after an illness of some time. His wife was the former Bernice Coalson, who was a sister of the father of Frank and Ray.

in his capacity of distillation operator. He had been promoted to this position June 16. Others on duty were Jack Denman, John Hollis and Eddie Byrd. Jim Post was on duty in the maintenance department as were Constant and Sommers, and a few other maintenance men were at work also.

Supt. Ross Cone arrived immediately from his home in Tubbs Camp and directed fire fighting operations. With the valves shutting off the flow of gas, the fire was permitted to burn itself out. Water was used to cool off the surrounding area.

The large transport truck with a capacity of more than 5,000 gallons burned for a couple of hours and was a total loss estimated at \$20,000. The truck was owned by Ballinger Butane Co. No water was forced onto the truck and its contents burned as the gas poured from popoff valves. The truck was later pulled outside the plant enclosure by use of a winch truck.

This was the first major explosion experienced since the plant went into operation ten years ago. A sign board in front of the plant office carried the information that 728 days had passed without a loss of work accident.

A small building and all equipment connected with the loading rack was destroyed. It is being rebuilt rapidly and Mr. Cone said it might be in operation by the middle of this week.

Area Supt. John Shimer of Colorado City and Sun officials from Dallas came to Silver to investigate the accident. Cause of the explosion is not known. The company pursues a rigid safety program and has made a good record in looking after the safety and welfare of its employees.

Engines were started up within a couple of hours at the compressor plant and the business of processing natural gas into butane and propane was continued. Considerable storage space was available until trucks can be loaded again.

Much of the product from Jameson plant is hauled away in transport trucks which come in from a considerable area. Sun also loads tank cars at a Santa Fe spur two miles north of Silver.

Eddie Roy is the son of Mr. and Mrs. George Braswell of Bronte. His wife is the former Carolyn Childress, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Childress of Robert Lee. They have a daughter, Ginger, 10 months old.

The family is living in Bronte until they make arrangements for a residence in Sterling City.

Edward Cumbie of Bronte, district Farm Bureau representative, will be master of ceremonies for the Coke County contest. Out of town judges will select the winner, and prizes will be awarded in all three divisions.

Services Held Tuesday For C. E. Butcher; 42

Services for C. E. Butcher, 42, victim of burns received in a gasoline plant explosion at Silver Saturday, were conducted at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday at the Silver Methodist Church. Officiating was the pastor, the Rev. Charles Simpson. Arrangements and burial in Robert Lee cemetery were under direction of Clift Funeral Home. Officers and members of Hayrick Lodge No. 696 A. F. & A. M. attended in a body and the Masonic ritual was performed at the cemetery. Pallbearers were Hale Kincaid, Marshall Jennings and Lee Weigel of Silver and G. C. Allen, C. S. Brown and H. S. Lewis Jr. of Robert Lee.

Charles Elman Butcher was born March 18, 1917, at Hall Summit, Red River Parish, La. He was the son of Thomas Clinton and Bertha M. Butcher. He attended public school in his home community and married Miss Dorothea Bode on Sept. 22, 1940.

Mr. Butcher was employed for some time in refinery work in Louisiana before he accepted a position with Sun Oil Co. in June, 1949. He and his family moved to Silver and he was assigned as an engine operator at the company's new Jameson gasoline plant. He was working with H. W. (Blackie) Keener on the plant's first morning tour July 6, 1949. Harvey Evinger was superintendent the first few years of the plant's operation.

Mr. Butcher proved himself a valuable employee and earned steady advancement. When a vacancy occurred recently by the transfer of A. T. Holt, he was promoted to distillation operator.

This is an important position and involves responsibility of the plant's operation. He was on duty when an explosion occurred at the truck loading rack and he received burns which caused his death a few hours later.

Surviving are his wife, a daughter, Bonnie, who is the wife of Paul Tinkler, and two sons, Norman and Alvin. Also his mother, Mrs. Bertha Butcher, and two sisters, Mrs. Harry G. Mosley and Mrs. Herbert O'Neal, all of Alexandria, La., and a brother, Kenneth Butcher, of St. Louis, Mo.

Mr. Butcher was a member of the Methodist Church and was active in community affairs. He had served as local chairman of the March of Dimes. He became a member of the Masonic Lodge in Robert Lee a few years ago and had been re-elected as its treasurer.

He put in many hours recently helping other members re-decorate and improve the lodge hall.

Charlie Butcher was a good man, friendly and honest and loved his family and his fellowmen. His passing is a shock to the entire community.

His brother, Alvin Butcher, lost his life in a fire in February, 1951. In attempting to save his family when their home burned, he and his wife both received burns from which they died. Their small son, Alvin, was saved and has since lived with his uncle's family at Silver where he was adopted as a son.

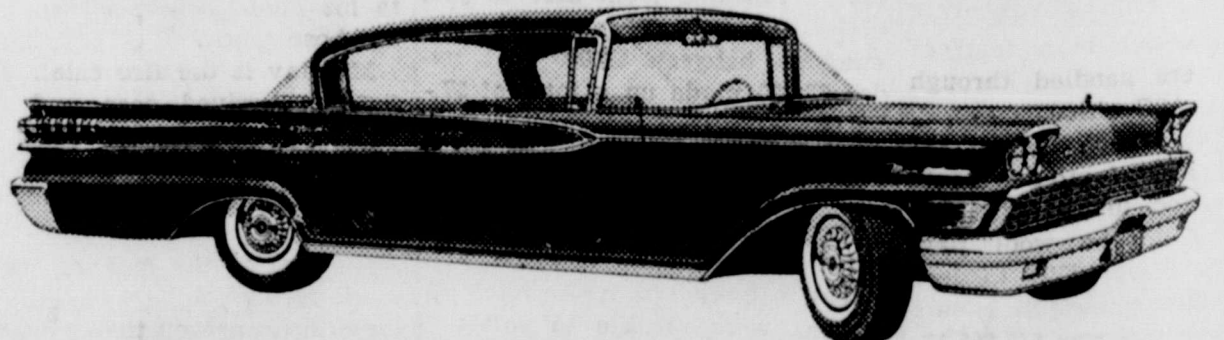

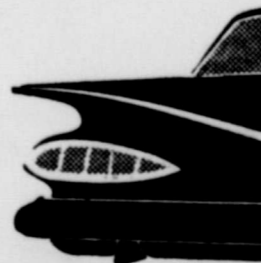

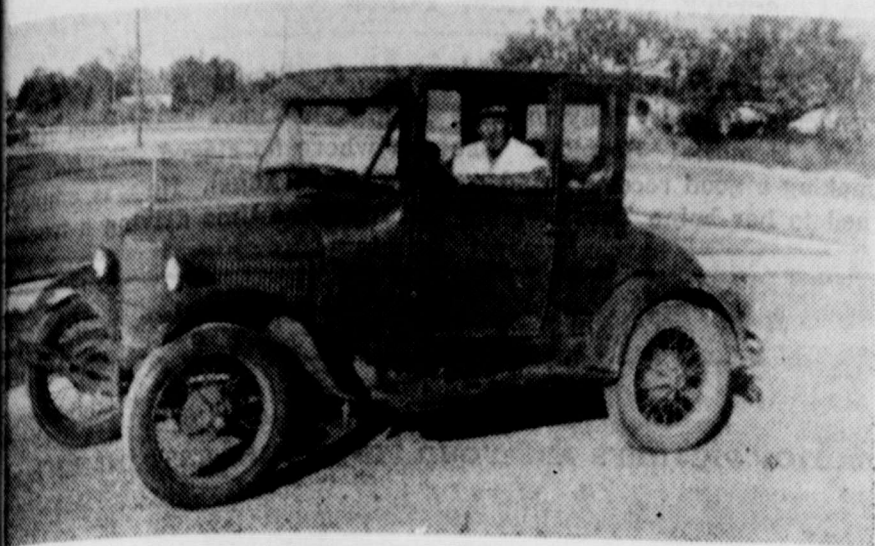
