Steers Defeated In District 6-B Opener

The Robert Lee Steers lost their first 6-B conference tilt to the Roby Lions in Roby Friday night by a score of 18 to 14.

Robert Lee remained in the lead from the first quarter until the final period. Roby scored two touchdowns in the final period to win the game by 4 points.

Robert Lee scored 6 points in the first quarter and 8 points in the second quarter.

The first Steer score was made in the first quarter on a hand-off from quarterback Richard Sims to halfback James Blankenship for a run of 40 yards. This was the climax of 26 yards gained on the ground by fullback Joe Roe. In the second period Robert Lee

gained possession of the ball on their 5½ yard line after breaking up a Roby fourth down pass play. Joe Roe carried for one yard on the first play. John Kinsey gained 4 yards. Then Joe Roe made the first down through the middle. On the next play Richard Sims carried the ball for 9½ yards on a keeper play. Roe again was elected to carry the ball for the first down. On the next play Blankenship went through center for 9½ yards. Roe plunged through center for 3 yards and the first down. Kinsey carried for 6, and then Roe again for the first down. Blankenship punched for three yards. Sims tossed a pass to Kinsey who ran 30 yards for Robert Lee's second tally. Blankenship earned the extra points on a run around right end.

Roby fought back late in the second period with three pass plays and one ground play to get their first touchdown. Their tally came from a pass from Billy Simmons to Jerry Burk for 10 yards.

Neither team scored in the third quarter.

Early in the fourth period Roby's Dale Green carried from the 2 foot line for their second score. The try for extra points failed.

Robert Lee received the kick after Roby's score. Tommy Allen carried for three yards which brought the Steers almost to the 40 yard line. On the next play the Steers lost the ball on a fumble. The Steers then received two penalties in succession for a total of 30 yards. Roby made 4 yards on the ground. The next play was an incomplete pass and Robert Lee received another penalty. Dale Green of Roby then carried through the middle for the final score of the evening that gave Roby their victory by 4 points.

Outstanding defensive plays were turned in by ends Curtis Higginbotham, Dwain Walker, tackles James Harmon, Royce McInturff, guard Jerry Craig and center Jerry Quisenberry.

Until the fourth period the entire Steer line and backfield maintained control of the situation.

Robert Lee has won 3 and lost 3 games in the 1960 season.

Mountain Creek Lake Catches 5,000,000 Gallons

Mountain Creek Lake, Robert Lee's water reservoir, had a rise of 3 feet as a result of the recent rainfall for the past 5 days. The rise amounts to 160 acre feet increase of water in the lake, or if measured in gallons it is five million.

Various rainfall reports ranged from 8" on the Bert Blaylock place in the Lometa community down to 2.1 inches on the T. M. Wylie ranch 5 miles north of Robert Lee.

Finell Smith reported 3.2 inches at Edith. L. E. Smith and Son reported a loss of 20 head of sheep due to a flash flood on Live Oak Creek.

Gerald Allen received 3.1 inches of rainfall on his ranch east of Robert Lee from Friday through Wednesday morning.

A. V. Hughes received 8 inches on the Skinny Adams ranch southwest of town. J. W. Service Jr. received 6 inches. Southeast of Robert Lee, at Tennyson, S. C. Sayer received 6 inches. In the northeastern part of the county, O. T. Colvin at Blackwell reported rainfall of 1.75.

U. S. Soil Conservation Service reported 4.48 inches at the courthouse during the 5 day spell. W. M. Millican had received 3.7 inches at his ranch through Tuesday evening. His ranch is 13 miles west of Robert Lee.

J. O. Rudd stated that all his tanks and water holes were full.

The recent rainfall brought smiles to all the residents in the county and especially to livestock owners.

ABSENTEE VOTING NOW IN EFFECT

Absentee voting for the Nov. 8 General Election started Wednesday of this week, and will continue through Nov. 4.

County Clerk J. L. Tinkler received the Coke County ballots from the printers Monday. Persons who expect to be away or unable to get to the polls on Election Day are privileged to vote absentee.

They may call in person at the court house on or before Nov. 4 or make application for an absentee ballot by sending a written request to Mr. Tinkler.

It's a large ballot this year with six columns under the headings: Democratic, Republican, Constitution, Prohibition, Independent and Write-In.

Four proposed amendments to the state constitution also are to be voted upon and are listed at the bottom of the ballot.

Coke Democrats Gird For Battle

"When Eisenhower was elected president we were producing oil 24 days of every month," said Claude Brown of McCamey at a meeting of Kennedy-Johnson campaign workers in Robert Lee Monday night.

"Now at the end of his eight years in office we have only eight producing days, and that's going to be the year's average," Mr. Brown continued.

Mr. Brown, successful independent oil man and a prominent West Texas Democratic leader, laid the blame on the big companies who have not been forced to reduce their imports of crude oil. The President has authority to cut the imports, Mr. Brown said.

The McCamey man is certain that the much discussed 27½ percent depletion allowable tax reduction will be continued if the Democrats remain in power.

His trips over the country prove to him that big business is in the saddle with the present adminis-

tration, and small businesses everywhere are suffering as well as the independent oil producers.

Monday's meeting was attended by thirty or more interested Democrats from over the county and Mr. Brown accompanied a delegation from San Angelo which included Ralph Logan, Joe Foy and Leon Whittaker.

Both Logan and Whittaker are co-chairmen for a 9-county district in charge of campaign efforts for the Kennedy-Johnson ticket. Logan was pleased with the interest shown by Coke County people and urged all Democratic backers to become active during the final weeks of the campaign, and center their efforts on voters who as yet have not made up their minds which candidates to support.

Joe Foy, young San Angelo lawyer, made a rousing speech for the Democratic nominees. Persons at the meeting expressed the hope that he may be seen and heard on TV.

Mrs. Frank Smith has been named chairman of the women's division of the Coke County campaign and will have a number of active co-chairmen. Active in the Kennedy-Johnson drive are D. K. Glenn, Charlie Boecking and Editor Ben Oglesby of Bronte, Frank Dickey, A. J. Kirkpatrick, Editor John King, Commissioner Fern Havins and County Clerk J. L. Tinkler.

Robert Lee City Lots Are Being Leased for Oil

Oil leasing in the city of Robert Lee has caused a ripple of excitement the past two weeks.

Several hundred lots have been leased, according to Lamont Scott, who has been working with William Brown Jr. of Midland, who states he is getting the leases for a major oil company.

Most leasing has been in the west half of town, and no property has been taken east of a block west of the court house. Nor has acreage been leased outside the city limits, except a couple of small tracts on the south side.

Most of the farm property adjoining Robert Lee on the west and north is already under lease to a major company, most of it being held by Gulf.

Brown is playing \$20 for a 50x140 lot, accepting a 5-year paid lease. That means there will be no renewals.

While the lease bonus seems small, Scott said the amount will be at the rate of about \$120 per acre of ground.

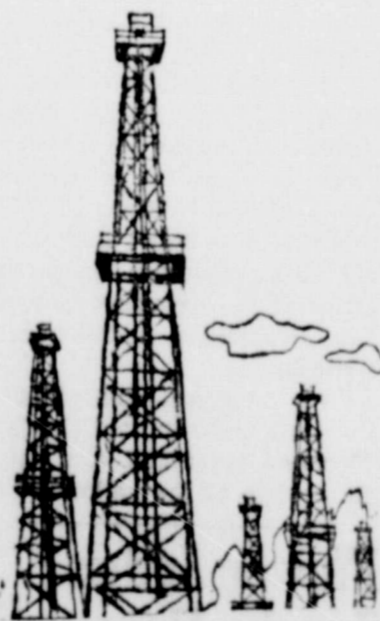

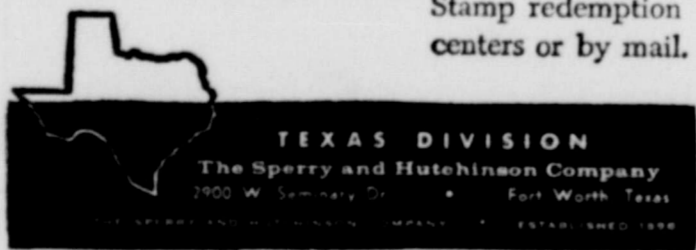

ONE VOTE MAY BE DECIDING VOTE

By Brenda McDorman

In a nation of more than 170 million people, it's easy to get the idea that one person's vote matters very little; however, there have been numerous occasions when a single vote decided an issue.

When the vote on the annexation of Texas as a state was taken in the Senate in 1845, the result was a tie. It fell to the president pro tem of the Senate, Edward A. Hannegan of Indiana, to cast the decisive ballot. He voted to make Texas a state. This event shows the importance of every vote in another way: Hannegan had been elected to the Senate by a one-vote margin of the Indiana state legislature, and one of the members of that legislature had been elected by a single vote!

In early July 1776, when the Continental Congress assembled in Philadelphia to vote on the Declaration of Independence, delegate Caesar Rodney was still at his home near Dover, Delaware. When he received word that his vote was needed to break a tie between the "for" and "opposed" members, Rodney rode horseback on a rainy night for 80 miles, without a stop except to change horses, and dashed into the meeting just in time to cast his all-important vote for the resolution for independence.

In 1868, Andrew Johnson, who had succeeded to the presidency when Lincoln was assassinated, faced a trial for impeachment in the Senate. His political ineptitude and his defiance of public opinion in the North after the Civil

War had brought about charges of "high crimes and misdemeanors in office" (since dismissed by historians as flimsy and false). Senator Grimes of Iowa came to the Senate from a sickbed to cast his vote for acquittal. His vote saved Johnson from conviction.

Senatorial elections in recent years indicate the significance of every vote: In 1944, Senator Robert Taft carried Ohio by less than one vote per precinct. In 1954, Senator Richard Neuberger of Oregon was sent to Washington by the same margin. In 1948, Senator Lyndon Johnson won by a majority of only 87 votes in this huge state of Texas. (In 1948, President Truman carried California and Ohio by less than one vote per precinct, to win re-election to the highest office in the land.)

Election day is coming up November 8, and this election is a mighty big one, too. Besides the presidential race, it includes contests for all the seats in the House of Representatives, one-third of the Senate, and governorships in nearly half the states, in addition to hundreds of local offices. It's in these local elections that every ballot is especially important.

You may not be old enough to vote, but everybody, of every age, has a stake in good government. You can serve your community and your country by reminding all those who are able to participate in the election that if they fail to go to the polls, they're missing an opportunity—for their vote is their voice in democracy.

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Your County Agents Report

Home Demonstration

By CAROLE L. HOOPER

Jacoby, will be working with the basic principles of food and food preparation. These subject matter groups will continue through February. Clothing groups will start

A question I often hear asked is how to get a chicken to go from freezer to broiling rack without thawing — and cook successfully. Food specialists say it's best to thaw first if you are going to broil the chicken. Otherwise, it's difficult to get a brown crust on the pieces. For stewing, cut-up pieces can go into the freezer while still hard-frozen.

For roasting, it's best to thaw completely before cooking. Otherwise, the outside may be over done while the inside is still raw.

All this adds up to the fact that you should get the chicken out of the freezer and into the refrigerator a day ahead to be sure it's completely thawed before cooking. Remember that it is best to allow poultry to thaw in the original package. The skin of an uncovered bird becomes tough and dry when exposed to the air during the thawing process.

There are a number of bulletins on "Spring Flowering Bulbs" for any of you who are interested in getting your bulbs into the ground. They will be in College Station next week at the Annual Agents Conference, but will be back and meet with the clubs the first week in November.

Agriculture News

By STERLING LINDSEY
County Agricultural Agent

The rain was wonderful. I did not have a chance to check amounts recorded over the county before this writing, but apparently beneficial amounts were received in all quarters. Certainly the pastures and small grain fields will derive a needed boost or start from the rain. It can go in a hurry when the soil is as dry as it was prior to the rains, but we can breathe a little easier going into the winter season.

Be on the watch for army worms. They could spring up in the grain fields if the grain comes on as we hope it does. They are similar to cotton boll worms in appearance. They have caused a lot of damage in a large portion of the state. They have damaged fields in Runnels and Coleman Counties. They will build up in Coke County as well. We have them now, but in small numbers.

A very successful demonstration of procedures involved in testing for and vaccinating to prevent brucellosis unraveled at the J. O. Rudd ranch in the Valley View community last Friday. I believe the cattle owners present got a good picture of what to expect when the program gets underway in the county.

When will it start? That question came up repeatedly and still is being asked. The best answer we can give at the moment is probably on Monday or Tuesday, October 24 or 25. One or two crews may possibly work one or two days prior to that, but we do not anticipate their doing so.

Also, there are still numerous questions regarding when a particular operator can expect the worker at his place. I hope I can help you to determine fairly close the date that you will need to be prepared for testing.

First, the county has been divided into four sections for the testing. One or more crews will work in each section when the full force moves over from Tom Green County. The one or two crews in your section will be the one you can keep track of and expect to call on you.

A group of men have agreed to contact the operators in the county — to let them know exactly when to be prepared for the blood sampling and also the vaccinating if that is desired. These men have decided upon an order to follow in most of the county. In area one the order is as follows: J. W. Service, Guy Denman, Jeff Blair,

Nolan Pentecost, Robert Walker, then Bryan Gartman.

Area II will start with Vernon Copeland (plus possibly L. B. White, Walter King and others helping him) followed by J. B. Morrow, Lum Lasswell, F. S. Higginbotham, J. W. Labenske, J. D. Ivey, Frank Keese, F. L. Brunson, D. K. Glenn, J. B. Mackey, J. G. Wilkins and Don Edmiaston.

In area three it will go from J. O. Rudd to Frank Percifull, C. E. Arrott, Claude Ditmore, James Arrott, someone around Tennyson, then James Phillips. Area four will be subdivided, but the schedule so far is Ben Boykin, Paul Coulter and Crowley Harmon. "Twister" McCabe will probably help Ben, James Counts will help Paul Coulter and Connie Millican and J. Q. Counts assist Crowley Harmon.

This schedule should help you to picture the contact plan. If you live in or have cattle in an area on the list of a certain man, then you can tell roughly how much work will be done before you are contacted. The whole program is expected to take four or five weeks to complete in Coke County.

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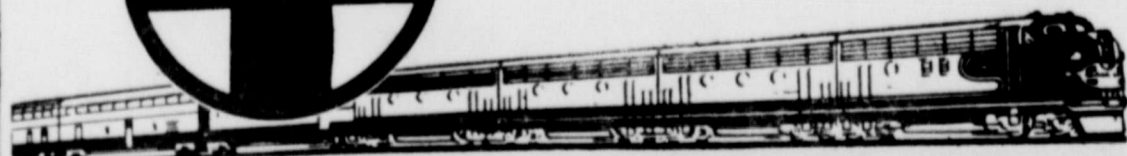

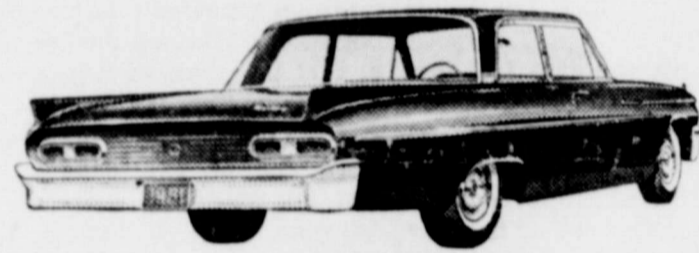

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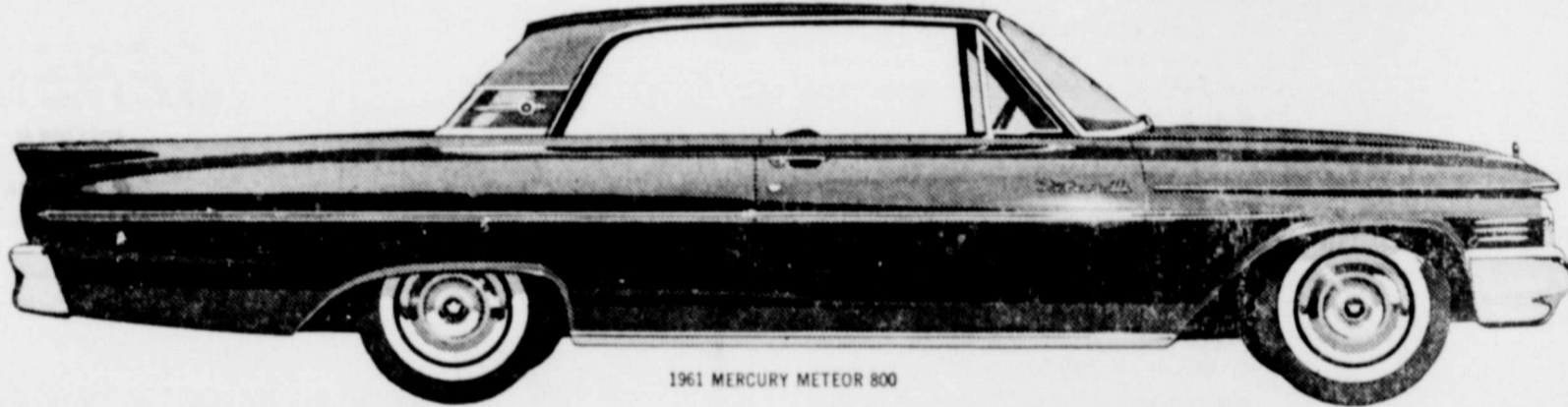
