State and county plans to cope with disaster conditions will be outlined at a meeting for Robert Lee community Monday, December 3, at the high school auditorium, 7:30 p.m.

How to deal with a destructive tornado before and after it happens, how warnings or alerts will be sounded, what precautions should be taken at home and at the school will be subjects, as well as information on radio active fallouts from nuclear missiles.

May Build 47 Mile Water Pipe Line Into Silver Area

In Big Spring, a meeting of considerable import to the impounding of a second lake on the Colorado River was held by directors of the Colorado River Municipal Water District to proceed with a final draft of an agreement to supply water to Sun Oil Co. for a northern Coke County water-flood project.

When concluded the agreement would provide for the district to deliver salt and raw lake water to Sun. The salt water would be the normal flow of the Colorado River which the district intercepts in channel dams.

E. V. Spence, general manager for CRMWD, explained the proposal to furnish water for Sun Oil of Silver this way: the district could deliver salt water intercepted on the upper Colorado. This would be diluted with water from Lake J. B. Thomas in quantities sufficient to meet contraction demands.

The contract, if and when signed, will entail building of a 47-mile pipeline.

The district has a conditional permit to impound a second lake if and when it can demonstrate that salt water pollution of the riverbed is being brought under control. — From Colorado City Record.

The World As We See It

By the Publisher of The Observer

Back in the issue of August 23 we wrote: There has been a realignment in Washington. How far it will extend is something to watch.

Senator Ralph Yarborough had made a speech in the Senate attacking the UN policy in Katanga and the Congo. Adlai Stevenson had laid it heavily on the line with the Chinese Communists, opposing successfully their admission to the United Nations.

Senator Fulbright, chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee of the United States Senate, had written an article stating that the UN was not serving the purpose it should and that we might have to form an organization of the nations friendly to the West rather than depend on the United Nations.

All of these expressions came from people widely classified as liberals—people with some of whose former ideas we had not agreed.

But after that came more vigorous action in the cold war. The President changed his advisors to some extent. We have no reason to doubt that all those utterances were genuine.

We cannot see the end of this Cuban business, but as it looks now we are doing far better than under some of the donothingness of some of the nice negotiatingness of former administrations at times in BOTH PARTIES.

The Waco Times-Herald mails us a reprint of an editorial from which we print an excerpt. This statement of policy came at the last of September and it is in line with what we wrote in August.

On Sept. 30 at Midland, Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson said: "Today we recognize that the Communists are active now close to our own shores in Cuba. I believe the policy of the United States toward Cuba needs to be and can be fully and clearly expressed. Our policy toward Cuba is this:

"The aim of the United States is to get rid of the Castro regime and of Soviet Communist influence in Cuba.

"2. We will not permit the Cuban regime to export its aggressive purpose by force or by threat of force.

"3. We will prevent the Cuban regime—by whatever means may be necessary—from taking action against any part of the hemisphere.

"4. If, at any time, the Communist build-up in Cuba endangers or threatens our security in any way, we will do whatever must be done to protect our own security and that of our allies.

"5. We shall remain alert and fully capable of dealing sufficiently with any such development—and we intend to do everything within our power to prevent such a development from occurring."

LETTER TO OUR READERS

Our Home Circle

"Deck the Halls with Holly" was the theme of a Christmas foods program given last week by Miss Jimmie Temple, home economist for Lone Star Gas Co., in the Bronte School auditorium to 106 persons from all areas of Coke County.

One of the most interesting Christmas ideas given was the table cloth used on the table. Miss Temple showed a white sheet which had holly leaves cut from green percale ironed on for a design. A medium cold starch solution was used to make the percale leaves stick. Artificial holly berries were added to the design by carefully working the small wire through the sheet, or these could be tacked to the sheet. After the holiday, the design could be removed by laundering the sheet.

Some of the other ideas passed on to the group were various ways to wrap home cooked foods for gift items. Recipes for cakes, breads, nibbles, candies, jelly and pickle peas were given.

Mrs. C. E. Arrott and Mrs. O. R. McQueen, Bronte Home Demonstration Club members were at the registration table during the program. Mrs. Fay C. Roe, County Home Demonstration Agent, introduced Miss Temple.

In a recent meeting of the Bronte Sr. Home Demonstration Club, the group voted to send a contribution to their "adopted boy" in the State School in Austin. During the session Mrs. R. S. Walton, secretary, read a letter from the hospital stating that out of 1600 patients there, over half were not remembered by relations at Christmas. It made me very happy to see these ladies wish to share with less fortunate people a little of what they have. The Home Demonstration Council also made contributions to two hospitals. Some of the other HD Clubs will do likewise. I hope other organizations will follow the example set by these clubs. It will take only a little from us to send some joy into some less fortunate person's life during the holidays.

Everywhere people say, "I am so busy," or "I don't have time for so and so"—maybe you can use some of these short cuts to an advantage:

Cook once for two or three meals by preparing double or triple quantities of a favorite recipe and storing away in the freezer for later use.

Cook a pound of bacon in the oven at once, then freeze or refrigerate the slices flat. They will be ready on a broiler pan for breakfast in no time with no mess or grease.

Package hamburgers, bacon, chops, steaks, and sliced meat so they may be removed from the freezer in the desired number of portions. Separate portions, in each package, with a double thickness of wax paper. At preparation time, insert blunt knife between the pieces of wax paper, give a little twist, and the portions will separate.

Buy in quantity, if your storage permits. Such things as paper items, laundry supplies, bottled goods can be purchased in sizeable quantities. A variety of canned, packaged and frozen foods can be bought in amounts suitable for your use. Buy foods in the container size which fits your serving habits. Three small packages instead of one large one may save time in repackaging.

COUNTRYSIDE

The Screwworm Control program continues to make changes, all of which we hope will result in screwworm eradication at the earliest possible date.

We have not received a late report on the State-wide fund drive, but unofficial reports indicate progress toward the desired goal. Locally, Coke County is still moving forward. A total of 78 operators have made a contribution in the drive to reach our goal. But, we still lack about 3% of our goal.

During the past week 937 samples were confirmed at the Mission Plant as being screwworm. This is quite a reduction from the previous figures. We can attribute part of the reduction to cold weather. We hope and believe the sterile fly applications have had their effects also.

There has been some concern over sprouting pecans over the State this year. The pattern has not been the same as in past years. Fred Brison made some comments on the subject that should be of interest. He writes the following:

The pecan is a fruit containing a seed (the kernel). Seeds are of two general classes — (A) those that will germinate promptly if

favorable conditions prevail, and (B) those that are normally delayed by some inhibiting factor or influence. The pecan belongs to the first class and will germinate promptly upon maturity or even before maturity.

Some premature sprouting of pecans in the hulls occurs every year, but the trouble is quite general this year.

Several samples have been received by the Horticulture Section. One grower said half of his Western Schley pecans were sprouted. Another mentioned that many Success and Schley are sprouting.

In the past it has been thought that sprouting is more likely to occur in pecans that have thin shells and thick heavy husks which retain moisture. It is being observed this year that much of the sprouting is occurring in nuts on which the husks are still green. In some cases the husk never separates from the nut; in other cases it does separate in a fashion but not completely. In all cases the nut is ruined for commercial use.

The specific causes of this trouble are not known. It has been observed that it seems to be more prevalent when a long dry period during summer is followed by abundant rainfall during late summer and early fall — just prior to the harvest season.

The Texas Section of American Society of Range Management will hold its annual meeting at the Townhouse Hotel in San Angelo on December 7-8. They have planned a program that should interest us in this area, it will be convenient for us. I hope we can have a delegation there. I will give further details on the program at a later date.

Boykin Sees Farmer Moving Toward Self Supporting Business

Ben Boykin, newly elected president of the Coke County Farm Bureau, back from the state convention, is enthusiastic about the work the big farm and ranch organization is doing.

Mr. Boykin said he is convinced that eventually the farmer may be able to get out from under controls and grow his cotton on his own without government help, expand his own markets and stand on his own feet.

The delegates all had a chance to have their say. The business session was long drawn out, but the slowest talking man with the least experience in public speaking could voice his opinion on any question discussed, and many were discussed from screw worm control up and down.
