The screwworm control program in the Southwest is shaping up for the coming of spring and the migration northward of the screwworm and at the same time is having financial difficultes. Now that the program has gained the position that it holds, we sincerely hope that it can continue as the leaders have it planned. They still do not make promises of no screwworms in 1963, but they do believe they are in a commanding position as we begin the second year of warfare. If all goes well they will have their buffer zone established along the border and be in position to send sterile flies to trouble spots wherever they may exist above the buffer zone.

This means that two things will be vitally important to our well being if screwworms occur here - and we expect some. First, we must report any cases that develop and we must do all we can to eliminate these cases before they complete their cycle.

Secondly, in reporting we must give exact locations of infestations in order that the sterile flies may be dropped where maximum returns can be gained. If they miss with their drop, then you may not benefit and the

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


