Most of the bounty money has gone for rattlesnakes. During ten months of last year rattler payments amounted to \$3,173.50. At 50c per rattler, that meant 6,347 snakes. Last year bobcat and coyote bounties at \$12.50 each amounted to \$387.50, while payments for rabbit ears at 5 cents a pair was \$268.85.

More rattlers than ever have been killed this year. Up to Tuesday morning \$4,351.50 had been spent by the county since Jan. 1 for the rattles from 8,503 snakes.

dist Church of San Bonita, Texas Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an amendment to Article
(X of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto new Sections to be known as Sections 6, 7, and 8, to provide that the Legislature may authorize the creation of Hospital Disricts co-extensive with Lamar County, Hidalgo County, and County Commis-sioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche sioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, having certain stated powers and duties and subject to certain stated limitations; providing that any enabling Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character; providing for an election; prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby, amended by adding the following Sections which shall read as follows:
"Section 6. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a Hospital District co-extensive with Lamar Country, having the powers and duties.

pital District co-extensive with Lamar County, having the powers and duties and with the limitations presently provided in Article IX. Section 5(a), of the Constitution of Texas, as it applies to Wichita County, except that the maximum rate of tax that the said Lamar County Hospital District may be authorized to levy shall be seventy-five cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the District, subject to district taxation.

"Section 7. The Legislature may by

"Section 7. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a Hos-pital District co-extensive with Hidal-go County, having the powers and duties and with the limitations presently provided in Article IX, Section 5(s), of the Constitution of Texas, as it applies to Hidalgo County, except that applies to Hidaigo County, except that the maximum rate of tax that the said Hidaigo County Hospital District may be authorized to levy shall be ten cents (10c) per One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the District subject to district taxation. district taxation.

"Section 8. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a Hospital District to be co-extensive with the limits of County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, Texas.

"If such District is created, it may be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed seventy-five cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the District; provided, however, no tax may be levied until approved by a majority vote of the participating resident qualities. vote of the participating resident qualified property taxpaying voters who have duly rendered their property for taxation. The maximum rate of tax may be changed at subsequent elections so long as obligations are not impaired, and not to exceed the maximum limit of seventy-five cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollar (\$190) valuation, and no election shall be required by subsequent changes in the boundaries of the Commissioners Precinct value of this State.

"If such tax is authorized, no political subdivision or municipality within or having the same boundaries as the District may levy a tax for medical or hospital care for needy individuals, nor shall they maintain or erect hospital facilities, but the District shall by resolution assume all such responsibilities and shall assume all of the liabilities and obligations (including bonds and warrants) of such subdivisions or municipalities or both. The maximum tax rate submitted shall be sufficient to discharge such obligations. sufficient to discharge such obligations, liabilities, and responsibilities, and to maintain and operate the hospital system, and the Legislature may authorize the District to issue tax bonds for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or rene. for the purpose of the purchase, con-struction, acquisition, repair or reno-vation of improvements and initially equipping the same, and such bonds shall be payable from said seventy-five cent (75c) tax. The Legislature shall provide for transfer of title to properties to the District.

shall provide for transfer of title to properties to the District.

"(b) The Legislature may by law permit the County of Comanche to render financial aid to that District by paying a part of the expenses of operating and maintaining the system and paying a part of the debts of the District (whether assumed or created by the District) and may authorise the levy of a tax not to exceed ten cents (10c) per One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation (in addition to other taxes permitted by this Constitution) upon all property within the County but without the County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County at the time such levy is made for such purposes. If such tax is authorized, the District shall by resolution assume the responsibilities, obligations, and liabilities of the County in the manner and to the extent hereinabove provided for political subdivisions having boundaries co-extensive with the District, and the County shall not thereafter levy taxes (other than herein provided) for hospital purposes nor for providing hospital care for needy individuals of the County.

"(c) Should the Legislature enactenabling laws in anticipation of the

"(c) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the general election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO.

Proposing an Amendment to Section
49-b, Article III of the Constitution of
Texas, increasing to three and one-half
percent (3-1/4 %) the maximum permissible interest rate on bonds hereafter
issued by the Veterans' Land Board;
providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT PROCLEMAN

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article II of the Constitution of Texas, be amended by adding thereto the follow-ing:

"The foregoing notwithstanding. bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board pursuant to the authority of this Section 49-b of the Constitution may bear a rate or rates of interest not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum.

"This Amendment shall become ef-fective upon its adoption."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date set forth in said Amendment, and the Governor shall issue a proclamation in keeping therewith.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first of the state. therewith.
