Contract Let to Improve 277 South of Bronte

A contract for 13.8 miles of construction on U. S. Highway 277 in Coke County has been awarded to an Austin firm, it was announced this week by the State Highway Commission.

Collins Construction Company of Dallas submitted the low bid of \$2,412 on the project. Construction of grading, structures, flexible base and asphaltic concrete pavement, from Main Street in Bronte to Tom Green County line is expected to take 300 working days, according to J. A. Snell, District Highway Engineer at San Angelo.

C. C. Stroud, Resident Engineer at San Angelo, will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction. Eighty feet of way required for straightening and widening the highway has been fenced, cost of additional land being paid for by the county and state.

Commissioner Howard Brock secured the right of way from owners in Precinct 2 which runs to the river, while from the river on south to the county line lies in Precinct 4 and was handled by Commissioner Claude Ditmore.

Very little re-location will be made on the new highway, except for straightening and reducing sharp curves. The Colorado River Bridge is to be widened.

The new contract is a continuation of rebuilding Highway 277 through Coke County. A 10-mile stretch from Bronte to the Abilene route intersection was completed the past year.

Texans Launch Campaign For Lyndon Johnson

Austin—It is more than a year until the day when the next President of the United States will be elected, but in Texas, the race is on.

From now until Nov. 8, 1960, may well be a year of the most feverish political activity the state ever has known.

House Speaker Sam Rayburn fired the starting gun by calling for an all-out campaign to win the Democratic presidential nomination for U. S. Sen. Lyndon Johnson. Rayburn called for Johnson-for-President organizations in every county in Texas.

A campaign kick-off by the man who has often been called "Mr. Democrat" gave enormous impetus to the activities of Johnson supporters. Pro-Johnson clubs, rallies and editorials blossomed over the state. Gov. Price Daniel and the state executive committee had previously pledged support.

Speaker Rayburn's sponsorship also makes exceedingly difficult the position of Texas' liberal wing Democrats who have been cool toward the senator since the convention hassles of 1956.

In 1952, Rayburn championed the liberals in their battle against a conservative party leadership working for Eisenhower. But the same group, now the Democrats of Texas Club members, will have to fly in the face of their old friend, Rayburn, if they decide on open opposition to Senator Johnson this year.

Some DOTers have pledged Johnson support. But Mrs. R. D. Randolph, leader, refused to commit herself on the grounds the senator has not declared himself a candidate.

Candidate or not, Senator Johnson is whizzing around Texas for personal appearances, scheduled at the rate of more than one a day in the months ahead.

Elementary Grades Join Library Club

Kinsey gained 4 over the right side and on the next play a fumble was recovered by the Cardinals on the Steer 49.

Vernon made two good gains and a 1st on the 38. A 15-yard penalty on Robert Lee made it a 1st on the 24. Three plays later an end run carried to the 11 for a 1st down. The line plays netted 8 yards and a pass attempt was incomplete, with Robert Lee taking possession on their 3-yard line.

Blankenship made 4 and a 5-yard penalty was called on Hermleigh. Walker carried to the 17 for a 1st down. Kinsey added 6 yards on the right side and Blankenship added 2 thru center. He plunged for another 8 yards but lost control of the ball and Hermleigh recovered on the Steer 30.

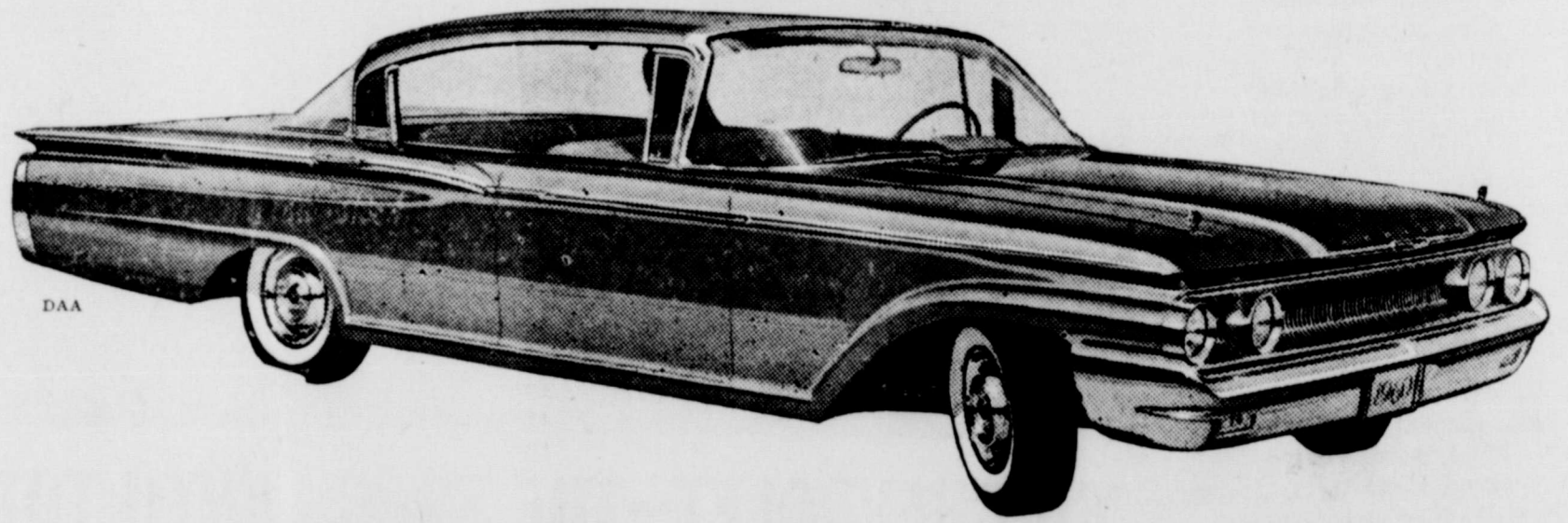

COKE SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Present Supervisors -

C. N. Webb, Chairman; W. E. Burns, Vice Chairman; D. K. Glenn, Secretary and Treasurer; Bryan Yarbrough and Robert Walker.

New cooperators with the Coke Soil Conservation District include E. O. Nicholas and M. C. Hendry. Hendry has a place west of Blackwell and Nicholas is west of Fort Chadbourne. Conservation plans with a complete program of soil and water conservation measures have been developed on their places with the assistance of local Soil Conservation Service technicians.

Ben L. Keyes has started into the Great Plains Conservation Program with the construction of a 20' x 5' concrete storage tank and ½ mile of pipeline for stock water, on his place southwest of Robert Lee.

Olin Blanks is receiving assistance from the Great Plains Conservation Program on a 5300 cubic yard stockpond on his ranch in the northwest part of Coke County.

Foster S. Price has completed most of the practices that he planned to apply under the Great Plains Conservation Program for the 1959 program year. Practices installed include three earthen stockponds, two 20x5' concrete storage tanks and a pipeline for livestock water. In addition to this Price has pushed approximately 600 acres of cedar and has applied chemical pear control on approximately 900 acres.

Now is the time for ranchers and stockmen to take a good look at the grass that is left on the ground. We will grow little more, if any, so what you have will be all there is until next spring. A cover is essential to protect the soil and plant crowns during the winter and to make best use of spring rains. Some adjustment of livestock numbers to keep a cover on the ground will pay dividends of more grass next spring.
