MORE HIGHWAY WORK

Commissioner Fern Havins advised BCD members at their weekly luncheon Tuesday that two state highway projects affecting Robert Lee are expected to be completed this year. They include widening and installing curb and gutters on the east-west highway through town, extending from the Y intersection west to the street leading north to the school house. The other project is the 2-mile new paved highway leading from the bank corner to a point near the Roane home west of Robert Lee. All right of way for this project has been secured except one small stretch at the west end of the city limits.

TWISTERS WIN AGAIN; MEET KIRBY SUNDAY

Robert Lee Rabbit Twisters defeated Brownwood National Guard by a score of 17 to 3 here Sunday afternoon. It was a Concho Basin League game and advanced the Twisters to .500 per cent in the standing with two victories and two defeats.

The one-sided score was largely due to the fact that Brownwood's pitching was ineffective. Their starting hurler came up with a lame shoulder after a few warm-up throws and was unfit for mound duty. He had let Kirby Vacuum down the previous week with four hits.

Robert Lee amassed 18 hits in scoring runs. Norman Roberts slammed a homer over the left field fence, and later in the game stole home to add to his usual thrilling performance. Benny Corley had a perfect day at bat with a triple and three singles in four trips to the plate.

John Conley hurled the first five frames for the Twisters and four hits bunched in the early innings accounted for all the visitors runs. Richard Dumas was on the mound for two innings. The game was called after seven innings of play.

In other games last week Goodfellow defeated Ozona 8 to 4 and Kirby whipped the Brownwood Colts 15 to 6.

Robert Lee plays Kirby in San Angelo next Sunday at 3. Brownwood Colts journey to Ozona and Goodfellow meets Brownwood National Guard in Brownwood.

Jacobs Wins Tax Office In Runoff

O. B. Jacobs won the nomination for county tax assessor-collector in Saturday's Democratic runoff election. He defeated Mrs. Juanita Trimble by a vote of 672 to 408.

The turnout of nearly 1,100 voters for the second primary was a surprise, since the tax office and a Criminal Appeals Judge were the only contests. More than 1,500 votes were cast in Coke County's regular primary May 7.

Four candidates in the race for the tax office split the vote. Although Jacobs led the field then he failed by a few votes to get the required more than 50 per cent of the votes cast, and a runoff resulted.

The May 7 result was Jacobs 745 votes, Trimble 364, Aubrey Denman 278 and William J. Green 131.

The contest for Judge of the Chiminal Appeals Court resulted in W. T. McDonald having an edge of 493 to 484 over Judge Lloyd W. Davidson, who was seeking re-election. McDonald won the state office by a small majority.

Jacobs is expected to be elected in November and take over the tax office Jan. 1. For the first time in many years the sheriff and tax office will be separated in Coke County, voters having approved the separation at an election two years ago.

A Quarantine Against Rabies Now in Effect

Vaccinations of dogs and cats at the four designated places in the county on May 30-31, totaled 165. This figure is far short of the more than 800 vaccinated last year when rabies was so threatening.

The Robert Lee area led with 60 pets being immunized, while the Bronte area was next with 50. Forty turned out in the Silver area and 15 at Tennyson.

A thirty day restraining period beginning with the day of the vaccinations is in effect to make the program more effective.

The detention period enhances the program by allowing the vaccine to immunize the pets before they are given free run and also permits time for the removal of strays that would be a menace in the event of an outbreak of rabies.

City Property Will Have New Taxing Values

Two hundred notices have been mailed to owners of Robert Lee city property, advising that their assessments for taxing purposes have either been raised or lowered.

No kicks are expected from persons whose assessments have been cut, while those who wish to protest a raise will be privileged to appear before the board of equalization at the City Hall on June 15.

Serving as the city's board of equalization are A. B. Sheppard, D. P. Key and Linzy McDorman. They have checked all property assessments, and have made an effort to equalize the valuations. Their aim is to assess property at one-third its actual value.

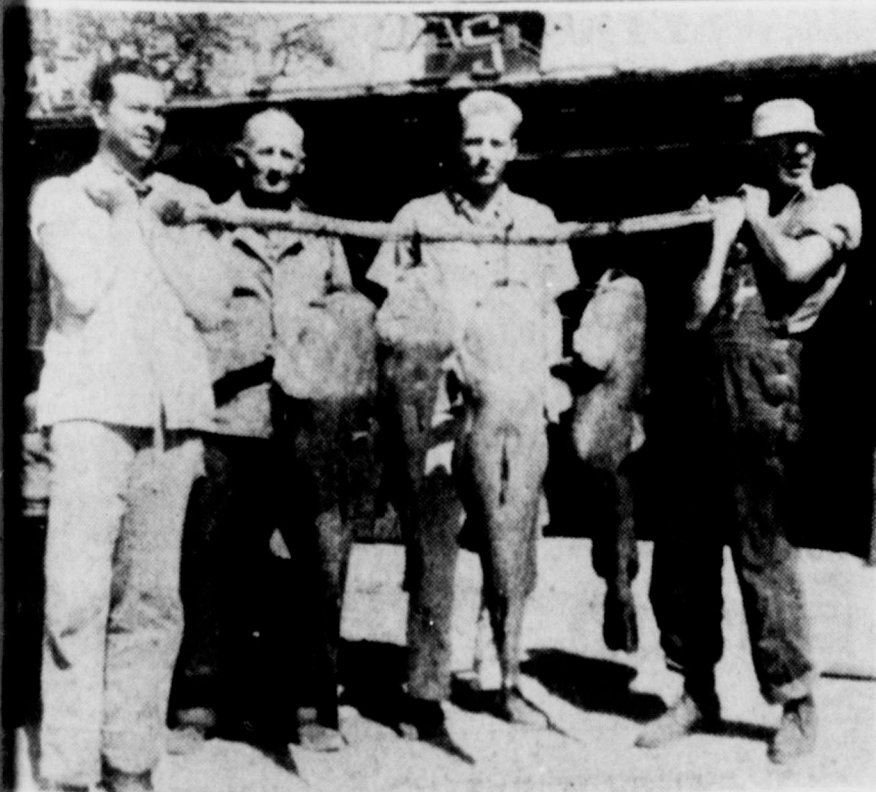
VISITED IN ARKANSAS

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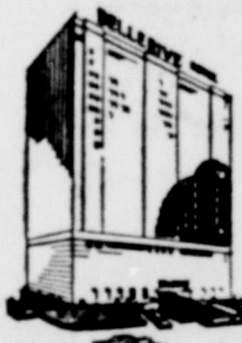
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C. Allen Jr., Willoughby Married Friday

Following a wedding trip to New Mexico points Mr. and Mrs. Allen will live at 2106 W. Twohig, San Angelo.

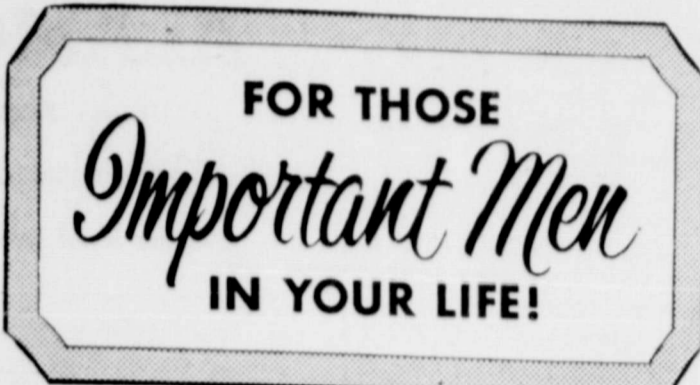

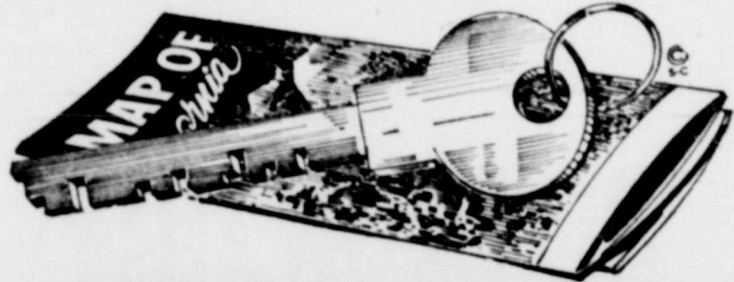
