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## Robert Lee Steers Tame Gorillas 12-0

The Robert Lee Steers won their first 6-B conference encounter of the 1960 football season Friday night by defeating the Trent Goats 12 to 0.

Robert Lee's James Blankenship made both touchdowns for the Steers on long runs. He crossed the goal line the first time in the second quarter on a run of 44 yards and the second time in the third quarter when he went through his own left end and scampered 43

yards for the touchdown. Good downfield blocks by teammates gave James the running room he needed to reach pay dirt. Both attempts for extra points failed.

All of Coach John Malone's Steers played the game with determined spirit to win the game. Robert Lee's line opened big holes in Trent's defenses to aid Steer backs to gain 256 yards on the ground.

Defensively, the Steers held Trent to 90 yards on the ground and 121 yards in the air. James Blankenship, Richard Sims and Curtis Higginbotham intercepted 3 Trent passes that stopped Gorilla threats to cross the Robert Lee goal.

Robert Lee gained 256 yards on the ground and 110 yards in the air.

## General Election Set for Tuesday

One of the most hotly contested presidential campaigns in modern history will be climaxed with next Tuesday's General Election.

Who will win, Kennedy or Nixon, the Republicans or the Democrats?

Most everyone admits it will be close in the matter of popular vote, but the electoral vote need not be so tight. As the campaign enters its final few days, both sides are claiming victory.

Coke County is expected to turn out about 1300 voters, and if the local result comes out as it has the last two presidential elections, the Democratic ticket will win by a majority of 150.

In 1952 Stephenson and Sparkman defeated the successful Republican ticket of Eisenhower and Nixon by a vote of 738 to 579 in Coke County.

The election of Nov. 6, 1956, showed a similar trend in Coke with Stephenson and Kefauver polling 690 votes, while 549 were cast for the Eisenhower and Nixon second term.

Bronte and Robert Lee voting boxes combined to favor the Democrats 510 to 292 in the 1952 election and 499 to 270 four years ago. Silver is the Republican stronghold with a 112-60 Republican majority in 1956. Walnut voting box near Water Valley went for Ike 28-1, Sanco 18-9 and Green Mountain 29-18.

About 1,600 ballots were cast in the Democratic primary last May and the voting strength could be close to that figure again this year.

Only the presidential race is drawing attention, although the Republicans have a candidate for U. S. Senator, Governor and other state offices. None of the district or county Democratic candidates are being opposed in the Nov. 8 election.

Texas is regarded as one of the doubtful states, even though Senator Lyndon Johnson is the Democratic candidate for Vice President. Religion is an issue among some voters, and its impact will not be known until the votes are counted.

A. J. Kirkpatrick, one of the co-chairmen for the Kennedy-Johnson campaign, stated he believed the Democrats would again lead in Coke County.

Dissatisfaction is evident among farmers, business men, workers and older people, he said, and they indicate they want a change.

"Senator Lyndon Johnson has been a loyal and good friend to his home state," Kirkpatrick added, "and surely he is a great asset to the Democratic ticket, particularly in his home state, as well as the south and western states."

Kirkpatrick said one of his friends recalled the election of 1928 when Hoover was chosen over Al Smith by a one-sided sweep of the country. "We thought we were doing fine then with so-called Hoover prosperity, but the next year the crash came and we soon were in the most disastrous depression in history."

## Coke Polls Open 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Polls open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. for the General Election next Tuesday, Nov. 8, in Coke County. In large cities the polls open at 7.

Persons should bring their poll tax receipts with them, but you will not be required to state whether you will vote Democratic or Republican.

Voters have the right to scratch any of the candidates on either ticket. However, if you do so it is necessary that you scratch all the names of candidates running for the same office except the one you vote for.

You may vote a straight ticket

for either party by drawing a line down the entire column of the other party tickets.

Each voting precinct has an election judge and an assistant who were appointed early in the year by the Commissioners Court. They will select two additional helpers. Except in the boxes at Robert Lee, Bronte and Silver where double boards will be used.

## Johnson's Acceptance of V. P. Nomination

Anti-Democratic forces in Texas have sought to capitalize upon the widespread disappointment over Senator Johnson's failure to win the Presidential nomination and to turn this disappointment to Republican ends.

They have been trying to foster the ideas that (1) Johnson somehow "betrayed a trust" by accepting the nomination for V. P., and that (2) he will lose effectiveness by leaving the Majority Leader's post for the Vice Presidency. Both ideas are entirely incorrect, as we shall point out.

Anyone who is sincerely interested in getting the maximum benefit for Texas and for the nation from the well-known LBJ influence will support him actively for Vice President on the Kennedy-Johnson ticket. Anyone who does otherwise while pretending friendship is a false friend.

**WHY DID JOHNSON ACCEPT?**  
In order to make his services available to his country at a time when they are needed and in a post where they are needed. As a Democrat and a faithful American, he really had no other choice. Senator Kennedy, after his own nomination, came to Lyndon and said in effect: "We need you. Your country needs you. Your party needs you. I need you. We need your strength. We need your counsel, your advice, your help and experience in the new Administration!"

What else could any good American do? Pick up his marbles like a spoiled child and go home in a huff because he didn't win? To have refused would be to throw away any opportunity to exercise any influence in the new Administration for the things in which he believes, assuming a Democratic victory.

**DIDN'T HE SAY HE WASN'T A CANDIDATE FOR V. P.?** Of course, he said it. And he wasn't a candidate for that nomination. In no way did he seek it. At no time, however, did he say he would refuse to accept it. When this question arose at his press conference at the time he announced his candidacy for the Presidential nomination, he clearly stated to the nationwide television audience that he had never refused to serve his country in any capacity where his services were needed.

For that matter, no candidate for the Presidency has ever acknowledged in advance that he would "settle for" the Vice Presidency. This would be slightly ridiculous. It would be like a man running an ad in the newspaper offering to sell his house for \$20,000 but admitting in the ad that he would probably take \$10,000.

**ISN'T THE MAJORITY LEADER'S OFFICE MORE INFLUEN-**

TIAL? Certainly not. When was it ever considered an office of great or dominant influence before Lyndon Johnson made it so by the force of his own personality. It was the man who made the office, not the other way around. He can and will do the same with the Vice Presidency.

If a Democratic President is elected, the Majority Leadership will become an office of relatively lesser importance than it has been. As Majority Leader in a divided government with a Republican in the White House, Lyndon has actually become the spokesman and the major policy maker for his party. A Senate leader of the same party which controls the White House, however, becomes something of a glorified errand boy, reduced to the mechanical task of carrying out policies made at the other end of Pennsylvania Avenue.

**AS VICE PRESIDENT,** Johnson will have an important voice in the making of major policy for the nation. Kennedy has definitely declared that he expects Lyndon Johnson to be the strongest Vice President in history. He will participate in the Cabinet meetings and will serve as a member of the National Security Council. And anyone who thinks Lyndon cannot run the Senate from the Vice Presidency just doesn't know Lyndon Johnson.

In addition to this, let's remember that the two-term amendment has made a profound change in the office of Vice Presidency. Since any President is now a "lame duck" constitutionally prohibited from succeeding himself after his second term, any Vice President with political savvy can make himself heir apparent for the nomination of his party... just as Nixon did. At the time of the nomination eight years from now, Lyndon will be only 59... still a young man... and very much eligible for the Presidency after eight years in the Vice Presidency added to his present broad and successful experience.

**THE ONLY WAY** the Johnson influence can suffer a loss at this time would be for Texas to fail to support him. If Texas should turn down its native son, the entire state would lose prestige... and Senator Johnson would lose enormously in national influence. If Texas should go Republican, with Johnson on the Democratic ticket, it would be another generation before either party would nominate a Texan, topside or bottom. And it would probably be another generation before Texas would recover the prestige and influence it would have lost.

Texas cannot afford to let this happen.
