

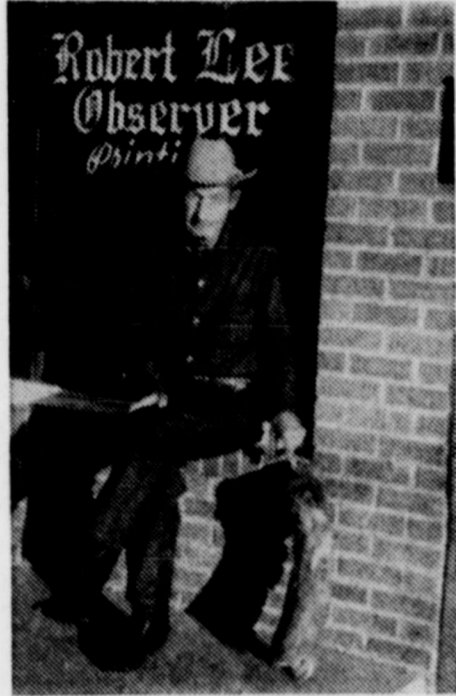

## Cotton Quota Voting Dec. 11

Polling places where Coke County farmers may cast ballots in the referendum on marketing quotas for the 1963 upland cotton crop were announced today by Clarence E. Arrott, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee. The referendum will be held on Tuesday, Dec. 11.

Polling place will be located at the courthouse in Robert Lee and at the city hall in Bronte. Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Arrott explained that every effort has been made to inform farmers fully about the allot-quota program, so that the outcome of the referendum may represent the considered opinion of all the voters. Farmers eligible to cast ballots are all those engaged in the production of upland cotton crop in 1962. Approval by at least two-thirds of the growers voting is necessary if the quotas are to go into effect.

Issues to be decided in the Dec. 11 referendum are (1) quotas or no quotas, and (2) the level of price support to be available for the 1963 upland cotton crop.

If the vote is favorable, quotas will be in effect for the crop — with penalties on any "excess" cotton produced on a farm, and price support to growers who comply with their farm allotments will be available at a level of from 65 to 90 per cent of parity.

If the vote is not favorable, there will be no quotas or penalties applicable to the 1963 upland cotton crop, and price support to cooperators will be at 50 per cent of parity, as directed by law.

Department of Agriculture officials have pointed out that, while the Administration plans to recommend new cotton legislation early in 1963, it is anticipated that such legislation would supplement rather than substantially change the basic program choices in the Dec. 11 referendum.

The Board of Community Development voted not to meet December 2 or January 1. The nominating committee is to report at the meeting Tuesday, December 18.

Members present Tuesday discussed the ordinance against firing fire crackers downtown, with sentiment unanimous in favor of enforcing this ordinance, and requesting parents and teachers to impress on children that exploding fireworks is prohibited in the business section of Robert Lee.

## W. E. Hawkins Began Radio Ministry Following Pastorate at Robert Lee

Rev. William E. Hawkins, who died in a Fort Worth hospital last Thursday morning, was pastor of the Methodist Church in Robert Lee two years, 1922 to 1924.

The last year of his pastorate here he led in the establishment of the Sanco Camp Meeting and was the evangelist for it more than ten years.

In 1927 he began on what was then KFQB, with Frank Hayes, a radio ministry which came to be known as the Radio Revival, and has continued on KRLD, Dallas — one of the two oldest religious radio programs in the United States.

His death, at the age of 72, according to information received here, followed a heart attack.

Mrs. Hawkins and three sons survive. The sons, Neill, Rader and Robert were frequently in Coke County attending the meetings, and on visits as they grew to manhood. All three are doing missionary work in British Guiana and northern Brazil among hitherto unevangelized Indian tribes. There are 12 grandchildren.

Robert was at home on fur-

lough, preparing to leave for the mission field at the time of his father's death, and the other two sons were in South America.

Mrs. Hawkins lives at 818 Coombs Drive, Dallas 11, Texas.

Funeral services were held at Seofield Memorial Church in Dallas Saturday morning at 10:00 o'clock.

During his pastorate here and for years afterward, the radio evangelist conducted services and organized Sunday schools at Edith, Valley View, Wildcat, Cow Creek, Sanco, Lometa, Friendship, and Moon's Chapel.

He kept a close schedule, preaching usually four to five and more times a day, held street services, and visited constantly in town and country, taking to horseback at times to reach outlying farms and ranches.

He was "Bill" Hawkins to many ranchers and ranch hands in this area, mixed freely with all manner of people in carrying his message, declaring always his belief in the Bible as the revealed Word of God, and was active in his ministry almost to the day of his death.

**Bertha S. (Mrs. Jim) McCabe Writes Story of Mrs. Willie McCabe Roberts**

Editor, Robert Lee Observer  
Dear Sir:

There has been a request from the family of Willie McCabe Roberts that I send you an account of her death.

Willie McCabe was born in Bosque County, Texas, March 22, 1884. At the age of 15 she moved with her family of three sisters and one brother and their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank S. McCabe, by covered wagon to Coke County, settling on the Divide.

Ambitious to teach, Miss McCabe attended Howard Payne College in Brownwood and summer normal schools in Robert Lee and San Angelo, holding the position of rural teacher for a number of years.

Among the schools she taught were Green Mountain, Paint Creek and a school near the Saul Ranch. At the latter she boarded in the home of Mr. and Mrs. John Saul.

It was there she met a young cowboy to whom she was eventually married.

While teaching as governess in the far-reaching ranch country out from Van Horn in the spring of 1915 Willie McCabe and Raymond Roberts were united in marriage in Toyah, Texas, paying their first call as bride and groom to early day friends, formerly of Tom Green and Coke County, Mr. and Mrs. Claude Collins.

The Roberts spent many years on ranches where he was employed in Texas, New Mexico and in Mexico; in Arizona and in California. In time a home in Tucson, Arizona was bought and it was there that their one daughter, Ruth grew to womanhood, married T. J. Harmon, and there she enjoyed her four grandchildren, Raymond, Nila, Jimmie and Billie Harmon.

Mr. Roberts continued his work as ranch foreman, Mrs. Roberts

usually at home in Tucson because of failing health.

But it was while on the ranch with her husband that a paralytic stroke occurred, sending her to a Tucson hospital and in time to the Harmon home where she received loving care from March of 1962 until her death 8 months later. Death occurred Nov. 14, 1962. Burial was in Southlawn Memorial Park, Tucson, Nov. 17, 1862 under the auspices of Bring's Funeral home.

Relatives from Houston, Texas, a niece, Mrs. Maxine Hall Gooch and a sister-in-law, Mrs. Jim McCabe, of Sterling City, attended.

Mr. Editor: Am I right in assuming that you are Ulmer Bird? Then you remember me and times that we have had you in our home. Once you were accompanied by your dear mother. It is with pleasure I recall those days. So much has transpired since.

During your mother's illness and passing on, in Sterling County Hospital. I had the privilege of being in her room and of again meetings your sisters.

For William Hawkins, God was neither a faceless power nor a powerless face, but

"Warm, near, tender, even yet a present help is He,

Where faith has still its Olivet and love its Galilee.

The healing of His seamless dress is by our beds of pain.

We touch Him in life's storm and stress and we are whole again."

The controversial issues of the 20's and since have had many pastors as well as other Christians bewildered. Many practically abandoned all Christian faith. Others walked a long way in confusion, not sure of their going, with the voice of the Lord dim and far away.

Some found a satisfying service inside the organizations where they had begun their work. Others did not.

William Hawkins was by nature a pioneer. Whether one disagreed or agreed with his doctrine and method, there were very few ever doubted his genuine sincerity. He was strong in his conviction, aggressive in his leadership—a better leader than follower in any human capacity.

He was a university graduate and studied in a high bracket with the scholars at Princeton, but always kept the common touch, whether he went across the railroad tracks or deep into the piney woods, or mesquites.

I was with him for awhile in the country places and roomed with him at Princeton, and saw him carry his faith into the classroom the same as he did into the cactus.

Regardless of differences of opinion, he never forgot a friend, and he wanted every man he met for a friend.

Every son he had—and there are three—went into a work of the same type and followed it with the same zeal.

We haven't any measure to measure the life of such a man—it may take both earth and Heaven a long time to do that.

But regardless whether or how much we agreed with him, as year has added itself to year—38 of them since we first met him, this writer can only say now that he would like to shake the hand of more people on this earth who loved God as much and would do as much for their fellow man. —USB

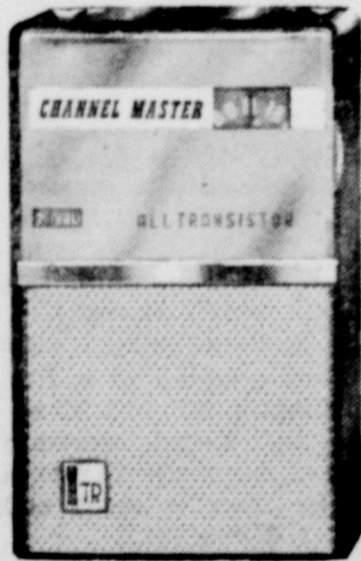

I want to pass on a recipe to you—this is a surprise treat to pass to drop in company or give for a gift for Christmas. This is an appetizer or a snack item.

### Chili Cheese Logs

½ lb. American cheese, grated  
1 (3 oz.) pkg. cream cheese,  
½ tsp. salt

½ tsp. instant minced onion  
¼ tsp. cayenne pepper  
2 tsp. lemon juice  
¼ c. finely chopped nuts  
3 T. chili powder

Soften cheese at room temperature; mix until well blended. Add salt, onion, pepper, lemon juice and nuts.

Mix well. Shape into 4 rolls, 4 inch long, 1½ inches in diameter. Chill 30 minutes. Roll each in chili powder. Wrap in foil or waxed paper. Chill. Store in freezer or refrigerator.

To serve: Slice and serve on round crackers, corn chips or small rounds of sandwich bread.

I suggest chives, garlic and paprika might be used for variety.
