Driver of the huge tank-trailer truck, E. C. Matthews, about 40, of San Angelo, was not injured.

Investigators at the accident scene said Matthews, a driver for Three Rivers Oil Co. of San Angelo, was driving on a slight curve from State Highway 208 onto State Highway 158 at the Y intersection on the edge of Robert Lee.

The Plymouth, driven by Whitfield, was rounding the curve from Highway 158 onto Highway 208. A witness to the accident said Whitfield muttered moments after the accident that his brakes had gone out and he had to hug the inside part of the curve.

The car and the truck met nearly headon in the truck's lane. Matthews had applied his brakes and was pulling to the side of the highway when the car and truck crashed together, investigators said. The car spun in the highway and slammed back into the truck tractor after the initial im-
