TAX PAYMENTS ARE MORE THAN HALF MILLION

Paul Good's tax collecting office took in a big slug of money the past few weeks. Collection of 19-59 taxes in October amounted to \$545,000.

Deputy O. B. Jacobs estimated up a 36-6 win over Loraine. it was nearly 90% of the total '59 taxes levied of \$636,800. Property owners who paid before Oct. 31 received a 3% discount.

Included in the amount collected was taxes for the state and common school districts, but the largest portion was for county funds. Two big oil companies, Humble and Sun, paid almost onehalf of the sum collected.

A number of taxpayers also bought poll tax receipts while paying property taxes. Poll tax receipts isued to date are 218.
