Got your boat numbers yet? Under the new 1959 Legislature, all oat owners, with few exceptions, eadline was March 1 of this

That date has passed, but if you re among those
Numbers must be obtained from Ne State Highway Department Austin. Application forms may marine supplies, or county tax

## Get License Before Fishing

AUSTIN - A few days of sun shine has doubled the number of fishermen on the lakes and streams of Texas, according to the director of law enforcemmis-
of the Game and Fish Comm of the
sion.
"Wardens checking these fishermen find that most of them have their licenses," the director said. "A few, however, have put of buying their fishing licenses and it is necessary to charge them with violation.'
Fishing license are required of all persons, except those under 16 or over 65 years, fishing with rod and reel in any Texas waters. Non-residents pay the same fee for their license as Texans$\$ 2.15$ - which permits fishing in either fresh or salt water. "Visitors to Texas are apprecia tive of this license," the director said. "Most states charge a much higher price for non-resident fishing privileges. As a result of our minimum priced license, we get many fishing visitors in the state." Fishing license can be bought from most sporting goods stores, the county clerks and game and
fish commission offices in the major Texas cities.
