"Lord, we thank thee that everything is as well with us as what it is."

That might come right after singing "Through many dangers, toils, and snares, I have already come." That was no exaggeration, either.

Maybe we ought to go back once in awhile and pray that same prayer over again.

Your editor has seen two world-wide wars come and go, and watched the world teeter on the brink of another. He has seen some of the agonies of war and then watched the spring wheat spreading its healing green over the scars fresh torn on the fields in Normandy, Luxembourg, Germany, and Belgium.

He has camped in the dew-damp woodlands with men in bivouac to pray on a quiet Sunday in Bavaria, where the hymns of hate had echoed not long before, while the young men of that German country and that generation waited the time when they would go back home to a war shattered land.

And part of the sentiment of that prayer was, "Lord, we thank thee that everything is as well with us as what it is."

Then he came back home to a land where the smoke of war had never been seen, the thunder of guns never heard just over the hill, where no planes had limped back torn by 88's and no children were running like packs of hungry animals to pick up a scrap of bread that might have fallen along the road.

Steers End Season With 24-6 Win Here

It was the first time for the Steers to make more than one touchdown against the Longhorns since 1957, which was the last victory of the locals over the Bronte eleven until last week.

In a fast game marked by thrilling runs and straight football, the Robert Lee Steers had to earn every foot of ground and every score they made when they met a Bronte Longhorn squad that came plunging with all they had Friday night here on Griffith Field.

Out of a score of 24 to 6 in favor of the Steers, neither side was ever able to buck over an extra point in the 5 touchdowns against the other's line, and the underdog Longhorns never ceased to be a threat.

Robert Lee kicked off, and the ball was returned around left to the Longhorn 32 yard line. After making 1st down on their 43, the Longhorns stuck, and their pass

All four touchdowns were with Gary Sam Williams carrying the ball, Randy Hall receiving passes for two of the extra pointers.

Buddy Vosburg tallied the other extra counters, receiving a pass from Williams.

The first touchdown was on a run of 70 yards, the second on a 1 yard quarterback sneak, the third a run for 80 yards, and the fourth on another 1 yard quarterback sneak.

Coach Garland Davis cited Larry Bell, Glenn Roach, and Gaylon Pitcock for some outstanding defensive work, and for extra good offensive blocking Edward White and Buddy Thomas, although, as usual, the whole squad was in there doing their job.

Robert Lee fumbled and recovered on a drive to the 18 yard line, and on the next play Hallmark was around left end for 18 yard run and a touchdown. But Malcom Johnson for the Longhorns, with several of his teammates stopped Dodson's try for points.

where cities had stood, where its people had not been herded like sheep to be slaughtered, where the grim walls of that grim Asiatic hatred had not penetrated across its borders.

Its railroads did not lie as twisted bands of steel and its ships did not lie sunken in its rivers as those in the Rhine.

The Japanese had not landed an army on our west coast, and no Nazi guards stood in our court rooms. These was still trial by jury and elected officials in our court house.

If we did not say it, we felt it.

"Lord, we thank thee that everything is as well with us as what it is."

Now on this Thanksgiving we have all kinds of fears and concerns, and well may we have them. We have fearsome problems like the Atlantic in storm, mountain high.

We have misgivings and concerns about which way will toss the ship of state, and how it will fare on the next high wave.

But those who rest out on that hillside now had their storms, too. They wrestled with the hard soil when even bread was hard to come by, and they heard the north wind whistling through the cracks in boxed and stripped houses.

Let us be alert to all the dangers that we may avoid or meet and overcome them. We cannot afford to fail in the eternal vigilance that is the price of liberty.

But we might do well, too, this Thanksgiving time to make a short pilgrimage. Out there where the evergreens grow, tended and watered by their grandchildren and their great grandchildren—stand there for a moment with heads bowed to say:

"We thank thee, Lord, that everything is as well with us as what it is!"

It is up to the citizens of Robert Lee to decide on their water problems. The general position of this newspaper has been stated before. We believe water is the one thing that we can afford to spend money on, to go in debt to supply, under any reasonable plan.

As to the method of arriving at sufficient and well distributed water supply, we would not want to take too big a hand. The newspaper is willing to pay \$4.00 flat rate on the small amount of water we use if it will spread the benefits of the water supply over the whole town.

This writer has personally the problem of maintaining two electric pumps and a windmill in the country. We believe any one of the three will cost more than \$4.00 per month.

As to the water rates, it has been mentioned to us, that once you get past the minimum, Bronte has a cheaper rate than we do. We haven't personally investigated these figures.

We do believe, however, that Mayor Bob Vaughan with Commissioner Vaughan Davis and Commissioner Freeman Clark, advising with and listening to the water users of the town, will do their dead level best to work out the most acceptable proposition

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that can be found.

Robert Lee fans at the game passed this word to us, that they enjoyed and appreciated the fine spirit shown by both the Longhorn team and the Bronte people

in the stands—toward our team and our town.

The well trained Longhorn Band was one of the delights of the game.

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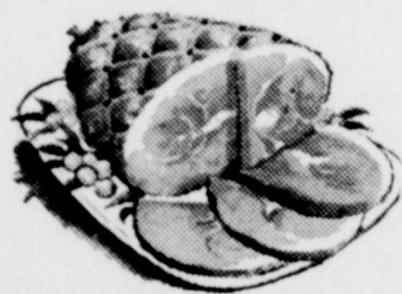

Our Home Circle

Family preparedness is very important in any kind of emergency—after the emergency arises it is too late to prepare.

Have you thought of what you need to have on hand in case of a tornado or a nuclear attack? Do you have food, first aid supplies, water, radio, heating equipment, lamp? Are all these supplies adequate, are they in working order? Do you know what to do to avoid being made ill or badly burned from rays and dust caused by nuclear attack? Do you know what makes a good shelter from these rays and the dust? Who will give your community the alert?

If you cannot answer yes to all these questions, I hope you will attend one of the meetings being held over the county by Mr. Lindsey and me. Our program will help you to answer all the questions I have listed and more. Family preparedness shows good sense.

Meetings scheduled to date are Monday, Nov. 19, Sanco; Thursday, Nov. 29, Olga; Monday, Dec. 3, Robert Lee auditorium. Each meeting is being held at night in order for as many people to come as possible. I hope you will attend the meeting most convenient to you. I believe each family should seriously consider attending one of these meetings.

I ate my first prickly pear jelly last week and I can say yum, yum, it is good! Mrs. Waymond Robertson and Mrs. Vera Allen were the good cooks who shared a sample of their jelly with me. If you have not tasted the tart reddish looking jelly, you have missed a treat.

When the Thanksgiving dinner is over and everyone else has gone off to watch the football game or to chat in the living room, hie yourself off to the kitchen and take care of that left-over turkey.

Food specialists in the U. S. Department of Agriculture say you should remove any stuffing left in the turkey immediately after the meal and store it in a covered container in the refrigerator. Wrap the bird loosely and refrigerate at once.

Also, quickly cool and refrigerate the gravy.

For top quality and flavor, use left-over turkey, stuffing, and gravy within one or two days.

HINT: If you buy Brazil nuts in the shell to make the shelling job easier, soften shells in boiling water for two or three minutes.

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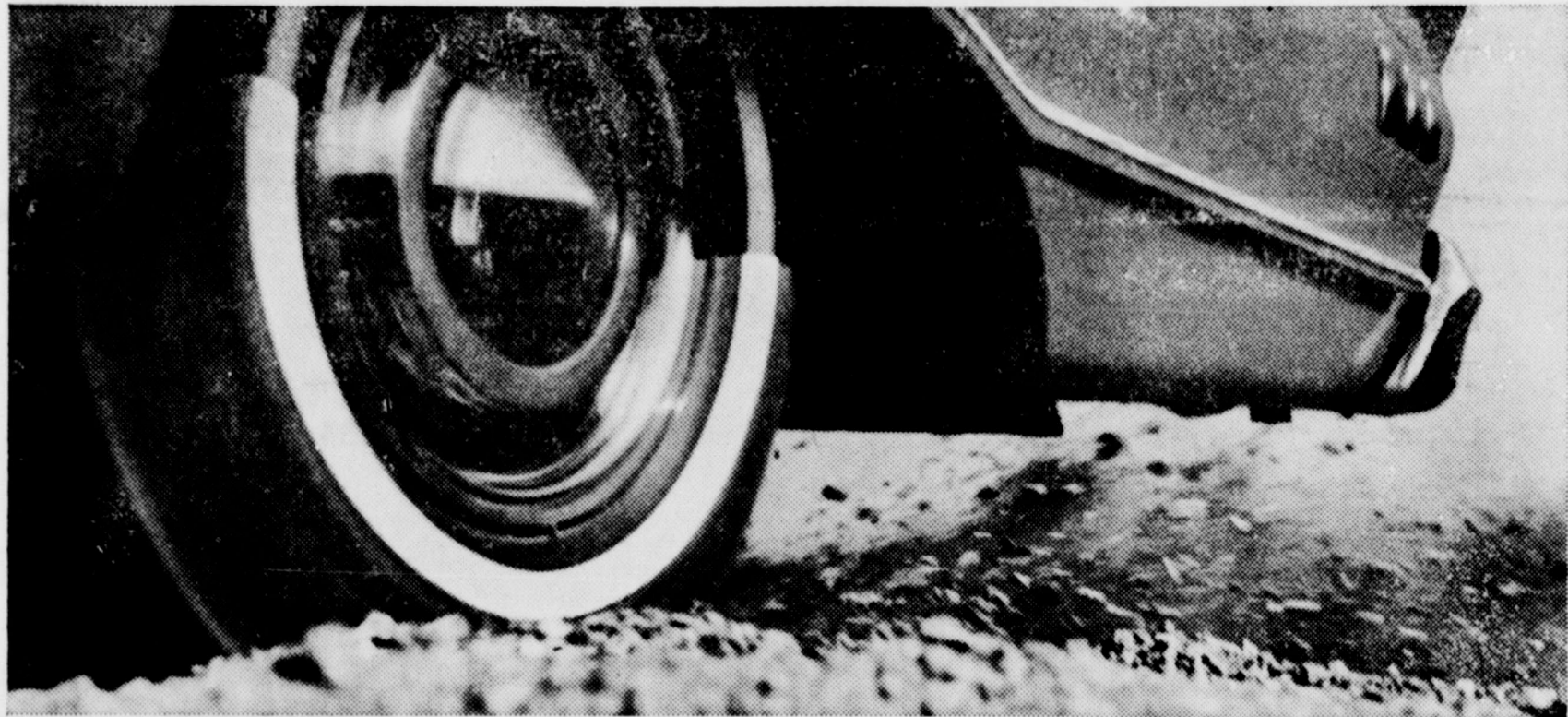
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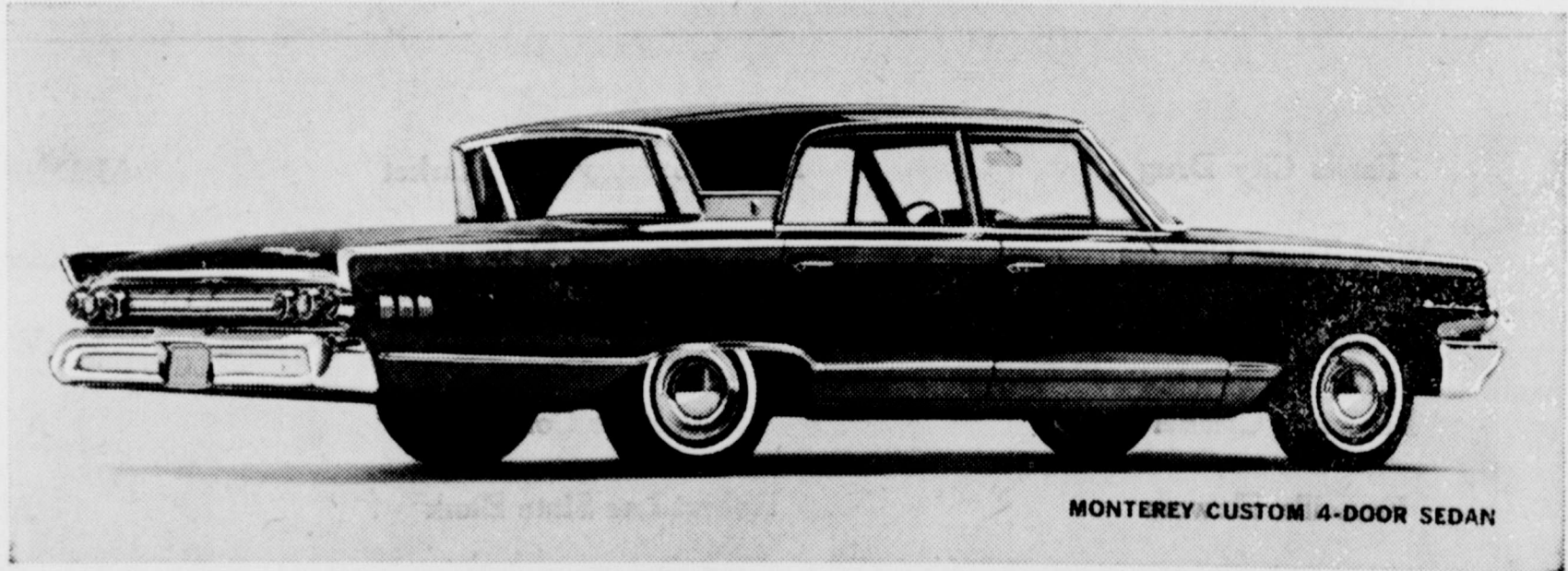

turned the Longhorn kick to his 37 yard line where he was stopped by Wells and Phillips. After line plays to the 48, a 5 yard penalty to the Steers, on the 3rd down with 10½ to go Thetford passed to Walker for 11 yards to the Longhorn 41 yard line. Dodson was up the middle to the 32, Dodson and White on mid-line plays to the 19, where the Steers lost the ball on a fumble.

The Longhorns made 1st with 10 to go on the 28 yard line, got set back to the 26, then a fumble went wholesale with Walker the last man on it for the Steers. On the next play Sissom brought a Steer down, then Hallmark was off tackle with Longhorns swarming him but he made it for another tally, and the score was 18-6.

First kick was out of bounds, and on Holland's second kick Johnson returned to the Longhorns' 40, Sims took the ball to their 45, then to the Steers 48, were downed behind their line of scrimmage on their 48. Then they tried for a pass, Hallmark intercepted and checkerboarded the field through the Longhorns' right end for a fifty-two yard broken field run and a touchdown, 24-6.

There was little time, left, and the game ended just after Hallmark had made a 37 yard run from midfield.
