DRILLING RIG AT 6,045 FEET

One test was made at a depth of 5,470 feet. The test showed 150 feet of sulphur water and 150 feet of drilling mud.

SILVER REMAINS UNDEFEATED BY WHIPPING COAHOMA 20-16

Coach Don Swinney's Silver Indians had a victorious football season this year by defeating their opponents in 8 clashes.

Silver finished the season Thursday night by beating Coahoma 20 to 16 in an 11 man tilt. Silver had only 12 boys playing football this year and Coahoma had more than 40 players.

Silver's Ramon Kincaid scored in the first quarter on a long end run. He made the two extra points by running through the middle. Lynn White scored in the second period on a 25 yard pass from Kincaid. Kincaid made Silver's final touchdown of the evening in the third quarter on an end run. This score climaxed a drive of 68 yards.

The Indians kept Coahoma scoreless in the first half, but Coahoma's fullback Krause came back fighting with his teammates in the last half by scoring in the third and fourth quarters. Krause converted the 2 extra points after each touchdown that climaxed drives of 62 and 65 yards.

The Robert Lee Steers lost their final game of the 1960 season to Bronte Friday night by a score of 32 to 8.

Robert Lee's Joe Roe made the only Steer touchdown of the evening in the fourth quarter. Richard Sims punched over for the two extra points.

Dee Arrott opened scoring early in the first quarter with an eight-yard burst and Larry Robinson added the extra points for Bronte.

Then Robinson went 65 yards to score and Arrott followed with one from the eight as Bronte racked up a 20-0 first-quarter lead.

In the third period Robinson scored from the four and Arrott's concluding TD in the fourth from 15 yards out made it 32-0.

Robert Lee's touchdown was scored by Joe Roe from the one and quarterback Richard Sims ran over the double conversion.

The Steers had a season record of 5 won and 5 lost under the competent direction of head coach John Malone and assistant coach Jerry Alsup. This is the first year at Robert Lee for the two coaches.

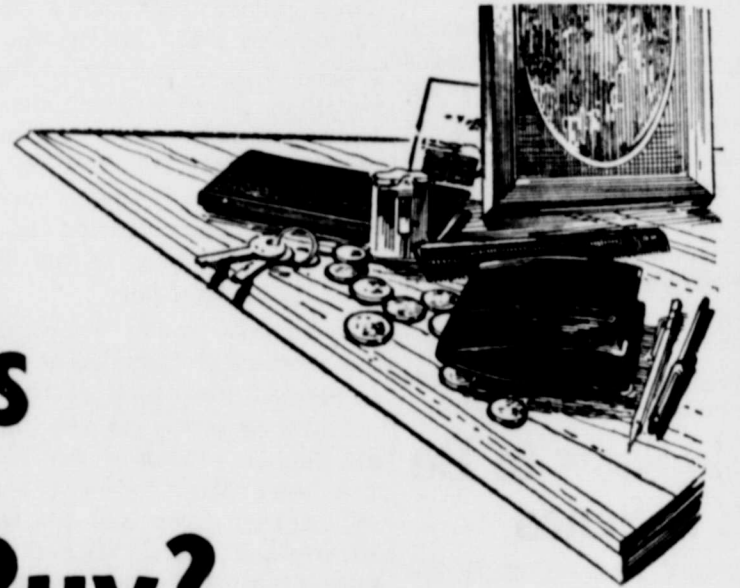

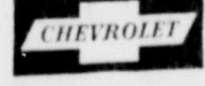

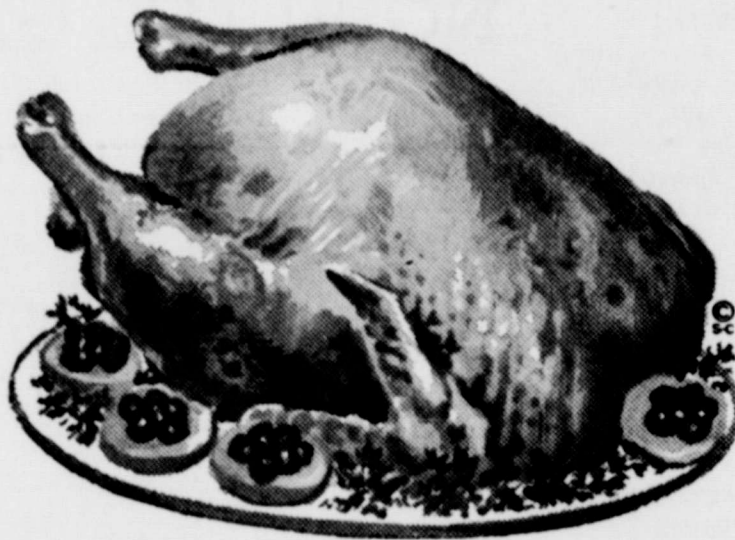
