## COKE COUNTY ADOPTS NEW RATTLESNAKE BOUNTY PROGRAM

The Coke County Commissioners' Court voted Monday at their regular court session to adopt a new program to pay bounty on the killing of rattlesnakes in Coke County during the denning period.

Several petitions have been presented to the Commissioners' Court signed by ranchers in the program on rattlers from snakes killed in Coke County during the denning period be put into effect.

The petitions stated that great loss of livestock occurred in the county due to rattlesnake bite. killed and asked that Coke Coungive a total of 50c per rattler killed to the bounty hunter. The court agreed to this stipulation.



### Rep. Fisher Urged To Vote Against Gasoline Tax

SAN ANGELO, Tex., Congress man O. Clark Fisher has been sent the names of more than 11,500 persons from his district who advocate scheduled expiration next June 30 of the "temporary" 1-cent per gallon federal tax on gasoline. Frank M. Pool, San Angelo, Southwest Texas area chairman of the Oil Information Committee, announced that petitions had been mailed to Rep. Fisher along with a letter asking his support in!

federal levy. (Rep. Fisher said in a statement that he had opposed the last extension of the federal levy, and would oppose any further extension of the tax. He said he felt that gasoline is overtaxed, causing a hardship on the consumer.)

A one-week petition drive that afforded Texas motorists a chance to express their desire on expiration of the 1-cent federal levy and 2552, Hollywood, N. M. cut their gasoline bill nearly \$38 million a year was sponsored last October by the Texas petroleum industry through OIC. Statewide. some 268,725 Texans signed petitions and were joined by 5.5 million motorists nationwide.

Cool to lukewarm.



The ewes fed were selected at random and were maintained separately at least through breeding and lambing. In no case were the flushed or control groups smaller than 100 ewes.

> Response of ewes to feeding varied considerably in lamb crop percentages. Extremes ranged from 9.3 percent fewer lambs among the flushed ewes to 26.7 percent

Feb. 9, 1961 more. Considering all of the tests, the average lamb crop for the flushed ewes was 94.94 percent as compared to 87.43 percent for the non-flushed ewes. The cost of flushing could be offset by weaning approximately six additional lambs per 100 ewes.


