Census Takers Are Coming Your Way

Census enumerators began their house to house canvass last Friday, April 1. Local census takers made a good start on the first day but were held up Saturday by rain.

A field supervisor from the district office conferred with Mrs. Dale Brown and Mrs. Marvin Corley here for a short period Monday afternoon. Both state they obtained valuable information concerning problems which they had not been able to solve.

Mrs. Brown, whose territory includes the incorporated town of Robert Lee, works from a map of the city furnished by the census bureau. She was instructed to start with Block 1 which includes the bank and postoffice, and did not find anyone living in that block.

She continued to canvass the blocks in sequence up to No. 17. Now she is canvassing streets running north and south. She finished Austin Avenue (main street) and Wednesday was working Chadbourne, next street to the west.

Mrs. Brown feels that she is making good progress and hopes to finish her work by April 17.

Mrs. Corley, who resides in Bronte, has all the west part of the county outside Robert Lee. Her first calls were families east of town, just outside the city limits. Later she went south on Highway 208 to the county line and also follows the school bus route through Valley View.

She has canvassed persons living along the Water Valley Highway and Wildcat and the Divide. Wednesday she started west on Highway 158 and will work toward Silver and back to Sanco and Graham

Valley.

Mrs. Corley drove more than 100 miles Tuesday to count people out toward Water Valley. She estimates she has covered a third of her territory. She wishes folks who leave home for the day would place their report forms in the door so she won't have to make a return call.

IVEY HOME GOING UP

Progress is being made on the new residence being built for Cumbie Ivey Jr. and family. The structure has been enclosed and brick work will get underway this week. Site of the new residence is the former American Legion property near the intersection of Highways 158 and 208 in the northwest part of Robert Lee. A Plainview contractor is in charge of the project.

Saturday Rain Brought Inch Moisture Here

Robert Lee received an inch of rain Saturday, while other sections of Coke County benefited also of in lesser amounts.

More than an inch of moisture was reported at Hayrick and nearly an inch east of Silver. More than a half inch fell southwest of town, but the showers were less to the south in the Valley View area.

Saturday's rainfall came as a surprise and had not been forecast by weather observers. Moisture began falling here at 6 a. m. and continued steadily until noon.

Pastures and grain fields will get a big boost.

Earl King, 29, Meets Death In Fall From Pole

Robert Lee kinfolks and friends were grieved last week to learn of the untimely death of Earl King, 29, at his home near Stanley, New Mex.

His death occurred Tuesday afternoon, March 29, when he fell from a power line pole in his yard. His head struck a nearby truck, causing almost instant death.

He was a son of the late George King, who died two years ago, and Carrie Plumlee King.

James Earl King was born near Robert Lee on April 16, 1930, and would have been 30 years of age this month. His parents moved to New Mexico a number of years ago but Earl and his family visited here often with relatives and old friends.

He is survived by his wife and three children, Rocky, 6, Sue, 4, and Judy, 6 months old. Also his mother, his brother Alvin, and a sister, Mrs. Beth Brice of Sweetwater.

Funeral services were conducted Friday in the school gym at Stanley, the rites being largely attended by residents of the Stanley and Moriarty communities. Burial was in the Stanley cemetery.

Local kinfolks attending the funeral were Mrs. Lillie Gaines, Mrs. Vela Plumlee, Mr. and Mrs. Jessie Eads. Also Mrs. David Key, Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Middleton of San Angelo and Jessie Ray Gaines of Lubbock.

Mrs. Gaines remained at Stanley for a couple of weeks, while the others returned home the end of the week.

School Elections

Two new school board members were elected at Robert Lee and Silver and one at Bronte in the annual school trustee elections held Saturday.

Named to the school board in the Robert Lee district were Royce Smith and J. Q. Counts, while Charles J. Green and Ernest Clendennen will be seated as new trustees at Silver. Bob Wilson is the new member of the Bronte school board.

VOTE IN ROBERT LEE

A total of 163 ballots were cast in the Robert Lee independent district. Royce Smith was high man with 138 votes and J. Q. Counts was elected with 95 votes. Finnell Smith, running for re-election after serving three years, polled 89 votes.

Royce Smith and Counts will succeed Fagan Parker, who was not a candidate, and Finnell Smith. They will be seated at the regular school board meeting Thursday night.

Two other trustees recently appointed to the Robert Lee school board, are Glenn Waldrop and T. M. Wylie Jr. They were named to vacancies when Will Percifull and J. F. McCabe Jr. resigned to run for county offices.

The matter of hiring a new superintendent and a coach will come before the board this week,

Bounty Paid on 961 Rattlers During March

Coke County paid a 50c cash bounty for each of 961 rattlesnakes killed during March. Rattles are brought to the county clerk's office where payments amounted to \$480.50.

January bounties numbered 954 and February 980, making a total of 2,985 for the first three months of the year. Bounty payments for the period amounted to \$1,447.50.

C. E. Calder of Robert Lee continued his snake hunting activities and accounted for 705 rattlers last month. One day he brought in 244 sets of rattles and at another time he presented 245 to claim payment.

Mack Eubanks of Bronte was paid for killing 79 snakes and J. P. Arrott of Tennyson collected a bounty on 37. Bunyan Millican of Silver turned in 38 rattles and Richard Ramsey of Silver 27.

Snake hunting was best during the winter months when routed from their dens by gasoline fumes. With arrival of warm weather the rattlers are out in the open now and there will be no more big catches.

Mayor W. D. McAdams and Commissioners Waymon Robertson and Curtis Walker were re-elected by overwhelming majorities in Tuesday's city election.

In the mayor's race McAdams defeated Bob Bagwell 221 to 58. Robertson polled 203 votes and Walker 217. They were opposed by E. C. Davis who got 65 votes and Geo. E. Lomas with 72.

With 289 ballots being cast, the vote was by far the heaviest in history for a Robert Lee city election. Only 27 persons voted two years ago and 130 ballots were cast in 1956.

Comprising the election board were Mrs. F. C. Clark, Mrs. W. T. Roach and Miss Ollie Green. They were kept busy during the day and were able to report the outcome soon after the polls closed at 7 p. m.

Since it was the regular meeting night, the City Commission held a session Tuesday night to canvass the vote and take up other matters of business. City Secretary Jimmy M. Mathis and Water Supt. Cecil Mayfield were both reappointed.

Robertson and Walker were elected city commissioners in 1956 when they defeated Delmir Sheppard and Buster Farris. They were re-elected two years ago without opposition.

McAdams served as a commissioner a few years ago and was defeated for mayor by Cumbie Ivey Jr. in 1956. He came back in 1958 and was elected mayor without having an opponent.

Robert Lee city officials are elected for twoyear terms.

Mayor McAdams and Commissioners Robertson and Walker issued the following statement:

"We appreciate the splendid vote given us in Monday's election, and feel that a big majority of the people have endorsed our record in handling the city's business."

"It has been a pleasure to work for and with you, and we earnestly solicit your continued cooperation during the next two years."

"Robert Lee is a small city with a big future, and it has a fine citizenship. We will continue to work with you folks and help make it even a better and more attractive and prosperous place in which to live."

ELECTION AT BRONTE

Mayor J. A. Stephenson was re-elected and two councilmen defeated in a light turnout of 99 votes at Bronte Monday.

Elected to twoyear council terms were Cecil Kemp, Matthew Caperton and Joe McCutchen.

In the mayor's race, Stephenson, unopposed following the withdrawal of Dr. John R. Harris, received 70 votes.

Kemp led the council election with 77 votes, while Matthew Caperton received 48 and McCutchen 47. Defeated were incumbents C. E. Bruton, 45 and H. A. Springer, 39, and Charlie Boecking 33.

COKE SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Present Supervisors —

C. N. Webb, Chairman; W. E. Burns, Vice Chairman; D. K. Glenn, Secretary and Treasurer; Bryan Yarbrough and Robert Walker.

The Coke Soil Conservation District supervisors have approved conservation plans on the following district cooperators: Dawson Coleman, Miles; D. P. Walling, Bronte; C. N. Webb, Jr., Bronte; J. J. S. Smith, Sweetwater; Bernard Petty, Sterling City.

Smith plans pear control by hand grubbing or chemical spraying and mesquite control by root plowing. He plans to seed the root-plowed area to a mixture of such grasses as sideoats grama, buffalo grass and plains bristlegrass. He plans to reset his pasture following grass seeding in order to allow the grass roots to become developed. This will make a stronger grass plant and result in more forage for grazing later. His place is located about 8 miles southwest of Bronte.

Coleman plans to construct terraces as part of his conservation plan.

Earl Davidson has completed a 5,488 cu. yd. pit-type stock

pond on his place south of Robert Lee. This pond was constructed to help him get more even distribution of grazing, with assistance through the Great Plains Conservation program.

L. T. Youngblood has completed 1.8 miles of level terraces on his place north of Bronte. He also completed about 960 feet of earthen diversions to protect the field from excess run off water.

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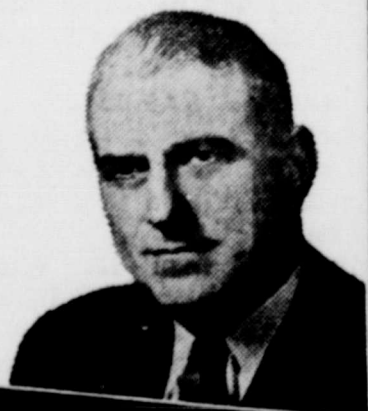
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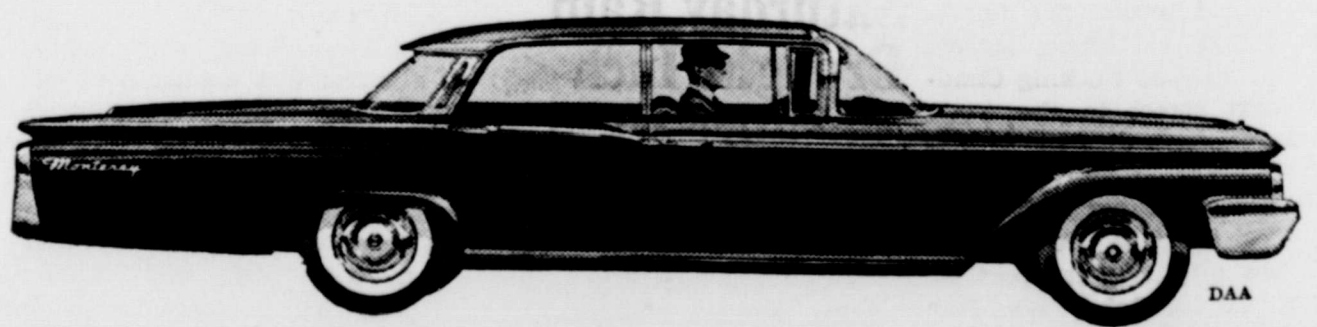

Boat Owners Required To Have License

Got your boat numbers yet? Under the new water safety act passed by the 1959 Legislature, all boat owners, with few exceptions, are required to number their boats. Deadline was March 1 of this year.

That date has passed, but if you are among those who forgot, you're in the majority.

Numbers must be obtained from the State Highway Department in Austin. Application forms may be secured from almost any dealer in marine supplies, or county tax offices.

All the state wants is the name and address of the owner of the boat, its serial number, make, model (year built) and length; its construction (wood, plastic, etc.) whether it's an inboard or outboard, diesel or gasoline powered, and for what purpose it is being used (business or pleasure).

Application must be notarized, then forwarded to the Texas Highway Department (40th and Jackson) in Austin — along with a money order or cashier's check covering the fee.

Fees are based on the length of the boat. For those under sixteen feet the fee is \$1; 16 to 26 feet, but not including 26 feet, \$5; 26 to 40 feet, \$10; 40 feet and over \$12.50.

License is good for three years. Much beefing is heard over the instructions to pay by money order or cashier's check. This particularly from those who must pay only the \$1 fee. Result is that most boat owners are sending in a check or cash and such payment is being accepted.

Licensing plan is similar to that applied to your car, except that the state doesn't provide the numbers — or charge as much — and the number is permanently assigned.

When you sell your boat, or it is destroyed, or abandoned, you must notify the Highway Department, and surrender your certificate number. Each new owner then must send in \$1 for renewal of application. Purchaser of the boat is given a reasonable time to make application for a transfer of number.

This feature of the act will help greatly in returning stolen boats to their rightful owners. Ownership records are public records. All you need is the boat's number to determine its owner's name. Any time you want the information the Highway Department is required by the act to supply it. For this reason, boat owners must notify the Highway Department of any change of address from that filed with the application.

Your certificate must be kept on your person or on your boat. If you lose your certificate you may obtain a duplicate for \$1.

Within 90 days of the expiration of your license you must apply for a renewal. Boat numbers, however, will not be changed.

So much for licensing provisions. Now, about the safety features — the main purpose of the bill.

All motor boats 16 to 26 feet in length must have a white light aft, visible from all directions. Also a bow light, green on the starboard and red on the port side.

Motor boats 26 feet and longer must have a bright white light fore and aft as well as a green light on the starboard side and a red light on the port side.

Sail boats under 40 feet in length must carry the red and green lantern, but not the white light. However, they are required to have a lantern or a flashlight aboard to be used in sufficient time to avert collision.

Every boat, regardless of size or make, shall have aboard one coast guard-approved life preserver, buoyant vest, ring buoy or buoyant

cushion — for each person on board. And it is the owner's responsibility to see that such equipment is in his boat.

This, regardless of who is operating the vessel.

There are several exemptions to the numbering provisions. However, for the most part the only exemption for private boat owners is the one granted for boats powered by motors of 10 horsepower or less. You fellows don't need to be concerned on way or another — except for the safety requirements.

In your case the safety provisions applicable include a required life preserver for each occupant and a white light to exhibit between the hours of sunset and sunrise.

Under this new law, drinking boat drivers are subject to fines of from \$50 to \$500 and imprisonment up to six months, or both fine and imprisonment. Same applies to intoxicated skiers.

Boats towing skiers must be operated at a reasonable distance from persons and property so as not to endanger the life or property of another person. Fines for violations range from \$10 to \$50.

Who is to enforce the law?

Any peace officer has the authority to make arrests and to board any vessel which does not have a proper identifying number or is being operated in a reckless manner.

He can issue you a "ticket" the same as a highway patrolman.

If properly administered and enforced, this law could prove to be a very valuable piece of legislation — in the interest of greater and safer boating pleasure.

Clift Is Named Coke Chairman To Study Aging Needs

Appointment of W. B. Clift of Robert Lee to serve as Coke county chairman on the Governor's Committee, White House Conference on Aging, was announced in Austin today jointly by Governor Price Daniel and State Senator Crawford C. Martin of Hillsboro, steering committee chairman.

Work on the state level will be directed by a steering committee of nine prominent Texans associated with agencies concerned with problems of the aged, and an advisory body of some 150 Texas citizens.

Senator Martin said county chairmen will be responsible for forming county organizations to gather information and make recommendations on the aging problem at the community and county levels.

He said that grassroots studies are necessary to ascertain the extent of income, employment, health, housing and other needs of the ever-increasing number of older people in Texas and throughout the country.

The Texas study, as well as those in other states, is being made by authority of a 1958 act of Congress. The act calls for a White House Conference on Aging to be held in Washington in January of 1961, as well as for local surveys and for state conferences in advance of the Washington meeting.

Sweetwater and Highland Garden Clubs. It was held at the Sweetwater Country Club.

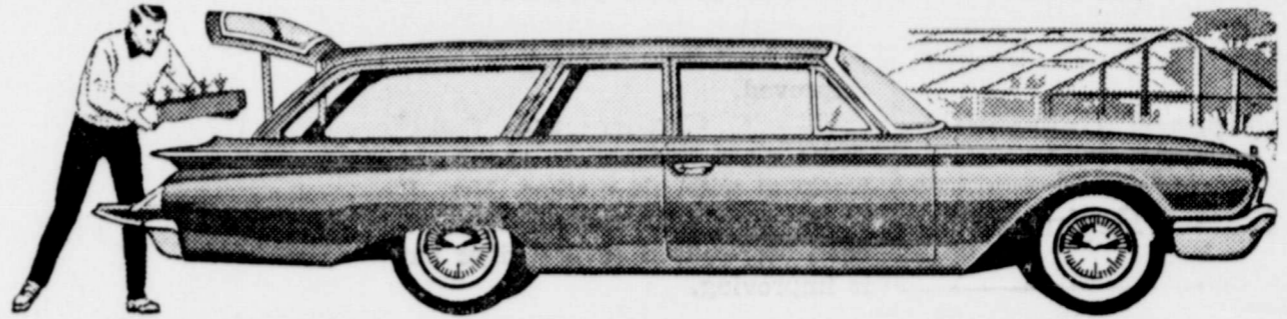

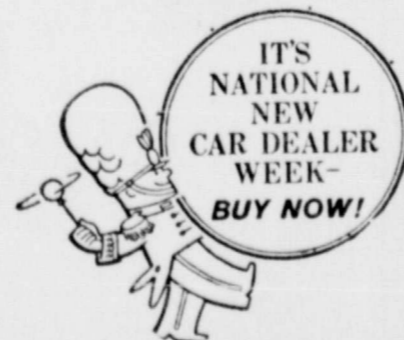

...on his 90th birthday last year

Services Held For Frank C. Wojtek, 91, Long Times Resident of Robert Lee

Services for Frank C. Wojtek, 91, Coke County resident for more than a half century, were held last Thursday at the Robert Lee Methodist Church. Officiating were the minister, Rev. Travis McNair, and Rev. Robin Guess, Baptist minister.

Burial was in Robert Lee cemetery under direction of Clift Funeral Home. Grandsons served as pallbearers.

Mr. Wojtek died about 6 a. m. Wednesday, March 30, at his home north of town where he had been cared for by his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Tom Wiginton. He had been in failing health for the past few years.

A native of Austria he was born Jan. 21, 1869. He came to America at the age of 17 and located in the Bell-Williamson Counties locality where relatives had preceded him. He attended college and taught in the rural schools a few years. In 1892 he married a neighbor young woman, Miss Anna Hruska, who had come to America with her parents when she was a baby. Mrs. Wojtek died in 1953.

He had a store in Temple for some time and moved to the Twin Mountains community west of San Angelo. In 1903 he and other friends went prospecting in New Mexico but he returned the next year and came to Coke County,

being employed on the Ralph Harris Ranch. He bought a farm in Graham Valley north of Robert Lee a short time later, and over the following years added materially to his real estate holdings.

He is survived by five sons and four daughters, all residing in this area. They are V. V. Wojtek, Mrs. Leta Wiginton, Otto and Eugene Wojtek, Mrs. Inez Nutter and Victor and Frank Wojtek.

Get License Before Fishing

AUSTIN — A few days of sunshine has doubled the number of fishermen on the lakes and streams of Texas, according to the director of law enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission.

"Wardens checking these fishermen find that most of them have their licenses," the director said. "A few, however, have put off buying their fishing licenses and it is necessary to charge them with violation."

Fishing license are required of all persons, except those under 16 or over 65 years, fishing with rod and reel in any Texas waters.

Non-residents pay the same fee for their license as Texans—\$2.15 — which permits fishing in either fresh or salt water.

"Visitors to Texas are appreciative of this license," the director said. "Most states charge a much higher price for non-resident fishing privileges. As a result of our minimum priced license, we get many fishing visitors in the state."

Fishing license can be bought from most sporting goods stores, the county clerks and game and fish commission offices in the major Texas cities.

Ask Social Security Questions April 14 and 16

The San Angelo social security district office reported today that many housewives in the area are not reporting household help for social security purposes.

"As little as \$4 per week in cash earnings totals more than \$50 a quarter and should be reported to the Director of Internal Revenue," Floyd B. Ellington, manager of San Angelo district office said.

Ellington explained reporting is easier than many housewives think. Upon request, Internal Revenue Service mails a report form each calendar quarter as a reminder. The report has the form of an envelope. The housewife enters the worker's name, social security number and total cash earnings. She puts a check or money order in the pocket to cover the social security tax and mails the sealed envelope to the address already printed on it.

The tax rate for 1960 is 3% for employee and 3% for employer. No detailed bookkeeping is required. The fact that a household worker is also reported by another employer makes no difference in reporting responsibility.

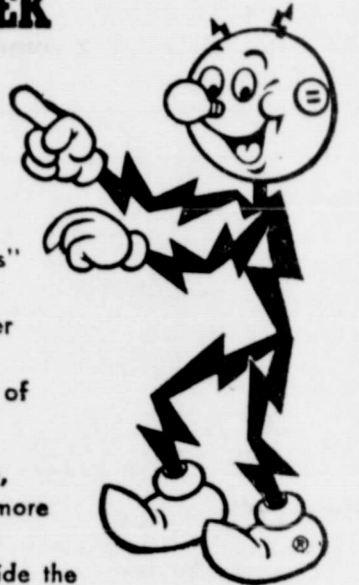
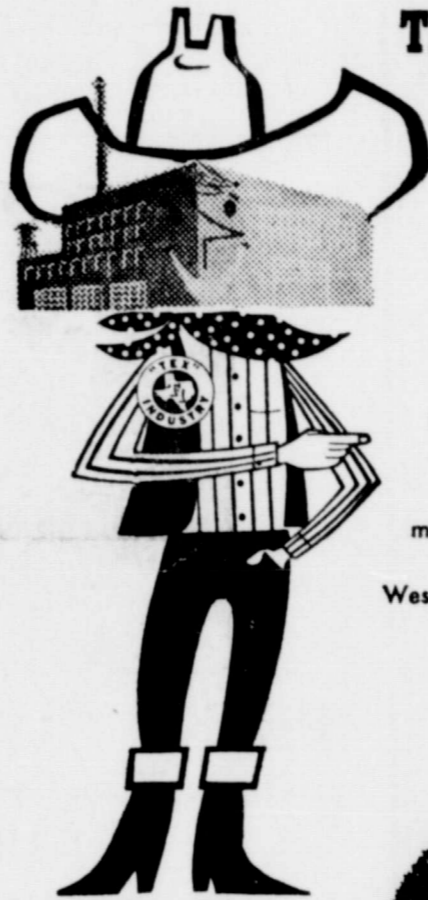

Wool and Sheep Program Set For April 12th

A wool preparation and sheep
 selection program will be held at
 the show barn at the Robert Lee
 Community Center on Tuesday af-
 ternoon, April 12, with selected
 authorities on hand to conduct the
 various phases of the program.

James A. Gray, well known Ex-
 tension Animal Husbandman, of
 San Angelo; a wool warehouse-
 man of San Angelo; and a wool
 buyer from San Angelo will con-
 duct a major portion of the pro-
 gram designed to improve the pro-
 duction, preparation and sale of
 our number one agricultural pro-
 duct—wool.

The Coke County Extension Ser-
 vice sheep and wool sub-committee
 will sponsor the three hour im-
 provement program. Their study
 of the county situation revealed
 that careful replacement selection

and wool preparation could in-
 crease net returns from many
 sheep operations. As a result of
 their efforts, the program on
 shearing, typing, packing, sort-
 ing, selling of wool was formu-
 lated. Sheep improvement through
 selective breeding to increase and
 stabilize wool production will also
 be demonstrated during the pro-
 gram.

The afternoon's agenda, which
 begins at 1:00 p. m., includes a
 shearing and wool preparation de-
 monstration conducted by Mr.
 Gray. A wool warehouseman will
 discuss the effects of wool pre-
 preparation on the sale of wool. A
 wool buyer will then explain how
 wool preparation can affect the
 price he will pay.

Refreshments will be served, af-
 ter which Mr. Gray will demon-
 strate a simple, systematic sheep
 selection program that has proven
 valuable to many producers over
 the State.

The sheep and wool sub-commit-
 tee invites all interested stock-

men and others to attend and ob-
 serve the demonstrations, they
 believe can add to the income of
 the sheep and wool producer.

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SMALL TALK

We mentioned last week in this column that big money interests planned to defeat A. J. Bishop for re-election to the legislature. Here's the story published last week in Mr. Bishop's home town newspaper, the Winters Enterprise:

In the campaign for State Representative of the 77th District, which is made up of Concho, Coke, Coleman and Runnels counties, it is now apparent that politicians and lobbyists from some of the big cities are going to try to muscle in and swing their weight to get a person of THEIR choice into the office instead of letting the people of the district decide for themselves by whom they wish to be represented at the State's Capitol.

According to news releases the past few days, a group of lobbyists, under a banner of "conservatism," has singled out candidates over the state to be "supported" or "defeated" in the upcoming primaries. One of those whose defeat is called for by this group is State Representative A. J. Bishop Jr. of Runnels County. The group is reported to be in favor of and campaigning for the election of Bishop's opponent in the race, J. W. (Bill) Moore, of Ballinger.

The group is reportedly headed by a Dallas attorney, Preston A. Weatherred, who has been described as "the lobbyists' lobbyist." He has sent out a plea to other politicians and lobbyists over Texas who represent various associations, asking their help in defeating six incumbent representatives. The plea of the city group is that the rural areas must have what they term "conservative" representation, and the defeat of those named is the way to get it.

Apparently this group, representing who know who or what, has many axes to grind at the State Capitol, and will undoubtedly go to great lengths and spend a lot of time and money in the attempt to unseat those candidates who have not fallen into their way of thinking—whatever that is.

Rep. Bishop said this week he "was surprised" to learn he had been listed in the liberal camp. He said he considers himself a conservative, but if the group is "going on the sales tax issue alone, they'd have to place me on the other side." "I've never favored one," Bishop said. "I voted against the sales tax every time it came up last session." Bishop said Weatherred had "pushed" sales tax legislation in the past.

This move by big-city politicians and lobbyists is additional evidence of the ever-increasing habit of many people to stick their noses into someone else's business. We are not naive enough to believe that this sort of political maneuvering has not gone on before; however, we do believe it just might not jell this time. West Texans, traditionally, have always been more or less suspicious of big-city political methods, and we don't believe the people of the 77th District will take kindly to the idea of being told by the political machines the way they should vote.
