Coke County Has 606,888 Acres in **Farm Land**

The 1959 Census of Agriculture, conducted in Coke County last fall, counted 337 farms, according Washington 25, D. C. to a preliminary report just issued by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce. Total land in farms was 606.888 acres. The average size of farms was 1,-800.9 acres. The average value of dy session on "Heritage and Horfarms (land and buildings) in the county was \$62,331.

Of the county's farm operators, 179 owned their farms, 87 owned part of the land and rented additional acreage, and 70 were tenant farmers.

The average age of farm operators in the county was 54.6 years. There were 79 farm operators 65 or more years of age.


