But the boy did not leave him for some time. Again told that he was free to visit his people, the youth, who never would sleep on a bed, was missing one morning. He would either sleep on the ground or in the house on the floor in front of the fireplace.

Not long after that, the Indians raided the settlement, and made off with all the horses owned by the white people, including the Blairs. Grandfather Blair wondered if the boy had turned against him, but said nothing.

Finally one morning when he looked outside, there were his horses-everyone of them had been brought home, but none others. His neighbors horses were still missing.

There were more raids later, but the Blair horses were never touched, and the neighbors began to have suspicions that maybe he was in with the Indians.

Then one morning when "Father Blair," as the Indian boy called him, glanced toward the fireplace as he awoke and noticed something on the floor. The Comanche boy had come back during the night.

Later Blair asked him, "Why did you bring my horses back?'

"Father Blair," the youth answered. "I could not let them take your horses. You gave me my life. I would give my life for you."

Mr. Blair later invited the boy to bring his chief to see him, saying he would like to talk to him. Not long afterward, the Indian boy and his chief showed up at the Blair ranch, and this, as Jim remembers it as told by his great grandfather, was the conversation that took place.

The white man said, "Chief, I know what you and your people are up against. The white man is coming farther and farther, pushing you off of your country. But I cannot stop it. They are going to keep pushing.'

The chief answered, "We want you to push as far as the others do."

The white man continued, "When your people get hungry, don't steal from me. First come to me and tell me what you need. If you don't tell me first, my cowboys will shoot. But if you will come to me I will have them get you the beef you need.



Does your fried chicken have

Food scientists of the U.S. Department of Agriculture say there's a trick to making the batter stick. Instead of rolling the uncooked chicken in the batter, cook it first. Then dip the fried pieces in bafter and fry them in deep fat just long enough to brown and cook the coating.

In case you wondered, here's why the batter tends to come off when it's applied before the chicken is cooked: Chicken parts lose about one-fourth of their weight during frying-from evaporation of moisture. When raw pieces dipped in batter are cooked, the batter coagulates before the meat shrinks. Then the shrinkage and pressure from steam cause a loose-fitting coating that peels readily.

The scientists also found that dredging the meat in flour or some other thickener before dipping it in batter does not reduce this peeling. The thicker the coatings are, the more readily they peel.

Starchy thickening ingredients have only a slight effect on the color of the coating, and they make little difference in how well the coating sticks to the meat. Egg content also had little effect on adhesion, but it did add color to the batters.


