Harold Sheppard Killed In Accident

Funeral services were conducted at the First Methodist Church in Robert Lee Tuesday afternoon for Harold Gene Sheppard, 31, who was killed Sunday night in a highway accident near Spearman. Funeral services were conducted at the Rev. Travis McNair, pastor of the Robert Lee Church. He was assisted by the Rev. A. B. Lightfoot, pastor of the Crescent Park Baptist Church of Odessa, in which Mr. Sheppard was a member. Burial was in Robert Lee Cemetery

under direction of Clift Funeral Home. Pallbearers included Douglas Dean, Paul Burns, Will Percifull, Howard Varnadore, Cortez Harmon, Bill Allen, Willis Wayne Smith and Billy Carol Green, all of Robert Lee and all members of Mr. Sheppard's high school graduating class.

Mr. Sheppard was employed with his brothers in the Sheppard Pipe Laying Service of Spearman. The fatal accident occurred Sunday night about 9 o'clock after a machine which is used to distribute pipe broke down on a highway. A pickup belonging to the firm was being used to furnish light to repair the damage, and Mr. Sheppard was working on the machine. Apparently the lights from the pickup blinded the woman who was driving a car approaching the scene of the accident. She hit the machine, pinning Mr. Sheppard between it and her car. Witnesses said he was killed instantly.

Harold Gene Sheppard was born May 17, 1920, at Robert Lee. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Delmir Sheppard. He grew up in Robert Lee and graduated from Robert Lee High School in 1947. He was married to the former Jean Smith of Bronte June 9, 1949. They resided in Bronte for a few years before he took a job with Bethlehem Steel Corporation in Odessa. He had been living at Spearman since Jan. 1, 1960.

Survivors include his wife and three children, Donna, 10, Randy, 7, and Ricky, 5, all of Bronte; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Delmir Sheppard of Robert Lee; three brothers, Delmir Morris, Bert and Jerome Sheppard, all of Spearman; one sister, Mrs. Jack (Nelda) Brock of Shallowater; his grandmother, Mrs. Temp Whiteside of San Angelo.

Steers Defeated By Heavy Eagles

The Robert Lee Steers fought a hard, losing battle Friday night against a fast and heavy team of Eagles at Eldorado. The Eagles won the game by a score of 28 to 0.

Jerry Quisenberry completed a pass from Quarterback Richard Sims for a first down to start Robert Lee's attack in the first quarter. James Blankenship scampered 18 yards around right end for another first down.

John Kinsey made yardage on a left end run and it seemed that the Steers might be on their way, but a pass interception by Eagle Jim Cheek stopped the drive.

The first Eldorado touchdown came in the first quarter. The Eagles scored twice in the second quarter and once in the third period.

Joe Roe, John Kinsey, Richard Sims and Blankenship started several drives for the Eldorado goal line that were stopped by "bad breaks" which included two fumbles and one pass that was intercepted by the Eagles.

Outstanding defensive playing against a tremendously heavy and fast Class A Conference team by Curtis Higginbotham, Kinsey, Jerry Craig, Jerry Quisenberry, Connie Hallmark, John Jacobs, James Harmon, Tommy Allen and other hard working Steers kept the score within reaching distance for the Robert Lee football squad, but the Steers just couldn't penetrate the solid wall of Eldorado for a touchdown.

Robert Lee's won and lost record for the 1960 season is three victories against 2 defeats.

Eldorado has a perfect record in the 1960 season by winning 6 and losing none.

Jim Cheek, Donnie Holden, John McGregor, Carl Parker and Charles West were the main "war horses" for Eldorado.

Robert Lee goes to Roby for the first 6-B Conference game of the 1960 season this Friday night.

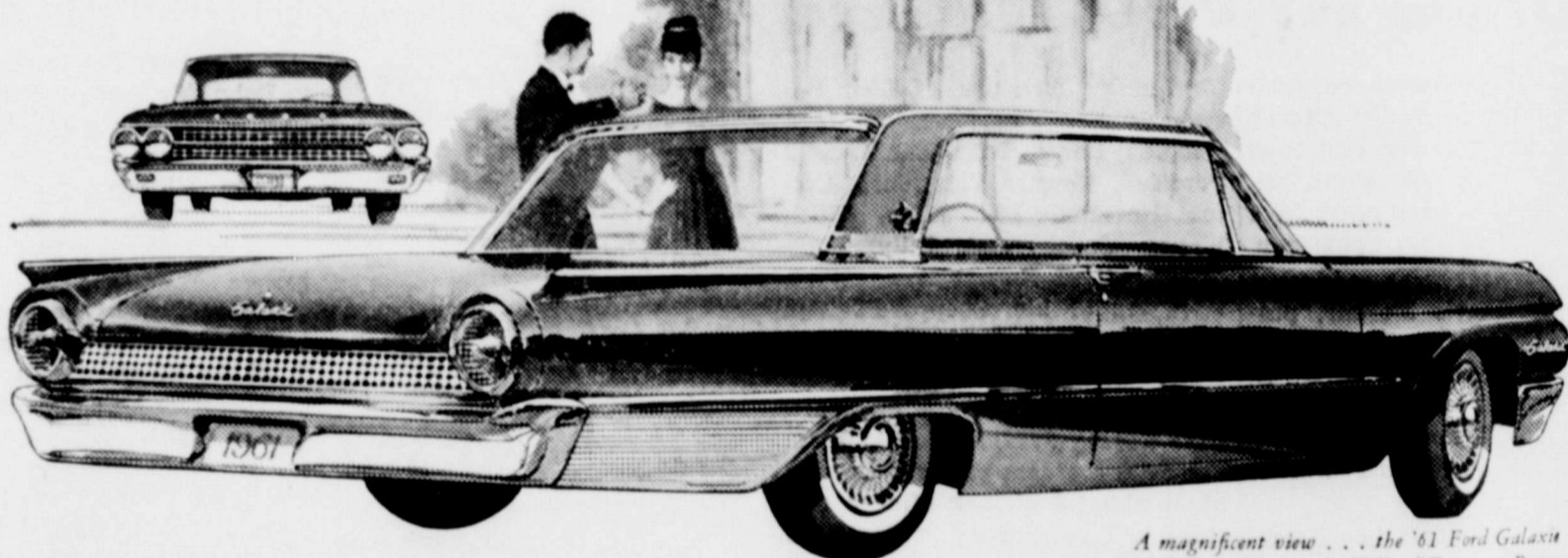

COKE SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Present Supervisors —
C. N. Webb, Chairman; W. E. Burns, Vice Chairman; D. K. Glenn, Secretary and Treasurer; Bryan Yarbrough and Robert Walker.

Mrs. E. S. Cummings has developed a Great Plains Conservation Plan for her ranch located 12 miles west of Robert Lee. Practices planned include stock water development, brush control, diversion terraces, cross fencing and deferment. These practices will be carried out over a three year period.

Mrs. Annie Forehand has constructed 1700 feet of diversion terrace and 1.5 miles of level field terraces on her ranch located 14 miles southwest of Robert Lee. The work was done by contract with costshare under ACP. Diversion was built to protect a field that was being terraced for erosion control, and to get better distribution of rainfall.

Mrs. Faye Rawlings has had constructed by contract 700 feet of diversion terrace on her place north of Bronte. It will control erosion, and add extra water to an existing stock pond.



D. K. Glenn of Bronte was re-elected to the Coke Soil Conservation District Board for Subdivision 2. Election was held last Tuesday night in the vocational building at Bronte.

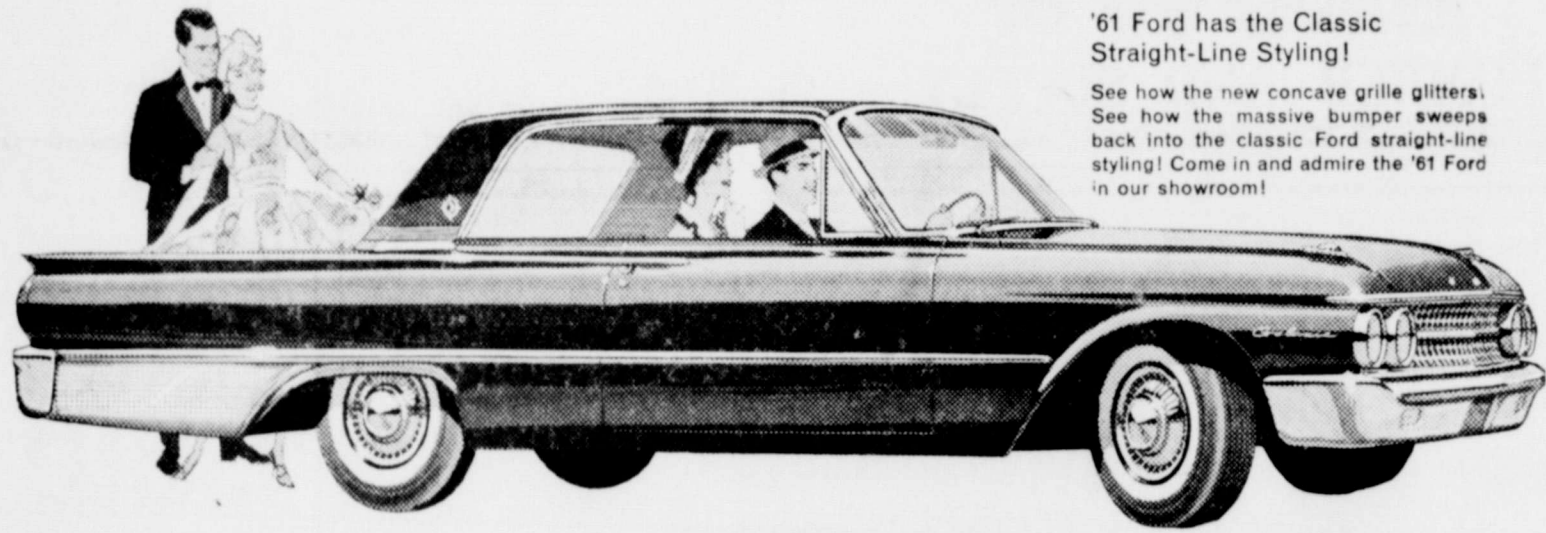

Johnson, Rayburn Oil's Best Friend

From Abilene Reporter-News, Oct. 10

Texas oilmen will do better to stay with "known friends who have been effective and understanding than to support those who have shown not only a lack of understanding but lack of interest and tolerance," French M. Robertson, Abilene oilman and civic leader, declared this week.

Urging support of the Democratic Party ticket in the general election Nov. 8, Robertson called Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson and House Speaker Sam Rayburn "the two best friends the oil industry ever had in Washington."

"Appreciation and gratitude on the part of an individual are the most important traits of character," Robertson said. "How can the oil people of Texas at this time fail to support Lyndon B. Johnson and Sam Rayburn, who have been our staunch friends down through the years?"

Robertson, who is a member of the State Democratic Executive Committee, said Republican charges that the Democrats are trying to cut the oil depletion allowance are false.

33 Year Old Law

The law relative to depletion has been on the books since 1927, he explained, and the most determined effort to change it in recent years has been made by Sen. John Williams of Delaware, a Republican. Texans in Congress, particularly Rayburn and Johnson, have successfully led the fight for 33 years to retain the law in its original form, Robertson said.

(Briefly, the percentage depletion formula was set up, in the case of oil, to prevent the producer's capital from being taxed as income, allowing him to deduct from his gross income up to 27½ per cent of the value of the oil and gas he produces during the year.)

"Surely it is within reason to conclude that without the leadership of Rayburn and Johnson we would probably have suffered a cut in the depletion allowance before this time," Robertson contended.

"I contemplate with misgivings what positions we would find ourselves in should we rebuff and humiliate these two friends of the oil industry in the election Nov. 8."

Would 'Lose Prestige'

While it is possible that regardless of the outcome of the presidential election both Rayburn and Johnson would retain their seats in Congress, Robertson said a defeat for the Democratic ticket in Texas would mean a serious loss of prestige and position for the two Texans.

"If the Democratic ticket should lose, Mr. Rayburn conceivably might not be reelected speaker of the House. Also, Sen. Johnson probably would be replaced as majority leader.

"I wonder under such circumstances how anyone in the petroleum industry can be naive enough to believe we could retain our oil and gas depletion allowance as it now exists."

Robertson, who has long been active in political as well as oil industry affairs, said experience in this field helped him reach one outstanding conclusion.

"That is, that you be loyal and appreciative of the people who have been your friends."

Imports 'Too High'

Robertson, who served as chairman of the Texas Governor's Oil Imports Study Commission in 1958, pointed out that importation of cheap foreign crude oil increased greatly during the present administration.

"Imports are at an all time high and the daily allowable authorized a producer in Texas is at an all time low," he noted.

"This situation has developed even while President Eisenhower had statutory authority to curtail these extremely excessive imports by executive order."

He also reminded that under the present administration two bills to free natural gas from federal controls had been vetoed, "the effect of which was for all intent and purpose, to deny the small independent the opportunity to produce natural gas."

"In view of these things, it seems ironic that the Republicans and their friends would try in sincerity to say that the Republican administration has been a great blessing to our industry and that it offers salvation in the future."

½ cup cocoa
½ teaspoon salt

Heat the butter or margarine and water in a 1½ quart saucepan until melted. Remove from heat and add vanilla. Mix sugar, nonfat dry milk, cocoa and salt. Add to first mixture about ¼ cup at a time, beating until smooth after each addition of sugar mixture. Mix in any kind of unsalted nuts. Spread in a greased 9x5 inch pan. Chill ½ hour, or until firm.

Kathy had the first place heavy weight Angus steer at the fair last year and would like to repeat the feat. The calf came from her father's herd.

Jo Alice Evans, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jay Evans, and granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Green Preslar, all of Sanco, will try her luck with a middle weight Hereford steer bred by Mr. Preslar. Jo Alice is feeding calves for the first time, but that has not been a problem.
