Alsup To Report To North Carolina Team

Jerry Alsup received notice this week from the Cincinnati Reds that he is to report to their Class A Charlotte, North Carolina baseball team on Tuesday, May 23.

Alsup, a left handed pitcher and outfielder, has been on the Cincinnati Club's retired list since 1957. He has played on numerous professional baseball teams which include Shreveport, Lake Charles and the San Angelo Colts.

For the past year he has been assistant football coach, head base-

ball coach and science teacher in the Robert Lee school system. His high school baseball team won the District 8-B championship this year.

Alsup, his wife and young son, plan to leave Robert Lee Saturday for Memphis, Tennessee where his family will probably remain for the remainder of the professional baseball season.

Tuesday of this week, Jerry Alsup, 27, told the Observer that he was pleased to have the opportunity to be "back in a baseball uniform."

When the baseball season is over he is planning to take a coaching and chemistry teaching position with the Frazier High School near Memphis, Tennessee.

County Agents News Column

By STERLING LINDSEY

I have heard this statement made several times in recent years "No place can promise more and produce less or promise less and produce more than Coke County." Right now we are at the "promise less" portion of that statement. I hope, however, that we see the saying borne out to its completion. Maybe it will be wet by the time you read this.

Our field crops committee and our program building committee planned several demonstrations for 1961 — back when the outlook was more promising. Seventeen different crops and other demonstrations were planned. Some have been started, some may have to wait until next year if it stays dry.

Four operators will have cotton

variety totaling 70 acres. Commercial seed companies have provided Melvin Krall, Frank Percifull, R. C. Patterson and Lum Lasswell with certified seed for variety, tests. Paymaster "101", Western Storm proof, Bagley's Storm Tex 157, Texas Planting Seed Assoc., Smooth Leaf No. 6, TPSA Smooth Leaf No. 41, and TPSA Smooth Leaf No. 43 are the varieties to

be planted.

Eight varieties of grain sorghums will be tried in four test plots totaling near 120 acres if we get the moisture. Melvin Krall, Frankie Percifull, Nolan Pentecost, Austin Sandusky and Johnny Rogers will plant the grain sorghum plots. Ranger, Amak R-10, 7078, RS 610, Lindsey 722, Lindsey 744, C-44A, and C-45 are the varieties to be planted.

In addition to the variety tests D. K. Glenn, Robert Walker, Pat Havins and Tom Rives will conduct small chemical brush control demonstrations. These will include basal, stump and foliage application treatment methods.

We have them planned — now all we need is some moisture.

I attended the joint meeting of the Bronte Jr. and Bronte Sr. H. D. Clubs Wednesday at the Methodist Church in Bronte. This was their effort to recognize National Home Demonstration Week. The luncheon was very good and I enjoyed meeting with the women very much; especially since this was my last time to meet with them until September.

The following recipe is one I got at the Prairie Mountain Community in Llano County. Its one of the best pies I've ever eaten, and I do hope you will try it. Incidentally, this community placed first in the Community Improvement Contest.

Pecan Custard Pie

2 cups sugar, 3 tblsp. flour
1 cup milk, 1 cup cream
4 egg yolks, 1 teaspoon butter
1 cup or more pecans, chopped fine

1 teaspoon vanilla
Mix sugar and flour. Add milk and beaten egg yolks and cook until thick. Remove from heat and add vanilla, pecans and butter. Pour into a baked pastry shell.

Juanita O'Conner, the H. D. Agent in Kerr County gave me this recipe for "Fruit Cocktail Cake". It travels well and therefore is excellent for outdoor meals.

Fruit Cocktail Cake

2 cups flour
1½ cups sugar
2 eggs
½ teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons soda
1 No. 303 can fruit cocktail
Mix all the above ingredients. Place in greased floured pan.

Mix ½ cup brown sugar and ½ cup coconut and pour over the batter. Bake 1 hour at 300 degrees F.

Icing

1 stick margarine
1 cup sugar
½ cup pet milk
Boil 2 minutes. Remove from fire and add ½ cup chopped nuts and 1 cup coconut. Pour over cake while hot.
