City Clean-Up Week Now In Full Progress

The city wide clean-up week in Robert Lee is still in progress and will continue through Friday of this week.

Pete Davis, local fire marshal, has authorized The Observer to publish a notice in this week's paper which warns the residents of the city that the property owners will receive a citation if the property isn't properly cleaned of rubbish, weeds, and other fire hazards.

The City of Robert Lee, The B. C. D. and the merchants of the

town are cooperating in this important project.

A truck will be available for persons who do not have the means of having trash hauled to the dump ground. Citizens who need this service are asked to call the City Hall and ask for the truck to come to their property during the day Friday.

All residents who plan to use the service of the truck are asked to place trash in sacks, boxes or barrels and place the containers near the alley that is adjacent to their property.

The clean-up campaign, if successful, will serve two purposes: (1) make the city of Robert Lee more attractive and (2) reduce the danger of fire during the month of March which is notorious for high winds.

Petitions Draft City Candidates

Two separate petitions were circulated just prior to the deadline for filing for Robert Lee City Commission positions here Saturday.

The second petition that was signed by interested legal Robert Lee voters had J. O. Rudd as candidate for mayor, Vaughan Davis and F. C. Clark for commissioners.

J. O. Rudd, a well known Coke County ranchman, requested that his name be removed from the ballot. He told the Observer that it was impossible for him to serve the citizens of Robert Lee in this capacity.

Robert Vaughan owns the local Chevrolet Dealership. He owns his home in Robert Lee and has served on the Coke County Park Board and is a past president of the Robert Lee Board of Community Development.

Davis is engaged in the butane and grocery business. He owns his home in Robert Lee and is a graduate of Robert Lee High School. He is a past president of the Silver Lions Club.

Quisenberry is engaged in the cashed hen business and is the manager of the U. S. A. C. C. office. He has a daughter in Robert Lee High School and a son attending Texas A & M.

Clark is a longtime resident of Robert Lee and has recently retired from the service station business. He has served on the city commission in past years. Mr. Clark and his wife live in the own home in Robert Lee.

The election for city officials will be held Tuesday, April 3, Robert Lee City Hall Building.

Spacing Rule Reason for Plugging Well

The spacing regulation in a new I. A. B. Northeast (Sanco) field has ruled by the Texas Railroad Commission is the reason the operator of the Tucker No. 1 Adkins has been temporarily plugged. The Railroad Commission has ruled that the new well will be plugged on 80 acre spacing.

There are two Adkins oil wells on 40 acre spacing and the Tucker No. 1 Adkins is producing 142 barrels of oil per day on 80 acre spacing as compared to 72 barrels per day from the Tucker No. 2 Adkins.

He is scheduled to leave his present station at Fort Huachuac, Arizona March 10.

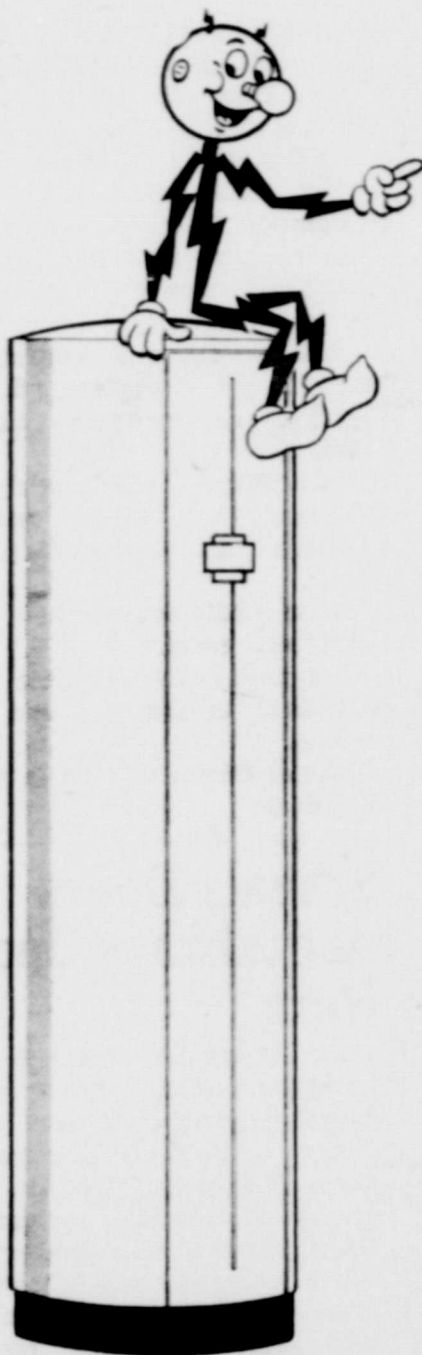
