## Top Texas Officials Urge Election Of Senators Kennedy and Johnson

Three of Texas' top officials — Governor Price Daniel, U. S. Senator Ralph Yarborough, and Attorney General Will Wilson — are urging the election of Senators John Kennedy and Lyndon Johnson, the Democratic nominees for president and vice president. These three, along with other elected state officials and the state's Democratic congressmen, are stumping the state, appearing on television and radio and on news programs.

Daniel says that he has served in the federal government with all of the nominees who are on the tickets this year. "And from personal experience and observation, I believe the Democratic nominees offer the strongest leadership for maintaining the national defense and keeping communism a-

way from our shores. Whatever the Republicans may say about national defense and international affairs the fact remains that Khrushchev has a bosom pal and a communist base in Cuba — 90 miles away from our shores."

The Texas governor says Texas farmers and ranchers have suffered under the Republican farm program and the Republican administration's policy of high interest rates.

"All too often," Daniel says, under Republican policy, there has been more interest in the welfare of the foreign countries than has been shown in the interest of our own domestic economy."

Daniel also scores the Republicans for failure to curb excessive foreign oil imports which made it necessary for Texas to reduce its production to eight days out of 30.

Daniel says: "I shall vote Nov. 8 for the Democratic ticket. And I believe that Texas and the Nation

## Robert Lee Bows To Hermleigh, 20-6

The Robert Lee Steers were defeated Friday night in a 6-B Conference game by the undefeated Hermleigh Cardinals, 20 to 6.

Robert Lee's lone tally came late in the fourth quarter on a hand off by quarterback Richard Sims to halfback John Kinsey who went over left tackle for 3 yards and the touchdown.

Hermleigh received the kick-off in the first quarter and drove 59 yards for the touchdown. James Vernon, 175 pound back, carried the ball over the goal line for the Cardinals first score. Joe Paty carried for the extra points.

Wallace Wall carried 44 yards for the second touchdown for Hermleigh in the second period around right end on a fourth down play. The try for extra points failed.

Hermleigh's last tally came in the fourth quarter on a run of 79 yards around right end by Paty. Again the try for extra point failed.

Robert Lee's Richard Sims completed 10 passes in 19 attempts for 116 yards. He threw 9 passes that were completed before he failed to complete one. Steers that caught Richard's passes were Donny Robertson, Joe Roe, James Blankenship, Curtis Higginbotham and Bill Ledbetter.

The Steers gained a total of 324 yards on the ground and in the air compared to Hermleigh's 271 yards.

Joe Roe, James Blankenship and John Kinsey shared in piling up huge gains against Hermleigh.

Outstanding defenders for Robert Lee were Joe Roe, James Blankenship, Curtis Higginbotham, Pat Lomas, James Harmon, Jerry Craig, Bill Ledbetter, Royce McInturff, Jerry Quisenberry and Donny Robertson.

## Two Oil Rigs Are Drilling Near Robert Lee

Two rigs are drilling for oil near Robert Lee.

Drillers Inc has staked a location on the V. V. Wojtek place about 1 mile north of Robert Lee.

The operator is expected to drill to a depth of 6700 feet. The rig was scheduled to begin drilling Wednesday afternoon.

Maxwell Oil Company is drilling about 10 miles west of Robert Lee on the Thompson place. The rig belongs to West-Tex Drilling Co. of Abilene.

Wednesday morning the operator had drilled to a depth of 5,347 feet. There have been no tests or cores taken at this depth. The rig has reached shale and is drilling about 200 feet every 24 hours.

The operator is expected to drill to a depth of 6,300 feet.

The couple farmed in the Silver locality for a number of years before moving to Robert Lee in 1935. They built their present home at the north city limits in 1941.

Mrs. Walker was a member of the Baptist Church. She was a good friend and neighbor and was loved and admired by everyone.

Surviving are her husband, three daughters and two sons. The children include Mrs. Edna Varnadore of Amarillo, Mrs. Duane (Edith) Conger of Lubbock, Mrs. Bill (Agnes) Hardin of Amarillo, and D. J. Walker Jr. and Ralph Walker of Robert Lee. There are ten grandchildren.

She is also survived by three brothers, W. M. Millican, P. W. Millican and C. C. Millican, all of Robert Lee, and two sisters, Mrs. Lon Linney and Mrs. Henry Burk of San Angelo. Preceding her in death were a sister, Miss Josie Millican, and a brother, Charlie Millican.

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## County Agents News Column

A little moisture can change the complexion of the country side in a hurry. I was driving down the Water Valley road late the other afternoon and the young oats were a pretty sight in the setting sun. The morning before I was up early and saw a couple of fields at sun rise saturated with dew. That was a nice view, too.

Nothing positive has been given us at this writing on the starting of testing for brucellosis in the county. Apparently, the wet weather has delayed completion of the work in Tom Green County. Possibly one or two crews will start here by the time this is off the press. However, since they did not move their headquarters to Coke County during the past weekend, I think it will be Monday, the 31st, before the whole testing unit will be in operation in the county.

The three calves exhibited by 4-H club members at the State Fair captured two ribbons. Kathy Preslar's 950 pound, middle weight angus steer placed sixth in its class. Kathy's steer sold for 34c per pound. Gaylon Pitcock's 930 pound hereford steer placed 18th in the middle weight hereford steer class and brought Gaylon 32.25c per pound. Jo Alice Evans' calf, a middle weight hereford weighing 900 lbs., met with tough luck and was sifted. We were shocked to see her steer cut out because he failed to walk normally. He sold for 25.25c per pound.

Plants of the sorghum family being grazed can cause trouble at this time of the year particularly after frost.

Frost time has not arrived yet, but it probably is not far down the road. Since we have received some moisture to produce some

will be served best by the success of that ticket on Nov. 8."

Attorney General Wilson, who styles himself a "states' rights Democrat," says those who share his philosophy will find their cause best served by the Democratic Party.

Wilson says he has had some experience with the "dominant or ascendant part of the Republican Party — the Dewey-Brownell-Rogers wing of the party."

The attorney general said he was referring to the tidelands case. Wilson said after the Democratic congress approved the tidelands bill, a group in the Republican Party brought suit to take away from Texas its tidelands beyond three miles.

"We won that suit — a Republican suit brought by a Republican administration. They threw everything they had into it and they went all out to take the tidelands away from Texas. But we beat them. . . if we have a Republican administration we will continue to see such things as their efforts to take the tidelands away from us," Wilson says.

Senator Yarborough said he knew Senator Kennedy personally. "I have been right there at his side, side by side on the Senate Labor and Public Welfare committee for over two years.

"I have worked very closely with John F. Kennedy. He's a bril-

liant, brave, decent, honest American, devoted to the high ideals of our country. . . Once more it is time for greatness. I earnestly believe John F. Kennedy has it."

The Texas senator says the Democratic Party's goals for the nation's elder citizens are "meaningful and realistic."

Speaking on another subject dear to him — education, Yarborough said:

"Recognizing that the destiny of the world is being shaped in America's and Russia's classrooms, we know that America must make a stronger educational effort. This means a financial crisis that must be met at all and every level of government capable of helping. This crisis calls for teamwork — teamwork at the local, at the county, at the state and at the federal levels — to get the job done as quickly and as effectively as possible.

"We must build more public schools and college classrooms. We must pay our teachers and our professors better. And at all times, we can and must keep absolute control of our public schools in the hands of local authorities.
