



Direct From Belgium Report On Congo Is Expected Here Soon

The following letter is from a friend of World War II times. He was pastor of the Methodist Church in Antwerp when the present editor of the Observer was stationed there. Dr. Thomas is now dean of the Protestant Seminary in Brussels, and a leader well known to European Protestants in Belgium, France, Holland, and Switzerland.

The letter is in response to our request for first hand information on what Belgium actually did in

July 10, 1963 Dear Ulmer:
