## Steers Defeat Menard 28 to 6

Coach John Malone's Robert Lee Steers proved to the Menard Yellowjackets Friday night that they there to play football and win a victory.

Robert Lee scored the first tally in the ballgame in the first quarter when quarterback Richard Sims ran four yards over right tackle on a keeper play. This

touchdown was set up by a long pass play hurled by halfback Tommy Allen to Sims for a total gain of 35 yards. The Steers failed to make the two points on a run.

Menard's lone score came early in the second quarter.

Robert Lee's drive late in the second quarter was thwarted by having two touchdowns called back. One was called back on a 15 yard penalty for a personal foul and the other was called back when Blankenship ran out of bounds.

Curtis Higginbotham was badly shaken shortly before the first half ended, but he came back, seemingly, with more steam in the second half.

At the half both teams were tied 6 and 6.

The Steers showed they were determined to win in the third quarter when Richard Sims went over right tackle on a quarterback keeper play for the touchdown. Halfback James Blankenship went around right end for the two points.

After Robert Lee's second touchdown, Donny Robertson made a perfect on-sides kick and Sims recovered the ball. This appeared to be the main turning point of the game as the Yellowjackets looked as if their wings had been snipped.

Early in the fourth quarter Blankenship scampered on a right end sweep for 15 yards for the touchdown. Halfback John Kinsey converted the extra points with a run around left end.

Richard Sims made the final score on a four yard run around right end.

There were no apparent serious injuries on either team. Tommy Allen was knocked out early in the first half after throwing a pass. He was brought back to Robert Lee in a Clift Ambulance and was treated at Coke County Memorial Hospital.

Robert Lee and Menard each were penalized 40 yards. The Steers out performed the Yellowjackets in all departments. The Steers had a total of 287 yards on the ground and in the air compared to 186 yards for Menard.

The Yellowjackets outweighed the Robert Lee team heavily, but the Steers showed head coach Malone and his assistant Jerry Alsup that speed and the will to win can beat a heavier team.

## AN ADDITIONAL FIRST GRADE TEACHER HAS BEEN HIRED

An unusual heavy enrollment in the first grade necessitated the hiring of an additional teacher, according to Superintendent Hervey Latham.

Mrs. Peggy Vinson of Bronte has been hired to fill the position caused by the enrollment of 41 first grade students.

Mrs. Vinson has taught first grade in San Antonio, and she also assisted in Bronte last year when the first grade enrollment swelled beyond the provided facilities of that school system.

She received her bachelor's degree from Hardin-Simmons University. Her husband is pastor of

the First Baptist Church in Bronte. They have two children, one a fourth grade student and the other child is in the first grade.

Latham said, "the first grade students have been divided into two classes, as far as possible, according to age.

The overall enrollment in Robert Lee Public Schools is about the same as last year. Enrollment by grades are: 41 in the first, 28 in the 2nd, 32 in the 3rd, 25 in the 4th, 35 in the 5th, 31 in the 6th, 31 in the 7th, 19 in the 8th, 19 in the 9th, 16 in the 10th, 20 in the 11th, and 25 in the 12th.

### Home Demonstration

Mrs. Glenn Waldrop, Mrs. Len McDorman and Mrs. Ronald Johnson, members of the H. D. Council Yearbook committee, met Monday, Sept. 2, to continue work on the 1961 yearbook. The same yearbook is used by all the clubs in the county so the problems involved in composing a book suitable to all club members are numerous.

I met with a number of homemakers in Bronte Tuesday for the purpose of organizing a new home demonstration club. One club already meets in the Bronte area and has been under the leadership of Mrs. Taylor Emerson this past year.

There is a need for another club on the east side of the county. If any of you in the Bronte-Tennyson area are interested and have not been contacted, call either Mrs. Drw Arrott or myself.

Mr. Lindsey and I will be in San Angelo September 8 and 9 to attend a District Meeting of County Agricultural and Home Demonstration agents. A portion of the meeting will be conducted by specialists from the state office.

I will be in Abilene September 10 to assist in judging the home demonstration club exhibits at the Texas Fair. Counties in the area around Abilene are invited to set up an exhibit. These exhibits are housed in the Women's Building and will be most interesting and educational. Those of you who visit the fair should see these displays set up by club women.

### Agriculture News

News writing is not a talent that I consider myself to be particularly blessed with. Nevertheless I intend to be more faithful in its pursuit in the future.

Watch for an announcement regarding testing for brucellosis among cattle in Coke County in the near future. We have been led to believe, though nothing official is available to support our belief, that the crew presently testing cattle in Tom Green County will be transferred here upon completion of their work in the adjoining county. Testing should be completed in our neighboring county in the next few weeks.

Shortly before work is to begin, a planning committee will be sent here to help plan for the testing. We should receive word from them in the very near future.

Jim Gray, sheep specialist with the Extension Service was in the county Monday and Tuesday helping with sheep selection. We worked approximately 400 ewes for Nolan Pentecost, of Sanco, and around 350 ewes and 50 bucks for A. V. Hughes and S. E. Adams, on the Wylie and Whiteside places in the north end of the County. Jim helped the two operators as he has many others in recent years to classify their breeding animals to insure more rapid improvements in wool production and lamb production. Several other sheep producers plan to install the system of selection in their operations. Call us if you would like more information on the subject or

desire assistance in setting up a selection program.

Cotton harvest is underway by a few operators in the County, while others with later cotton — and moisture — are fighting insects. Melvin Krall, Oscar Kresta and Vladimir Wojtek have been to the gin. I am sure there are others that have been, also.

Frank Percifull, Valley View, and Clarence Arrott, Juniper, have been hunting for airplanes to spray their irrigated cotton. Weevils were plaguing Frankie, while bollworms and fleahoppers were bothering Mr. Arrott. The dry land cotton has stopped making new growth in most cases while their fields can mature a lot more cotton before frost if the insects can be controlled.

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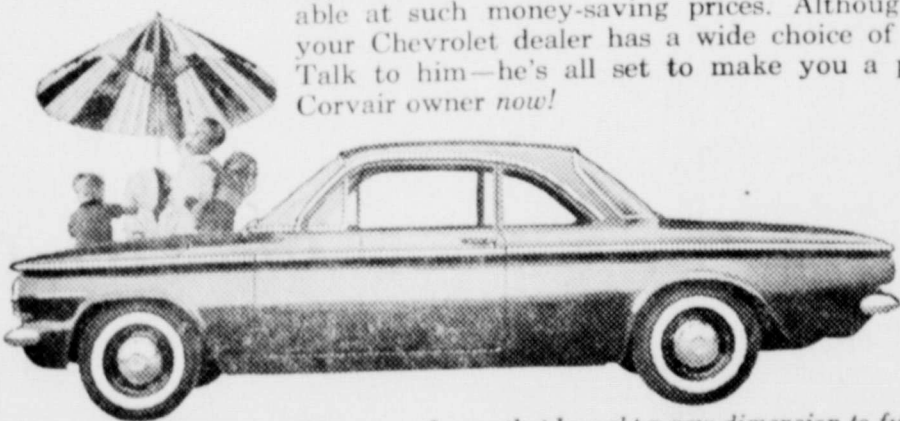

## Scottish Rite Hospital Opens School for Kids

Hospital days are school days for all youngsters at Scottish Rite Hospital for Crippled Children this fall, and they are happy about it.

The institution has opened the first full-scale school of any hospital in the city for its young patients.

It will give school-age patients from all over the state an opportunity to keep up with their school work while they're rehabilitated through surgery and therapy at the hospital in Dallas.

Miss Ann Sewell, a teacher in the special education division of Dallas Independent School District, will conduct the classes in a schoolroom created from a sewing room previously used by volunteers.

### Looked Forward

"We've been looking forward to this for several years," said Mrs. Helen P. Haese, superintendent.

She said of herself and Dr. Brandon Carrell, chief of staff:

"We feel of all who really need education, these children do most. Many will never be able to make a living doing manual work. They need every opportunity they can get."

Another advantage: The previously heavy summer load at the hospital should slack, for school-age patients will no longer be reluctant to enter during the school term.

An average of 60 to 70 youngsters occupy the red-brick institution at 2201 Welborn St., and somewhere around 25 of them at a given time are of school age.

### New Program

In the past only Dallas patients were taught at the school, under Mrs. Helen Cantrell.

"Many others wanted to participate when she came to teach the local students," said Mrs. Haese. We felt we could do a great deal of good if we could teach them all.

Hospital board president John McKee initiated the new program and worked out details of the co-operative system with Dr. W. T. White, superintendent of the participating district.

Miss Sewell will work with small groups of the students on block assignments supplied by the patient's home schools.

She'll inform the home school of progress periodically, but not actually grade the youngsters.

If the patient load gets too heavy, Mrs. Cantrell will be called in to assist.

# HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITAL

STIN, Tex. — A family trying to get all slicked up to make a good impression on important company can't take time out for a domestic squabble.

On this premise, the Texas Industrial Commission, whose job is to lure new industry to Texas, voted to steer clear of political hassles and concentrate on putting its best foot forward.

On this decision was 5-to-1. The only no was Al H. Chesser, railroad brotherhood representative. He has urged the Commission to sponsor a legislative program including repeal of the state's "right to work" law.

"Our job is to sell Texas," said Hans B. Germany, Commission chairman. He said he felt the Commission would be hampered in doing so if it got involved in controversial legislation.

Reviewing two year's progress, Germany reported that 475 new plants had located in Texas since the TIC was formed in March, 1958. Plans have been announced for 375 others in 99 counties and 492 plants have expanded in the past two years.

In the future, Walter Dickert, TIC executive director, said factory managements are considering a move to Texas. A number of these, he said, would make plants for which Texans now pay \$2,500,000,000 out-of-state.

**HANDS OFF HOUSTON** — As a believer of local control for school matters, Gov. Price Daniel said he would not intervene in affairs of the Houston Public School system.

For weeks Houston schools have been in a squeeze between a federal court order to begin gradual desegregation and a state law which says it will lose state aid if it does not.

As a last resort, the Houston School Board asked Gov. Daniel to interpose in its behalf. Under the theory of interposition, the state has, under the Tenth Amendment to the U. S. Constitution, the right to interpose against any federal act by which it believes the federal government is exceeding its constitutional powers.

Daniel pointed out that this course had been tried without success in other states. Expressing confidence in the Houston board and its attorneys, Daniel said,

"The Texas policy of local operation and control of public schools is far better than an attempted control by the governor or state."

**TAX BITES UNCLE SAM**—It was a sort of man-bites-dog story when the Attorney General's Department ruled the federal government would have to pay a \$400,000 state inheritance tax to Texas.

In her will Mrs. Susan Vaughan Clayton made a bequest to "the United States of America, to be used for retirement of the national debt." Mrs. Clayton was the widow of the late Will Clayton of Anderson, Clayton & Co.

A federal attorney proposed keeping the money in a special account in Texas since bequests to Texas and its citizens are exempt from the inheritance tax.

But the AG ruling said other states would benefit just as much as Texans from national debt retirement. In effect: the federal treasury will have to take the bitter with the sweet.

**WHAT'S IN A NAME?**—Hottest rivalries between neighboring Texas towns used to center on who would have the courthouse. Nowadays it's usually over who has the best high school football team.

But two Central Texas towns, San Marcos and New Braunfels, are having a lively contest over

the naming of a park to be built between the two cities.

State Parks Board, back in July, designated it as "San Marcos State Park." Civic-spirited San Marcans had raised \$2,500 for park equipment with the request that it be named after their town.

New Braunfels folk raised a storm. They claimed it would be nearer their town, that their county would have to maintain a road to it, etc.

Recognizing the touchiness of the situation, the State Parks Board says it will re-consider the whole thing at its October meeting. Both sides are to be given a chance to present their views.

**PISTOL-TOTIN' CURB URGED**—Legislation to close the loopholes in present state law governing sale and possession of pistols may be offered in the next session.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson ruled that the law requiring the presentation of a certificate of good character before buying a pistol is not enforceable.

In 1958, the opinion pointed out, the Court of Criminal Appeals ruled that this part of the law was unconstitutional because the caption of the bill passed by the Legislature did not sufficiently explain what was in the bill.

Local peace officers were quick to call for corrective legislation. Lawmen feel there should be curbs on who can buy concealable weapons and records of the purchases so the police can check on who

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made them.

**OLD AGE ROLLS DWINDLE** — Though the number of oldsters in the state is increasing, the number receiving state old age assistance checks is declining and is expected to drop still more.

This conclusion was contained in the report of a subcommittee to the state Conference on Aging.

Drop in the state pension rolls was attributed to more Social Security benefits, more company retirement plans, more oldsters working or receiving other support.

**AUTO INSPECTIONS BEGIN** — Period for having official auto safety inspections made in Texas begins this month.

Deadline for getting a new inspection sticker on your windshield is not until next April 15, but with 4,500,000 vehicles to be checked, lines will be long in the final weeks.

Cost of an inspection is \$1 plus any needed repair for motoring safety. Average cost to each vehicle owner, including the repairs, was \$2 last year.

**SHORT SNORTS** — Commission on Higher Education has announced that the 19 state-supported colleges and universities have asked for appropriations running 39 per cent above present spending. To make the road map reader's job easier, the State Highway Commission has given a single route

number to the most direct highway connection between Huntsville and Paris. Now named State Highway 19, the route formerly had five different numbers. Worst plague of army worms in years is blighting the lawns of Texas home owners from Central Texas down to the Coast. State Department of Agriculture recommends spraying with DDT or toxaphene.

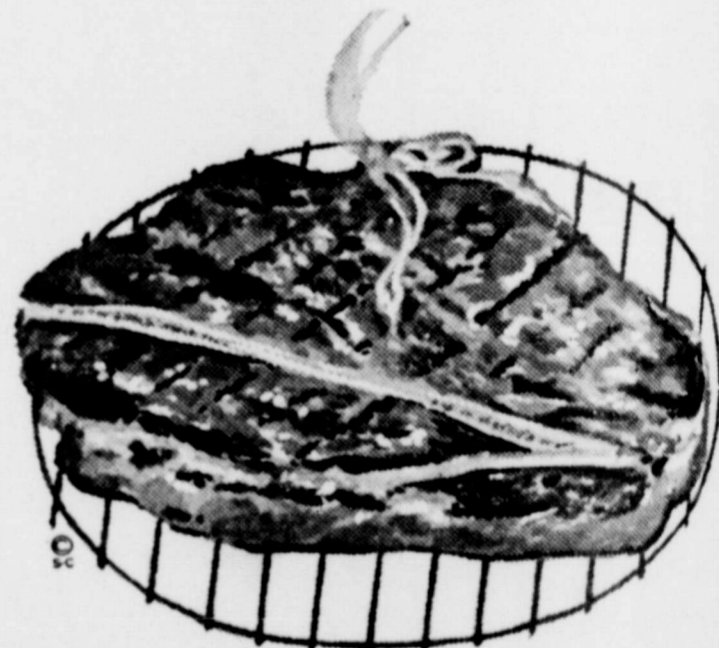
