## W. C. Blank's Heirs Win Land Decision

Land transactions of more than 40 years ago were reviewed by the Third Court of Civil Appeals Wednesday and it concluded that the heirs of Mary A Green had lost title to 160 acres of ranch and oil land in Coke County long ago.

It seemed clear from the testimony at the trial that the late W. C. Blanks did not buy the 160-acre home place of Mrs. Green from her son, the late William Green, when he bought the rest of the Green Ranch in 1918.

But the jury in Coke County held and the appellate court agreed, that the 54 Green heirs, headed by Garland H. Green, had lost title through limitations because the Blanks estate had been paying

## Judge Denies New Trial in Condemnation Suit

Coke County Judge W. W. Thetford, denied a motion for a new trial in the State of Texas vs. Edward M. Cumble and others in a land condemnation suit at a special hearing Saturday in Robert Lee.

Marvin Seentell, attorney for the State of Texas, entered the plea for a new trial. He has 30 days to appeal the decision to the State Court of Civil Appeals. Earl Smith, a San Angelo attorney, represented Edward M. Cumble and others of Bronte.

In County Court in Robert Lee on September 10 of this year a jury ruled in favor of Edward M. Cumble and granted him \$2,201.09 for damages to his land.

## Robert Holland Leads In Area FFA Quiz

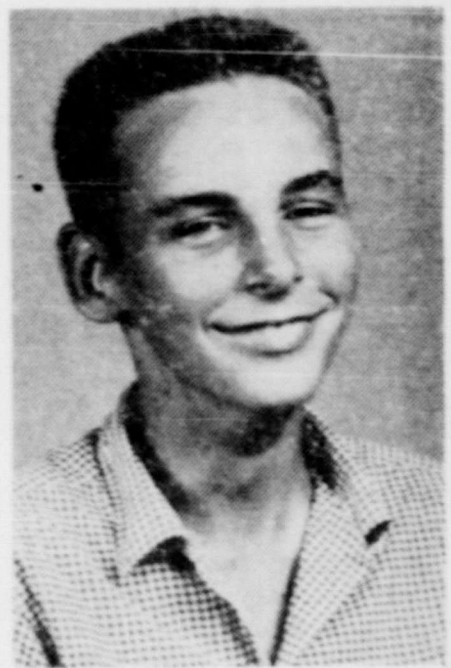

### It May Not Be Deer You're Shootin' At!

Note to hunters: If it stands on its hind legs, and has a pipe in its mouth, it isn't a deer! Remember that the next time you and your friends decide to go deer hunting. It may save someone's life, no matter how silly it may seem to you now.

Deer hunting is the one sport around here that almost everyone takes an interest in. Sometime during the season, almost everyone takes time off from his job and goes with a few of his friends to hunt deer. No matter how fascinating hunting deer may be, it is always good to remember that if you aren't careful with your gun that you may not be around next deer season. Reports show that around 2,600 persons are accidentally killed by firearms each year in this country. The large

number of persons involved in accidents with firearms proves that the utmost care is necessary in handling these dangerous weapons.

Here are some tips on hunting with firearms:

1. A gun should be carried with the muzzle pointing either up or down. One should always keep the safety lock on when carrying a loaded gun.
2. It is better to lay down a loaded gun that to lean it against a tree, fence, or other object, or place it in such a position that it might fall or be knocked over. Guns often go off when jarred suddenly.
3. It is best to avoid taking a loaded gun into a vehicle of any kind, into a building, into a boat, or among a group of people.

4. When it is necessary to climb a fence, put the gun through muzzle first, turn it sidewise and place it on the ground with the muzzle free from the ground — but not pointing up. Then, after climbing the fence, take up the gun. These are only a few of the rules one should observe when handling firearms, but perhaps they will help save someone's life this year if you who read this will carefully observe these rules.

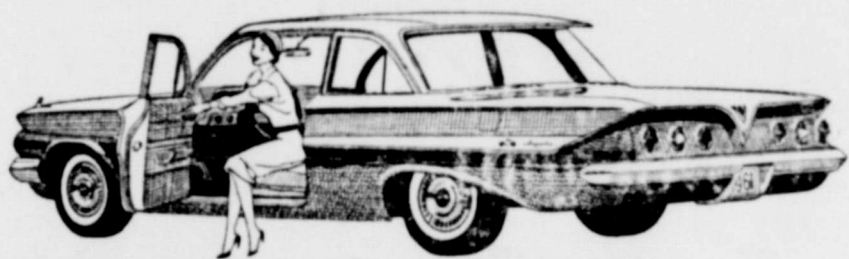

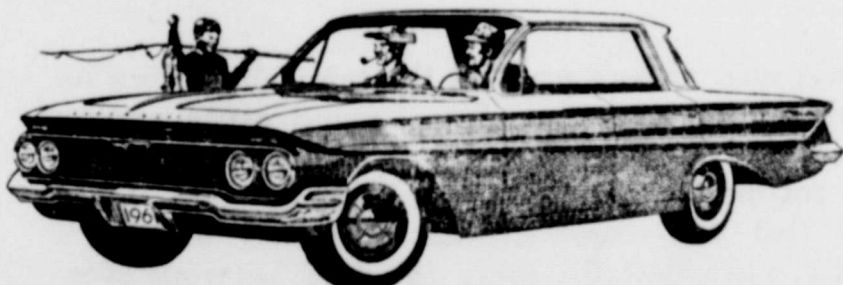

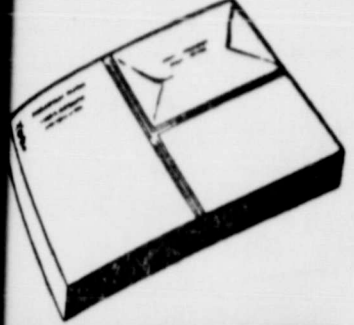

### Agriculture News By STERLING LINDSEY

My pessimism was all for naught — the herd infection rate on cattle herds in Coke County was below the required minimum on the initial test for brucellosis and the county will receive a rating of modified certified brucellosis free for a period of three years. Spot testing, similar to that being done in the Tuberculosis program will be done at intervals to substantiate our rating.

The final count on herds was 340 at this writing. 339 have been tested with 14 containing reactors. Approximately 7200 head of cattle were tested with, to this date, 14 reactors and 44 suspects being found. The total cattle population of the county will be around 8300 when the final figures are in.

There remains some clean up work to be done in the reactor and suspect herds, but it is comforting to know that the infection rate in the county — less than 4% (four tenths of one percent) animal wise was below the minimum allowed.

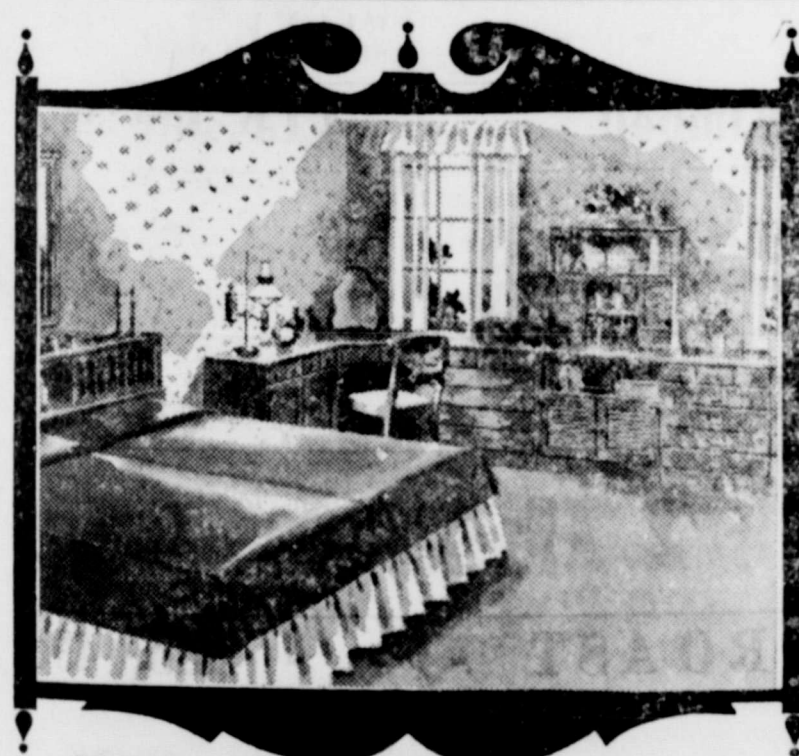
