## Teachers to Get Raise in October

The Robert Lee Independent School District board of trustees elected, upon the recommendation of Superintendent Hervey Latham, to increase the local teachers' salaries beginning October 1 as provided by the recent teacher salary law passed by the Texas Legislature.

According to the new law, school districts had the option of paying the raise of \$810 per year to teachers in a lump sum in March and June of next year or on a monthly basis. The Robert Lee board chose to pay the local teachers' raise monthly beginning October 1.

With the pay raise the annual salary schedule for Robert Lee instructors is the following: beginning teachers with a bachelor degree minimum salary is \$4014. The maximum with a bachelor degree is \$4,662 to \$5,094, depending on experience. The minimum salary for teachers with master's degree is \$4,239 and maximum is \$5,643 to \$6,075 depending on years of experience.

## Over 300 Enrolled In School

On the opening day of school, Monday, 311 enrolled in the Robert Lee public schools, according to superintendent Hervey Latham.

"We expect several more to enroll in the next few days," Latham said. The enrollment this year totals about the same as it did last year.

Enrollment by grades is: first, 25; second, 33; third, 33; fourth, 31; fifth, 22; sixth, 37; seventh, 32; eighth, 22; ninth, 21; tenth, 23; eleventh, 17, and twelfth, 16.

## Jimmy Mathis Quits City Job

Jimmy Mathis has resigned from his position as City Secretary of Robert Lee effective September 15, according to Mayor W. D. McAdams.

Mathis has accepted a similar position at Sunray, a town of nearly 2,000, at a reported salary

of \$6,900 per annum. He was receiving an annual salary of \$3,600 per year here.

McAdams said, "We accepted Mathis's resignation with many regrets. He has performed most satisfactorily as city secretary for the City of Robert Lee, but we certainly do not want to stand in his way to better his position financially."

Mathis is married to the former Jean Varnadore of Robert Lee and they have one daughter, Cathy Jo, 10. Mrs. Mathis is currently employed at the Coke County Tax Office.

He assumed the duties as city secretary here May 6, 1959. Prior to accepting the city position he worked in the Coke County tax office and attended San Angelo Business College. He is 34 years old and is a graduate of Sterling City High School.

The Mathis family has resided in Robert Lee for the past 4 years.

Mathis will report to duty at Sunray on about September 18, but his family will not join him until a house can be found for occupancy.

### MRS. FERRELL HIRED

Mrs. Sid (Betty) Ferrell resigned her position as Robert Lee Independent School District tax assessor collector to accept the position as secretary of the city of Robert Lee.

Mayor McAdams said that the beginning salary for Mrs. Ferrell will be \$3,200 per year.

Prior to accepting the school tax assessor-collector job, Mrs. Ferrell operated an abstract business with her late husband for 10 years. The late Mr. Ferrell is a former mayor of Robert Lee.

### MRS. TRIMBLE GETS TAX JOB

Mrs. Jack (Juanita) Trimble was hired by the Robert Lee Independent School Board as tax assessor-collector for the Robert Lee Independent School District.

Mrs. Trimble and her husband, Jack, have resided in Robert Lee for the past 16 years. They own their home here.

She has attended San Angelo Business College and has been active with her husband as circulation representative for the San Angelo Standard Times for the past several years.

It is reported that the Robert Lee School tax assessor-collector's position pays \$2,400 per annum.

## Mrs. Looney Dies After Long Illness

Mrs. Jack Looney, 36, formerly of Robert Lee, died at 9 a. m. Saturday in John Sealey Hospital in Galveston after a long illness.

Services were held at 2 p. m. Wednesday in Robert Lee Baptist Church with burial in McKenzieville Cemetery under direction of Clift Funeral Home of Robert Lee.



## Two Oil Wells Completed Near Robert Lee

Oil activity has increased considerably around Robert Lee since the discovery, Tucker Drilling Co., Inc. No. 1-A Bird, was finished June 26 for 180.25 barrels of 40.6 gravity oil, no water, through a 16-64 inch choke and perforations between 5,154-247 feet. Drilled to 7,016 feet, it recovered slight shows in the Strawn reef between 6,220-247 feet.

In recent days two more wells have been brought in as producers.

U. S. Smelting, Refining & Mining Co. and J. P. White, et al, No. 1 Burns, wildcat 10 miles southeast of Robert Lee, has recovered more oil from the Pennsylvanian reef.

Latest drillstem test was at 6,666-81 feet, with tool open two hours. Gas surfaced in three minutes, flowing at the rate of 200,000 cubic feet daily. Recovery was 460 feet of oil and 120 feet of oil-cut mud.

Earlier, a test at 6,642-66 feet flowed gas and recovered 635 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud, plus five feet of oil.

No. 1 Burns, slated for 7,200 feet to test the Ellenburger, is in Section 281, Block 2, H&TC Survey.

Sun Oil Co. No. 1-A L. B. Menielle, Strawn reef prospector 8½ miles northwest of Robert Lee, was testing through perforations at 6,218-32 and 6,244-52 feet.

In one hour swabbing returned six barrels of new oil and no water. Four more hours of swab-

bing recovered 4.5 barrels of new oil and nine barrels of salt water.

The operator then acidized the perforations with 1,000 gallons. After two hours of swabbing, it started flowing to pits, and in 12 hours flowed 66 barrels of new oil with no water, through and 18-64 inch choke.

The Allison 1 Smith, 1 mile north of Robert Lee, is reported to

be drilling "tight" the same as the well being drilled on the Mark Chumley place 9 miles southwest of Robert Lee.

Texas fishing licenses cost \$2.15 for residents and non-residents, and are good for both salt and fresh water fishing. No license is required of persons under 17 years or over 65 years of age.

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
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### Visit Caverns

Mrs. Edna Havins and daughter, Jan, of Robert Lee recently were among the record number of visitors making the guided tour 750 feet underground in Carlsbad Caverns National Park in southeastern New Mexico.

In the summer, visitors have the opportunity to see the biggest animal spectacle in any National Park when a quarter million harmless bats fly from the cave's big natural entrance each evening for a night of insect feeding. A naturalist's program precedes the bat flight.

The visitors found the million of years old limestone cavern amazingly beautiful and easily accessible with the finest in daytime visitors' facilities.

Carlsbad Caverns National Park is open every day of the year. At this season, visitors have their choice of eight walk in tours; eight partial tours with elevator service to and from the 750 foot level; and two photographic tours.

## Your County Agents Report

### Home Demonstration

By CAROLE L. HOOPER

I've just received a recipe for frozen peach jam from the extension foods and nutrition specialists of the A & M College of Texas.

It may be a little late for some of you, but I thought you might want to clip it for use next year.

Frozen peach jam is a convenient food to have in the freezer, not only for making sandwiches or for use on toast, but also as a topping on ice cream, puddings and other desserts. This jam has fresh flavor because the peaches are not cooked.

#### Frozen Peach Jam

3 cups crushed peaches (about 2½ lbs.)

5 cups sugar

1 package powdered pectin

1 cup water

Wash and drain the fully ripe peaches, remove pits and skins, and crush.

Measure 3 cups of crushed peaches into a large mixing bowl, add sugar, mix well and let stand for 20 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Dissolve the pectin in the water, bring to a boil, and boil for one minute. Add pectin solution to the fruit and sugar mixture, and stir for two minutes.

Ladle the jam into jelly glasses or into suitable freezer containers, leaving ½ inch space at the top. Cover the containers and let stand for 24 to 48 hours, or until the jam has set. Then cover jam with ½ inch layer of hot paraffin.

This will fill 9 six-ounce glasses. Uncooked peach jam can be stored in the refrigerator for a few months or in the freezer for up to a year. If it is left at room temperature it will mold or ferment in a short time. Once a container is opened the jam should be kept in the refrigerator and used within a few days.

### Agriculture News

The Sheep and Wool Production meeting held in the County Courtroom on Monday, Aug. 28, was attended by approximately 30 individuals from the area. I believe the four men on the program did an excellent job of presenting information of value to the sheep producer.

Jim Gray, Extension Service sheep and wool, goat and mohair specialist, presented his portion of the program on sheep selection in a manner easily understood or seen by those present. George Taylor, a San Angelo warehouseman, was equally efficient in telling the group little things that could help a sheep producer to place in the hands of the warehouseman a more saleable package. I think a fitting comment that came with his discussion was the following, "If you have a first class wool clip, treat it as such; if your clip is second hand, treat it like a second hand clip." No one wants to lessen the value in one day what took six months or a year to produce—not intentionally. But we often reduce the appearance of our wool without realizing it.

Dr. Koberg, the well known veterinarian from San Angelo, had a few choice words and answered numerous questions on sheep insects and diseases common to our area. And here again an interesting sideline comment as produced. Jim Gray, sheep specialist, stated that he can show us pastures in the Boerne area where stomach worms can be very destructive, where the operators never drench. He stated that they hold down the worm numbers, or not damaged to the point of needing to drench by two practices — holding the stocking rate down and by rotating pastures every 30-35 days.

In all, the meeting produced numerous bits of information that were applicable to our area.

A few more cotton dusters and sprayers went into use last week as efforts were made to protect cotton crops from the ravages of the cotton bollworm and boll-weevil. Only one serious buildup was found but progressive buildups of weevils were noted in all areas of the county. If you plan to institute control measures if they become necessary, I would make one or more square counts weekly in order to avoid any slip ups. Following the recent shower and because the corn fields are drying up, the bollworm may buildup in some fields. The boll-weevil has been building up all season and could do extensive damage before cotton matures. Presently the weevil is primarily laying eggs in the squares but they have invaded the bolls in some of the older cotton that has very few squares on top or on the terminals and in the fields heavily infested.

From now on, the decision to control or not to control insects bears greater importance than it did earlier in the season. A number of factors must be taken into consideration before control measures are recommended, such as moisture available, egg counts, stage of growth of the cotton, cotton set on the plants and amount of damage being done. Check your cotton, consider the above factors, then make the decision according to the findings on your field.



## Monday Is a Legal Holiday

The Robert Lee Independent schools, Robert Lee City Offices, Coke County Offices, Robert Lee State Bank and most business firms will observe Monday, September 4, as a legal holiday by closing their doors for the day.

Law enforcement officers throughout the state and nation urge all motorists and other persons to exercise great caution during the long holiday weekend in order to keep down the accident toll.

### HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM THE STATE CAPITAL

By VERN SANFORD

AUSTIN, Tex. — Gov. Price Daniel, pointing to the record of most other states that have a general sales tax, warns Texans that without concerted efforts to shave state spending the Texas tax could grow to three or four per cent in the future.

More than that, he said, unless there is "prudent economy and reorganization of state funds and services," a state income tax might become law.

To make his point, Governor Daniel reported that two-thirds of the 34 states that have general sales taxes have increased the rate to three per cent or more, and there are now four states charging a four per cent sales tax.

He again made clear his dislike for the two per cent Texas tax, but added:

"So much for the good and bad which will result from the new tax bill. On September 1 it will be the law of our state, and as long as the law is in effect, it behooves all of us, whether we like it or not, to cooperate in its enforcement. This I shall do, and I believe every good citizen will do likewise."

Meanwhile State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert is being swamped with questions about the new tax. After checking with other states which have pioneered in this field, he has become reconciled to the likelihood that confusion will reign for some time to come. A spokesman for his office pointed out that "California and Illinois got a sales tax in 1933, and they're still issuing rulings."

The Texas Research League has noted that the tax bill exempts sales of animals ordinarily eaten by humans. Also feed for such animals. Exempt too are seeds and plants edible by humans and raised for sale, fungicides and insecticides for such plants, and fertilizer used on lands where such food is grown.

But the researchers say this exemption would not apply to tropical fish, grass seed and fertilizer for lawns and rose bushes.

MORE WORK FOR NEXT SESSION — Governor Daniel has found several more items to be submitted to the next special session of the Legislature. He plans to call the lawmakers back to Austin again before the end of the year.

Daniel's expanding package now includes maintenance funds for farm roads, loan shark control, municipal annexation, tourist attraction, lobbyist controls, adding banks to the abandoned property seizure law, improved law enforcement measures and action on juvenile crime.

"As long as Texas continues to grow," he said, "there will be more problems to solve, but there are some which should not be delayed. It will be my aim to meet the most urgent of these later this year or in January of next year."

Governor Daniel vetoed the second year appropriation of \$15,000,000 for construction of new farm-to-market roads, in an effort to free these funds for maintenance. The \$15,000,000 for this purpose for the first year of the new biennium was not affected.
