a second glance

Tom Wiginton, who is engaged in stock farming 1 mile north of Robert Lee, brought a large cluster of dates into the Observer office this week. No, he didn't raise the dates, but he did cut the bunch from a date tree growing near Carrizo Springs this past weekend.

Tom said that he hadn't seen fresh dates before in his life, and he felt that other persons in Robert Lee area probably hadn't seen them in the growing stage. So, he brought them back with him and put the cluster, weighing 15 lbs., on the front counter in The Observer Office.

Evidently Tom was right in his thinking that many persons hadn't seen the fruit in the fresh stage because many persons passing the office have taken a second glance at the object and have come in for further investigation and inquire "what is it?" Tom said that date growers in Carrizo Springs said that it wasn't uncommon for the branches of the date trees to be burdened with clusters weighing 75 pounds.

Two Large Rattlers Killed

Two extremely large rattlesnakes have been reported killed in the area recently.

Bob Fields killed a 5 ft. 3 1/2 inch diamond back rattlesnake on his place a mile from Sterling City. He killed the 6 lb. reptile with a .22 calibre rifle. The rattler measured 8 inches around.

Fields said a mare and her newborn colt were grazing only 50 yards from the place where he killed the deadly snake.

Foy Askins killed a 4 1/2 ft. rattler that measured about 7 inches around Friday evening near the Wyatt Place which is located about 5 miles north of Robert Lee.

Askins discovered the large rattler when he was hunting. He said that he killed it with a stick after the snake crawled under brush.

Jay Files Suit For \$100,000

Sam Jay, et ux filed a suit for damages of \$100,000.00 against the City of Robert Lee in 51st district court Tuesday, August 15. Royal Hart of San Angelo is attorney for the plaintiff.

Parts of the charge stated that the defendant, City of Robert Lee, "through its agents, servants and employees falsely, maliciously and without probable cause appeared before the Grand Jury of Coke County, Texas, and caused said Grand Jury to return an indictment against Virginia Jay for allegedly, unlawfully and fraudulently taking and converting to her own use \$100.50 in money from the City of Robert Lee, Texas while acting in the capacity of City Secretary of the City of Robert Lee, Texas and to issue a warrant for the arrest of said Virginia Jay upon said charge."

Home Demonstration

The state meeting of the Home Demonstration Association was held in San Angelo this week. Coke County delegates for the meeting were Mrs. Dale Wojtek, Mrs. Floyd Harmon and Mrs. Pat Rives. These delegates voted in business sessions and attended workshops on Civil Defense, Family Life, Citizenship, Health and Safety, 4-H and Recreation. A portion of the club meetings for the coming year will be based on material given in these workshops.

The Craft and Food committees for the Home Demonstration Craft Day met last Friday and made final decisions concerning their responsibilities. There will be a family night supper following the day's activities.

4-H Camp is the 15th and 16th at the County Park. I hope all you 4-H girls are planning to come. We will have some mothers on hand for preparing meals, so we will have all kinds of time for crafts, swimming and other recreation.

I've just received a newsletter from the National Cotton Council home economist. In our part of the county we like the idea of wearing cotton the year round since it is so easy to care for. I'd like to tell you some of the things to look for in cotton fashions this year. Apparently, the influence of knitted fashions has been carried into wide-scale woven cotton corduroys designed to simulate the appearance of a knitted cable stitch. New corduroy prints show unusual treatment, with many of them having almost a painted look. Cotton suede is becoming increasingly important in the fashion picture. It takes color beautifully and appears in such varied shades as light olive, bright red, electric blue, gold, and bronze.

Smart for two piece fall suits, dresses and jackets is black cloque pique in a herringbone pattern. Fabrics with heavily accented ribs, such as cotton ottoman and cords, are also good this year among woven cottons. New on the market is a homespun cable, which is actually a cotton woven in a cable pattern simulating a knit. It's especially appropriate for sports separates, as well as classic dresses.

Cotton damask shows up in dressy suits, and cotton tapestry laminated to polyurethane foam is another interesting new fabric.

Doesn't this make you want to rush out and add to your fall wardrobe with new cotton garments? Happy shopping!

Agriculture News

Cotton root rot has hit some of the cotton fields in the County. None of the fields checked had heavy losses, but we have had a year that is conducive to root rot development. If it does increase our chances for a bumper crop will be correspondingly decreased.

As a side note — I have checked in the neighborhood of ten trees in the last month that died with cotton root rot. All but one of these checked were apricot trees. I do not believe that apricots are that sensitive to root rot compared to other trees. I think it was just a coincidence.

I received some interesting figures from the Livestock Reporting Service recently that should boast most Texas ego. Because of the size of our state, the livestock and poultry quotations should be high. But I was surprised to see our state ranked so high among the states (volume wise) in so many categories.

The quotations (all are either the number on farms on January 1, 1961 or for the year 1960 one or the other) are as follows: cattle and calves, first; beef cows, first; calves born, first; sheep and lambs, first; wool production, first; mohair production, first. Also quoted were calves slaughtered, third; cattle slaughtered, fourth; sheep and lambs slaughtered, fourth; farm chickens, sixth; broiler production, sixth; egg production, seventh; and turkeys produced, seventh. Other quotations were milk cows, eleventh; cattle on feed January 1, eleventh; higs and pigs, fifteenth and hogs slaughtered, fifteenth.

As you can see, Texas is important to the nation's output of meat, milk, eggs, wool and mohair, and these products are vital to the economy of our state.

Perhaps of interest to you is the weights or gains of the calves the 4-H Club members have on feed. Ten Club members have on feed 19 steers and eight heifers. The group gained a total of 4030 pounds during the last two weighing periods for a daily group average of 2.18 pounds. Using the calves weight as one guide to determine the approximate weight

to expect by show time, we figure that the group on an average calf will gain about two pounds per day. And it will usually require, over the entire feeding period, about two pounds of feed per each 100 pounds of body weight per day.

Club members feeding calves are Roy Blair, Edith, one shorthorn steer; Jo Alice Evans and Maxie Evans, Sanco, one hereford and one angus steer; James Bird Pentecost, Sanco, three hereford heifers and five hereford steers; Kay and Robert Wink, Graham Valley, four shorthorn steers and two shorthorn heifers; Gaylon and Darrell and Sherry Pitcock, Sanco, two hereford heifers and six hereford steers; Dee Arrott, Tennyson, one hereford heifer and one hereford steer.

We believe they have several fine animals on feed. If you are in the neighborhood of any of these members, drop by and look at their calves. I am sure they would be pleased to show them to you.

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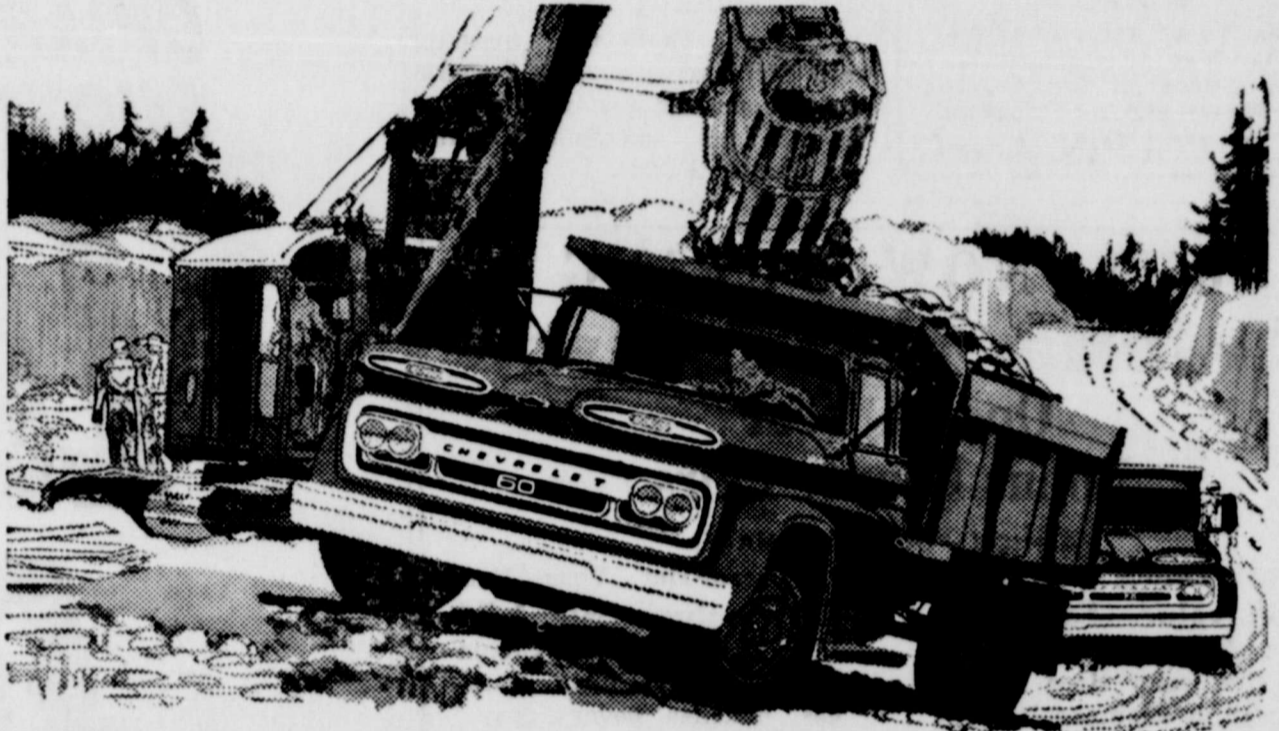

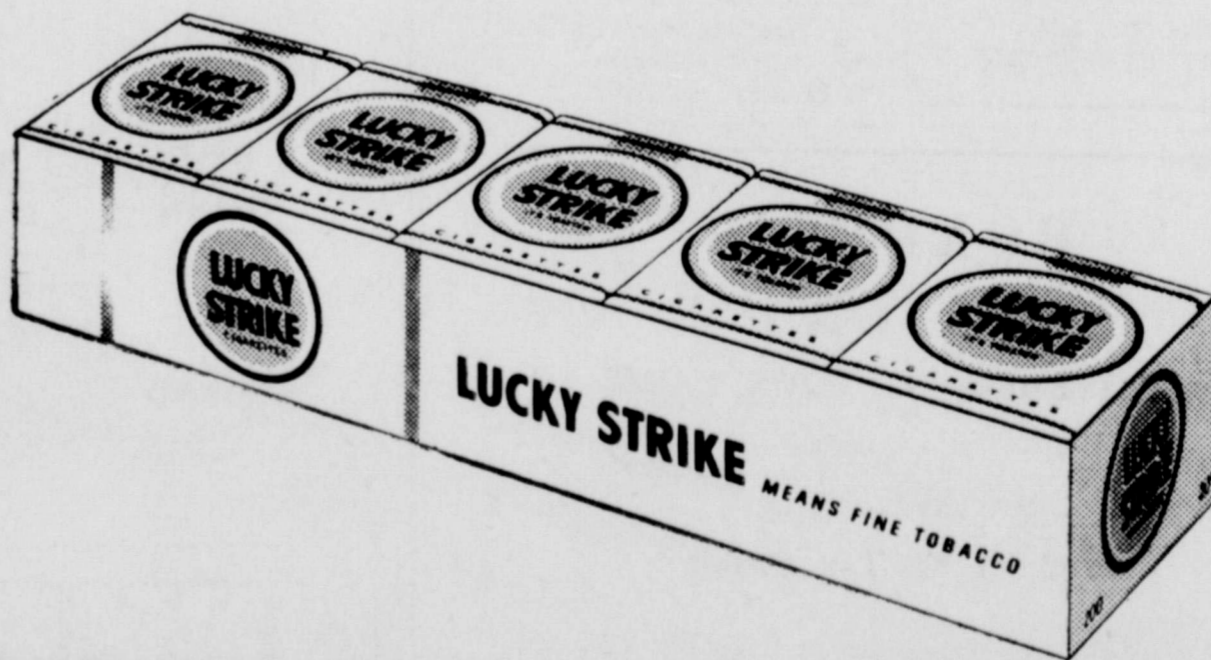

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM STATE CAPITOL

AUSTIN, Tex., Aug. 23—Texas has crossed the great divide of controversy and entered the field of general sales taxation.

To the central collection point for the operation of the state's business, this means some \$320,000,000 in the next two-year period.

To the individual taxpayer, the cost is unknown, but educated guesses already are being made.

James McGrew, research director for the Texas Research League, has estimated it will cost the average Texas family \$25 to \$30 a year, "maybe less if they don't buy any furniture or home appliances."

With some exceptions, the general sales tax will be two per cent on purchases of 25c or more.

Passage of the tax bill and the attending publicity caused many a man — and woman — on the street to suddenly realize that there already was a state sales tax on such things as cosmetics and appliances

Actually, the sales tax bill was only part of the tax package handed down by the lawmakers. In addition to the \$320,000,000 estimated to come from this source, they passed a corporate franchise tax worth \$20,500,000. They increased drivers' license fees by \$7,250,000. They made a bookkeeping transfer of motor fuel tax funds totaling \$4,000,000. They also taxed dedicated gas reserves \$3,330,000. And they passed a bill designed to bring in some \$3,000,000 from abandoned property.

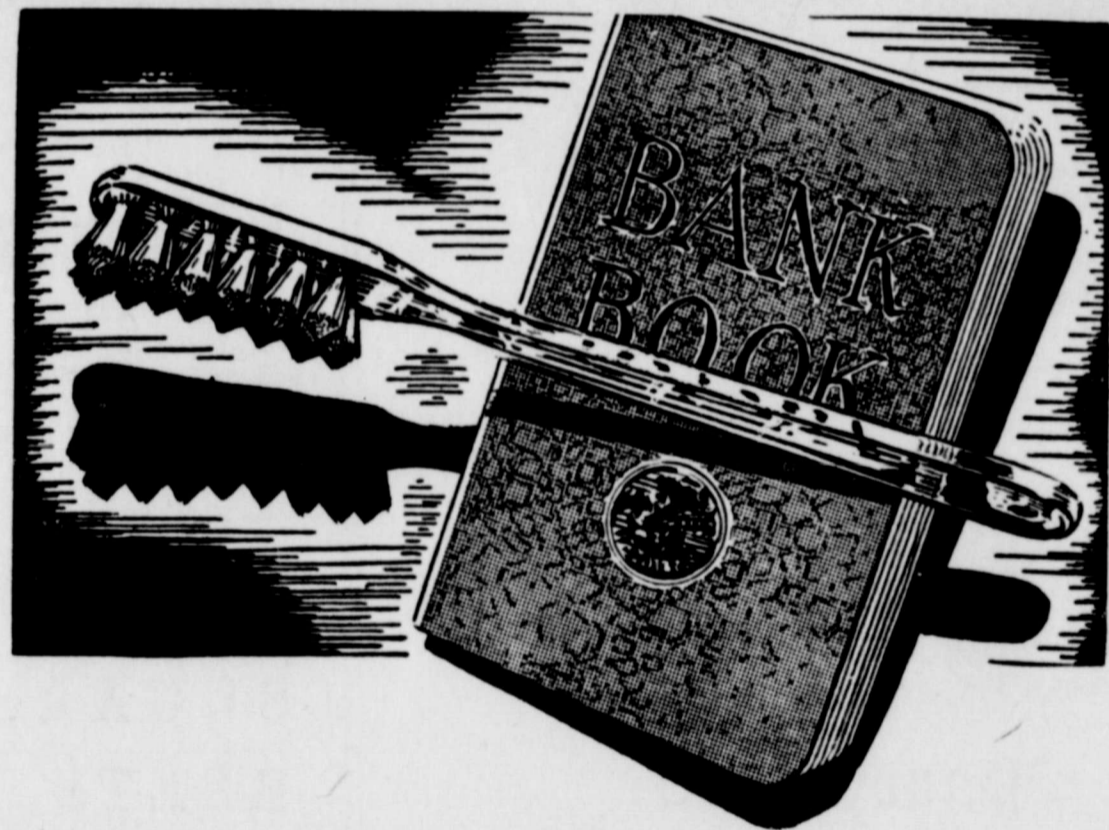
