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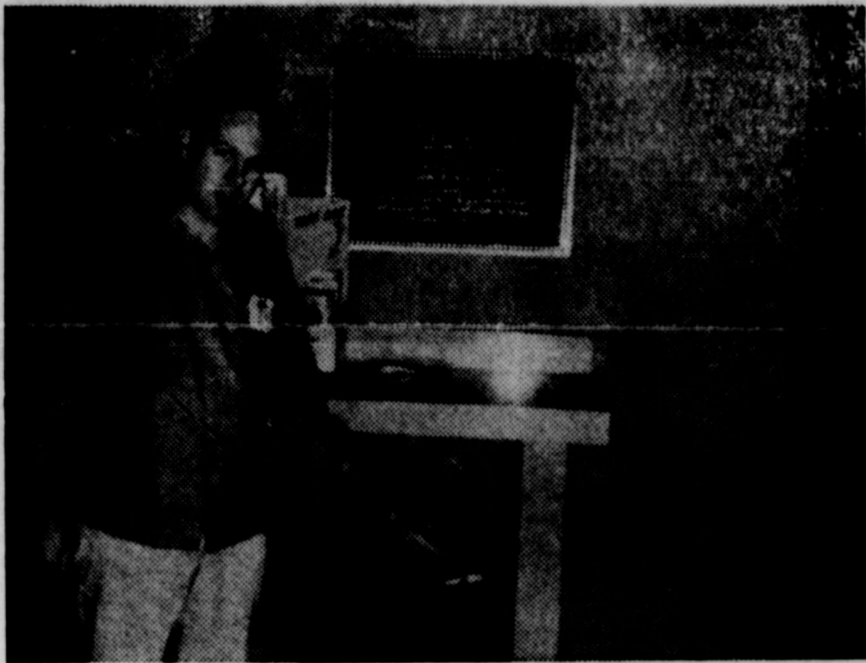

Baptist Pastor From Kosse To Robert Lee

Rev. Bill Beaty, coming here from the First Baptist Church at Kosse, Texas, began his pastorate of Robert Lee Baptist Church with the service last Sunday morning.

He and Mrs. Beaty, with their two young sons, moved to the parsonage Friday. The new pastor is 31 years of age, a graduate of Howard Payne College, Class of '53, and of Southwestern University in Fort Worth, 1957.

His home was originally at Comanche, where he entered the ministry. The last two previous pastorates served were at Bethel, near Anson, for 3½ years, and at Kosse, 45 miles southeast of Waco, 1½ years.

He and Mrs. Beaty met at Howard Payne where both were students. They have two sons, David, 7, who is in the first grade, and James, who will be five in January.

"We enjoyed our first Sunday in Robert Lee very much," the pastor said, "and look forward to becoming better acquainted with the members of the church and community."

The local congregation had been under the ministry of an interim pastorate since the resignation of Rev. Robin Guess, who went from here to Navasota last September. Guess served here one month over three years.

Rev. Taylor Henley, field representative for Baptist Memorial Geriatrics Hospital in San Angelo, has served the local church in the interim the past three months.

The church has a membership of around 525.

Mims Ranchman Is Closely Interested In County History

Elton Mims, in Robert Lee Friday from the Mims Ranch on Pecan Creek in southwest of here, recounted some of the region's history that has interested him for a good many years now.

Son of J. R. (Bob) Mims, Elton served as president of Tom Green County Historical Association until recently, still is an active member, and engaged in a spare time work of piecing together and arranging information on early days in Tom Green and Coke.

Mrs. Bryan Yarborough is secretary of the Society.

The elder Mr. Mims was commissioner of Coke County, appointed to fill a vacancy in 1925 and serving until 1932. He was 90 on November 21.

Elton Mims and a brother-in-law operate most of the original Bob Mims ranch, while his father still keeps some land and stock and personally sees to its operation.

Bob Mims came up the Colorado River on a cattle drive through the present site of Robert Lee when nothing but the old Harris headquarters was here, returned on a drive in a couple of years or so to find the town and county seat established and going.
