

A taxpayer whose homestead is not rendered for more than \$3,000 and who owns no other taxable property has been and will continue to be wholly exempt from the tax. However, the county will continue to receive the revenues for farm to market and lateral roads and for flood control that it has been getting, plus that part which has heretofore been remitted to the UCRA, which no longer can continue to receive these funds whether the proposal is approveld at the election or not. Therefore, the River Authority is in no way being deprived of any money it would otherwise receive.

And the fellow who thought it sounded good in the first place ends up putting out what the "party" can get out of him, and getting what they say he can have.


The needs of the top commissars get to be great. They need the big automobiles, the vacation spots for the "working classes," the profits from the state industries.



A mound of dirt six inches high should then be packed against the tree without allowing the crystals to touch the tree as they will harm it if they do. Leave the mounds until spring, then level them back to the original ground line.

Two to three year old trees require about 1/2 ounce of PDB crystals per tree, and four to five year old trees need about 3/4 ounce per tree. A mature tree requires 1 ounce of crystals per tree.

When the crystals are placed around the trees the soil should be should be above 55 degrees F.

The lesser peach tree borer damage occurs to the trunk above the ground and to the limbs. Their control includes keeping your injury. 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


