## Your County Agents Report

### Home Demonstration

One of the nicest meetings I've attended recently was the one held Thursday when the Robert Lee Home Demonstration Club entertained Green Mt. The tables were decorated so cleverly with figures made from fruit and vegetables. A salad luncheon was served following the club meeting. These young homemakers really do a great job of all undertakings. My hat is off to them!

We are still accepting registration fees or tuition for the Hat Making School. It is only a few days off as it is to begin at 8 next Monday morning — May 21. If you care to attend please come by the office and see us by Thursday, May 17. I feel you are going to miss a treat and a chance to learn something you can use from now on if you do not attend this school. It is a rare occasion for a professional.

A new shipment of those dish cloths has just arrived in the office. If you ever use one you will want more. They are very reasonable in price. The Home Demonstration Council keeps them as a convenience and they realize a small profit from each sale. They last a long time and are pretty. They come in red, yellow, blue and green. Hope you will try them sometime.

A completely new product in the home sewing field, Nylex is basically a nylon fiber and is bonded together with a synthetic resin in an unusual construction that retains all the strength and durability of nylon. It eliminates all the stretch, pucker and tangling that women associated with nylon. I am going to give you one of my favorite recipes this week. These pies can be kept 3 months in the home freezer. They are delicious as a dessert or a refreshment for any time of the day.

#### Ice cream pie with cocoanut crust (10 inch pie)

2 tablespoons soft margarine  
1 can cocoanut  
Coat pie tin or glass pie plate with softened margarine, pat cocoanut into margarine to completely line the pan, sides and bottom. Bake at 275 degrees until cocoanut is crisp and golden brown. Cool thoroughly. (1 can of cocoanut will make two 9-inch shells).

Soften neapolitan ice cream or mellorine of your favorite flavors of either and use as many flavors as desired. Dip into cocoanut crust distributing the flavors so each slice will contain some of several flavors. Smooth cream carefully and pack so pie will be uniform. Top with sherbert — use your favorite flavor or choose according to color desired.

Freeze until firm and then wrap in freezer bag or put into plastic bags, label and return to freezer. Slice as any pie and serve immediately.

### Agriculture News

I received during the past three days reports on six worm cases submitted for identification. Three of the six were identified as screwworms, three as non-screwworm cases. Two of the three screwworm samplers were sent in by one operator, Turney Sparks. The third case came from March Ranch. The non-screwworm samples came from Marvin Simpson, Jr., Joe Rawlings, and W. E. Burns.

I made spot checks for pecan nut casebearers in five locations Monday morning, two in Robert Lee, two in Bronte and the trees in the courtyard. Basing my estimate on what I found in the five locations, we are from eight to 15 days away from the optimum time for spraying. If you desire to spray twice, I would spray first on about the 22nd and again about the 28th of the month. But I wish to qualify these estimates by adding that further checking will be necessary to pin point more accurately the optimum time to spray.

I found 11 twigs in which the casebearer had made his appearance. Of these, eight were empty — he had already emerged or had been killed by some other insect. Two of the eleven had casebearer in the pupae stage, the other one was still in the larvae stage and feeding in the limb.

Since the majority of the pupae samples found have matured into the moth stage, we can expect to find eggs on the nuts in the

very near future. Normally, the nuts are punctured from 6-8 days after the eggs are laid.

More inspections will be necessary to pin point the insect in specific tress because of his variations in hatching. Look for a pearly white egg on the blossom end of the nut or one side of the nut next to the blossom. When the egg hatches and the larvae begins to feed, you can see a brown frass at the base of the nuts where he tunnels in.

Several insecticides are recommended as controls for casebearer, DDT, Malathion Texephene and Nicotine Sulfate are four most common ones in use. DDT and Taxaphene will give you the longest residual effect. If you have lice on your trees, Malathion and Taxaphene will control both insects.

Rosette is common in trees in this area. It is good practice to mix Zinc sulfate in with your casebearer spray to control rosette.

The following spray mixtures have been used to control casebearers. DDT, 50% wettable powder — one tablespoon per gallon of water. Malathion, 25% wettable powder — one tablespoon per gallon of water. Taxaphene, 40% wettable powder — one tablespoon per gallon of water. Nicotine Sulphate — one tablespoon to 3 gallons of water.

Rosette can be controlled by adding one tablespoon of 36% zinc sulfate to each gallon of water. In extreme cases more than one application will be necessary to control rosette.
