## School Teachers Are Architects of Future, Kay Says

C. L. Kay, well known writer-speaker, at a joint meeting of Coke County Texas State Teachers Association and the Robert Lee P. T. A. unit, said that the teachers of the United States should shoulder their part of the responsibility in and out of the classroom as architects of the future. He urged them not to dodge their responsibility.

In a rapid fire speech for 1½ hours with the use of visual aids he told of the history and the growth of communism in Europe, Asia and South America.

He said that everyone must take his part of the responsibility to keep America free by working, saving and having the proper attitude toward his neighbor and co-workers.

"You cannot blame others, or leave the job of keeping the United States free to others, because if you do, we will lose our freedom," Kay said.

## Steers Win 2nd In Grandfalls Meet

Coach Garland Davis's Robert Lee High School track team participated with 15 other high school teams in gale force winds Saturday at Grandfalls that netted the locals 2nd place in the Gusher Relays with 97 1/5 points.

The Steers garnered 4 1st places, 5 second places, 2 fourth places and 2 fifth places in the field and track meet.

Curtis Higginbotham, a senior, and Derwood Coalson, sophomore, broke the Gusher Relays time in the 100 yard dash and the high hurdles events, but the times will not go into the record books because the wind was blowing a greater speed than the officials allow for the record.

The team of Curtis Higginbotham, Phil Lowder, Bill Ledbetter and Derwood Coalson won first in the 440 yard relay with a time of 46.9.

Don Ellis, a junior, won first place in the 880 yard run with a time of 2:12.1.

Derwood Coalson bagged first place in the 120 yard high hurdles event with a time of 15.7.

Phil Lowder, Steer junior sprinter, copped 1st place in the 220 yard dash with a time 23.9.

Higginbotham won second place in the 100 yard dash with a time of 10.0. He ran the 100 yard dash in the preliminaries in 9.8 seconds. He also tied for second place in the high jump with a leap of 5'4 inches.

Bill Ledbetter, a senior, tied for second place in the pole vault event with 10 ft.

Derwood Coalson placed second in the 180 yard low hurdles with a time of 20.5.

Lowder was 4th in the 100 yard dash with 10.2.

Ledbetter was fifth in the 180 yard low hurdles with a time of 21.6.

Don Hester paced the 440 yard dash in 59.8 and won 5th place in this event.

Running the miles relay in 3:57.6 for 4th place were Hester, Ellis, Joe Roe and Dwain Walker.

The high school team will participate in the San Angelo relays this Friday and Saturday, March 30-31.

## Sheriff's Office Issues Caution

According to a report made to Coke County Sheriff Melvin Childress, a middle aged man representing himself as a photographer from an Odessa photography studio has approached some of the local high school girls to pose for him in bathing suits at the river and other secluded areas.

Sheriff Childress said that the man makes the following statement to the girls, "You look just like a model that used to work for me."

The sheriff asks parents and students to please report any such incident to the sheriff's department in the event that a person or persons make similar attempt to lure the student to any secluded area. The sheriff said "please use all caution in making the report so that the person will not become suspicious and leave the scene before law enforcement officers can apprehend the person."

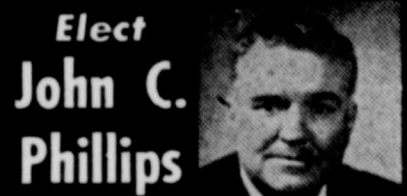

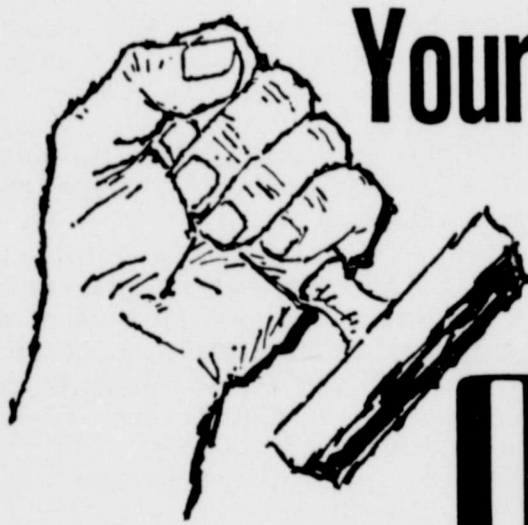

### Home Demonstration

So many people have been asking me how to better manage their time and energy. As most of you know, time and energy are two of your most valuable resources. ### Agriculture News

Despite the bad "duster" last Saturday most operators' faith has not been shaken. Some have started shearing, some are preparing land hoping the desired moisture will be there when planting time arrives. Still others are creep feeding lambs and calves, hoping the pastures will improve to finish what they started. And some are at the point where they are deciding what variety to plant, how much and whether or not fertilizer would be a paying addition. We are in a period when many decisions are being made, but I do not think the undesirable weather has caused anyone to waiver. We just hope the next front through is wet.

What to plant as a temporary summer pasture is another question being pondered at this time of the year. Sudan, sweet sudan and hegari are the old stand-bys—all are still hard to beat. Each has its advantages, causing a certain operator to choose one over the other or to plant some of both.

Sudan-Johnson grass and Johnson grass-sorghum are also in the running now. They make enormous yields under ideal conditions. More of these will be on the market and tried during the next few years. We might add that best results, for grazing have been obtained where thick stands of the above hybrids have been planted. The stalks are smaller and shorter, and livestock tend to

consume more of the stalk.

Along this line, if you have an alkaline area that causes sudan or milo to turn yellow and make very little growth, you might try pearl millet. It has been recommended for such areas.

The Texas Animal Health Commission, as one of its control measures, has established an inspection line in South Texas. The line runs from the Gulf of Mexico through Bay City, El Campo, Altair, Columbus, across to New Braunfels, Hondo, Sabin, Uvalde, to Del Rio. If you anticipate buying any stock south of that line, they must be inspected before they can be moved back into this area. The arrangement that appears to be the most satisfactory is to have the animals inspected as they are being loaded for shipment.

According to a report received recently, the percentage of ewes in Texas lambing prior to March 1 is up 3 per cent from last year and the corresponding lamb crop is up 11 per cent. This could have some bearing on the early summer market situation depending on what the weather does in West Texas.

Philippines (FHTNC) — Marine Cpl. Frank D. Casey, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Casey of Robert Lee, Tex., is serving with the Second Battalion, Third Regiment, Third Marine Division, a unit taking part in the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization's Exercise Tulungan, sponsored jointly by the Republic of the Philippines and the United States, from March 2 through April 2.

The exercise, whose name means mutual assistance, is the 20th undertaken by SEATO nations and the first in the 1962 series. It simulates a situation in which a member nation seeks assistance from SEATO to combat aggression committed against it. Troop embarkation, assembly and movement of forces and amphibious landings by "vertical envelopment" helicopters and beach assault are features of the exercise.

Aside from observers from eight member nations, Tulungan is using some 30,000 men and 60 ships from the U. S. Navy, Marine Corps and Air Force; Philippine Navy and Army, and the Royal Australian Air Force.
