Men and Water

(An Observer Editorial by the Publisher on Independence Day)

This newspaper would encourage support of any program that is sound financially to get more water to more homes and yards and gardens in Robert Lee.

At the same time we just as definitely would favor any reasonable project for impounding anywhere in Coke County water for domestic, farm, ranch, municipal, and industrial use.

This is a use of tax money that will pay its own way by making a better ability to pay taxes in the future. Deserts are taxed very lightly as a rule. But they do not support families or give advantages to many boys and girls. Neither do they bring in very much income or income tax. They may be wide, wonderful scenery.

But the young folk whose homelands become dry and deserted have to go away some other place to live, no matter how much they love their homelands.

Ideas as to just what to do and how to go about it will vary. These matters often have to be discussed, debated, decided. That is all a part of our country's way.

But water is basic, and must always be.

At the same time and by the same token, all know that when boys and girls are wasted, then every other resource wastes away with them.

If soil and water and roads and schools are to have any value or meaning tomorrow, that meaning must first be found in the mind and the heart and the spirit of the men and the women of tomorrow.

Independence Day, the Constitution, the Bill of Rights, the law of the land have no self-preserving power. They are perpetuated and given effect only as some boy or girl discovers their meanings.

Young folk learn from teaching and they learn from preaching, but they also gain much that means the most to them from the companionship of those who teach and those who preach, or of others in whom they place their loyalty and love.

This companionship comes first and most naturally in those things that youth enjoy most, just as it comes natural when all is well for a lamb to leap and play. But that lamb soon loses its joy if it discovers its mother is not willing to linger nearby.

No finer human thing can come to a man than the love and confidence of a boy. No greater earthly contribution can he make than to keep faith with that love and that confidence.

Some Improvement In Finances of the City Government

Financial outlook of the City of Robert Lee for the future looks somewhat better, according to Mayor Robert Vaughan, particularly if water use runs high this summer.

The annual financial report as reflected in the annual audit appears in this week's issue on another page.

Total assets other than delinquent taxes are shown to be \$316,386.94, with a bonded indebtedness of \$47,500. The contract agreement with the Upper Colorado River Authority on Mountain Creek Reservoir and spillway totaled \$145,772.01.

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
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Lions Elect International President





Water sales amounted to \$21,348.14.

A close reading of the annual statement will show that by far the city's biggest income is from water, by far its greatest expenditure is for water, and by far its greatest indebtedness is for water.

The debts are in the main for the city lake, and spillway, the water tower, mains, pumping, and filtering system.

Water revenue is the basis for repaying these obligations or adding improvements to existing facilities.
