Butane Service Will Be Continued, Dealers Announce

An announcement by both dealers in this issue of the Observer assures butane customers that the granting of a franchise by the city to Lone Star Gas will not affect the continuance of their butane service here.

When the ordinance was passed by the city commission, it was stated that it was not exclusive and that nobody is under any obligation whatsoever to connect on to the natural gas lines if and when they are ready.

Mayor Robert Vaughan stated at that time that there is not anything compulsory about it. All the City Commission did was to give Lone Star PERMISSION to put lines in and sell gas here.

It will be up to the individual as to whether they continue to use butane or tie on to the natural gas lines.

Water District Men BCD Speakers Here

The Colorado River Municipal Water District should have a site selection made for a dam on the Colorado River within the next twelve months, Col. E. V. Spence, manager, told the Board of Community Development here Tuesday. He said they planned to get construction underway in 1965.

Col. Spence, and O. H. Ivie, Civil Engineer, his assistant, showed pictures illustrating the pollution of underground water and of the Colorado River water, and outlined measures being taken to stop it.

Oil operators are being required to return salt water to the

formations from which it came. Retention dams on tributaries in the Scurry county area are to hold up the flow of salt water now coming from a badly polluted oil field area, and this water has been contracted by Sun Oil Company to be pumped into their wells as a part of the water used in their water flooding program.

The water district is to spend some \$25,000 here testing the structures and studying construction problems and estimated costs of a projected lake to impound, if located here, 2½ times that impounded by Lake J. B. Thomas.

Oil field requirements are expected to diminish, municipal requirements to increase toward the last of the 16 year contract term with Sun Oil Company.

The CRMWD supplies water to Big Spring, Snyder and Odessa, and expects to supply Midland.

"We will sell you water," Col. Spence said. "That is the way we will pay back the \$25,000,000 we will borrow to build the dam." He said their other water contracts are paying for the dam and lines already built, and are building up some funds to apply on future projects, including this lake and pipe lines to deliver the water to the customers.

The district is set up to supply water for municipal, industrial and mining (including oil production) use.

Cash Drop Would Be \$15,000 In Precinct 1

Questions coming up for our vote on November 9 cover four amendments to the State Constitution, and a local question in Coke county. Let's consider the local question first.

The ad valorem tax to be voted on was one time a state tax. We have had it all along. Back there when the Upper Colorado River Authority was set up, the Legislature of the State of Texas remitted that tax to the counties covered by it, to be used for flood

control and or county roads.

Each year it has been apportioned out to the precincts and has been used mainly to build county roads, as one of the road and bridge funds.

A vote against it will be a vote to reduce the county taxes by that much. A vote for it will be a vote to continue the same tax on a little different basis.

If we vote for it, we haven't any complaint coming about high taxes. If we vote against it, we haven't any complaint coming when the Commissioner cannot do as much to the roads as he has been doing. He won't have as much money by around forty-four thousand dollars for all four precincts, about \$15,000 in Precinct 1.

A vote against the ad valorem tax will cut taxes, all right. But it will also cut way down the maintenance, repair, and improvement of county roads.

Our information is that the Upper Colorado River Authority is not now getting or expecting to get any more money out of this fund.

The lakes they have built, including the North Concho Lake, Oak Creek Lake, and Mountain Creek Lake at Robert Lee are all well up with payments, and some ahead of payments. Water from these lakes is paying the cost, and taking them all together, well ahead, according to Gerald C. Allen of Robert Lee, member of the Upper Colorado River Authority Board of Directors.

TO THE HONORABLE JUDGE OF SAID COURT:

Comes now VERNON C. MCKINNEY, Individually and as Independent Executor of the Estate of Charles McKinney, Deceased, hereinafter called Plaintiff, complaining of BEULAH MCKINNEY, a widow, the surviving wife of CHARLES MCKINNEY; KARL MCKINNEY, MARY MCKINNEY and LAURA MCKINNEY, the minor children of VERNON C. MCKINNEY, individually and pursuant to Rule 42 (a) of the Texas Rules of Civil Procedure as representatives of the children, or their descendants, who have been or may be born to VERNON C. MCKINNEY and who may survive VERNON C. MCKINNEY; and SAM J. DOTSON, MRS. VANE WALKER, a feme sole, R. E. MCKINNEY, IVA KERLEY, and husband, W. C. KERLEY, and LESLIE A. JOHNSON, who are sued pursuant to Rule 42 (a) of the Texas Rules of Civil Procedure as representatives of the brothers and sisters, and their descendants, of CHARLES MCKINNEY, who may be living at

the time of the death of the said VERNON C. MCKINNEY; hereinafter called Defendants, and would respectfully show the Court the following:

1.

The Plaintiff resides in San Angelo, Tom Green County, Texas, and the Defendants and their residences are as follows: BEULAH MCKINNEY, San Angelo, Tom Green County, Texas; KARL MCKINNEY, MARY MCKINNEY, and LAURA MCKINNEY, San Angelo, Tom Green County, Texas; R. E. MCKINNEY, San Angelo, Tom Green County, Texas, SAM J. DOTSON, Bexar County, Texas; MRS. VANE WALKER, Lubbock County, Texas; LESLIE A. JOHNSON, Lamar County, Texas; and IVA KERLEY and her husband, W. C. KERLEY, Scurry County, Texas.

2.

Plaintiff would show that CHARLES MCKINNEY died December 31, 1956, having at the time of his death his domicile and fixed place of residence in Tom Green County, Texas, and that he left his written will which was thereafter duly probated in Tom Green County, Texas, a copy of such will attached hereto and marked Exhibit "A", and said exhibit being made part of this pleading the same as if it were copied at length herein. Plaintiff, VERNON C. MCKINNEY, was named Independent Executor of the Estate of CHARLES MCKINNEY, in said will and the estate, No. 5077, is still open and pending at the present time in the Probate Court of Tom Green County, Texas. In said will VERNON C. MCKINNEY, Plaintiff, is devised a life estate in the hereinafter described property and Defendant, BEULAH MCKINNEY, is likewise devised a life interest in the estate. The remaining Defendants are representatives of the classes of persons named as contingent remaindermen in the will of CHARLES MCKINNEY. The interests of such remaindermen will not be determined and do not vest until the death of Plaintiff.

3.

The principal property in the Estate of CHARLES MCKINNEY, Deceased, is a mineral interest in 640 acres, more or less, in Coke County, Texas, described as Section 64, Block 16, H. & T. C. RR. Co. Survey. There has been no development of this mineral estate prior to the institution of this suit. Such estate is in danger of drainage of oil, gas and other minerals unless it can be leased for mineral development, and the leasing thereof will inure to the benefit of both the life tenants and the contingent remaindermen under the will of CHARLES MCKINNEY.

4.

Plaintiff would show that he has a vested interest as life tenant in the above-mentioned mineral estate and that said mineral estate is in danger of drainage of oil, gas and other minerals, that the leasing thereof for oil, gas and mineral development and the safe and proper investment of the proceeds will inure to the benefit and advantage of the persons entitled thereto, and that it is necessary for the conservation, preservation and protection of the property of both the life tenants and the contingent remaindermen, that the mineral estate be leased for the production of oil, gas and other minerals.

5.

Plaintiff therefore requests that this Court appoint a receiver pursuant to the provisions of Article 2320(c), Vernon's Civil Statutes of Texas, pending the happening of the contingency and the vesting of the future interests created by the will of CHARLES MCKINNEY, Deceased. Such receiver should be authorized by this Court to lease the above described mineral estate, at private sale,

and upon the terms and conditions as the Court may direct, and the receiver should be authorized by this Court to receive, hold and invest the proceeds thereof under the direction of the Court for the benefit of the persons entitled or who may become entitled thereto according to their respective rights and interests, and conferring any other powers on said receiver deemed necessary by this Court.

WHEREFORE, Plaintiff prays that citation be issued to Defendants to answer herein and further that those unborn contingent remaindermen be cited as authorized in Rule 112, Texas Rules of Civil Procedure, in the same fashion as in suits against unknown owners or claimants of an interest in land. Plaintiff prays that the Court enter judgment appointing a receiver pursuant to Article 2320(c), Vernon's Civil Statutes of Texas, giving said receiver the power to execute oil and gas leases which will bind both the interests of the life tenants and the contingent remaindermen; and Plaintiff asks for such other and further relief both in law and in equity to which he may be entitled, including costs of court.

**EXHIBIT A
THE STATE OF TEXAS
COUNTY OF COKE**

I, CHARLES MCKINNEY, usually known as Charley McKinney, of Coke County, Texas, do hereby make and publish my last will and testament, revoking all wills heretofore made by me.

(1) It is my will that all of my just debts be paid within a reasonable time after my death. It is my will that the debts be paid out of such money as I may have at my death and out of the personal property. If the money and personal property is insufficient to pay all of the debts, it is my will that the real estate be rented or leased out by my executor and the rents from such a lease be applied on the debts.

(2) All money and personal property, if any is left after the payment of the debts and the burial expenses and the expenses of probating this will shall go to my son, VERNON MCKINNEY.

(3) I hereby give to my son VERNON MCKINNEY a life estate in all of the real estate which I may have at my death. It is my will that he have the use and benefit of said lands and premises, receiving therefrom all of the rents and revenues during the period of his life, subject however to the payment of my just debts as above provided, and subject, however, to the gift to my former wife, Beulah McKinney, as hereinafter provided.

(4) Out of the rents and revenues from my real estate I give to Beulah McKinney, my former wife, while she remains unmarried, the sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) per month.

(5) The above gifts to my son VERNON MCKINNEY and to my former wife Beulah McKinney shall not be sold, conveyed, assigned, mortgaged or disposed of by them and shall not be subject to their debts. This provision shall not prevent my son VERNON MCKINNEY from leasing the real estate for any period up to Five years, provided the lease contract recognizes the rights of Beulah McKinney under the above provisions of this will and makes the rentals payable to her insofar as her rights under this will are concerned.

(6) Subject to the life estate vested in my son VERNON MCKINNEY I give all of the real estate owned by me at my death to the natural child or children who may be born to my son VERNON MCKINNEY in lawful wedlock and their descendants who may survive the said VERNON MCKINNEY. But if VERNON MCKINNEY should die without leaving any such child or children or the descendants of their bodies, then it is my will that all of my real estate at the death of the said VERNON MCKINNEY shall (sic) go and be vested in my brothers and sisters and the descendants of my brothers and sisters who may be living at the time of the death of the said VERNON MCKINNEY, the descendants of my deceased brothers and sisters taking such share as such deceased brother or sister would have taken had he or she been alive. This is subject, however, to the Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) per month payable out of the rents and revenues to Beulah McKinney during her life time and while she remains unmarried as above provided.

(7) It is my will that VERNON MCKINNEY be the executor of this will without the supervision of the County Probate Court except to probate this will and the filing of an inventory, and without the execution and filing of a bond. I hereby declare and publish

the above instrument as my last will and testament and sign the same in the presence of Susan Merle Dotson and Peggy Dibrell who I request to execute same as my witnesses this the 13th day of November, 1946.

Firm Future Outlined For Robert Lee Area As Business Houses Occupied, Water, Other Prospects Viewed

(By the Editor of the Observer)



Right now there are several community interests about which very little spot news can be written, yet we believe we should discuss them informally, just like talking things over.

The nursing home project is one of these. It does not now appear that it is going over as it was first outlined to us. The company is still in business, but have never financed the project and do not seem to be at present building new homes. They have built some good homes, and have not gone out of business. But frankly, the prospects are dim they will do anything here.

Golden Heritage has turned the deeds back to the BCD, with the agreement to have a thirty day waiting period, just in case something might turn up. The time will soon expire.

MONEY RAISED

When Golden Heritage first outlined their proposition it was as we understood it to build a nursing home if we would furnish the land. Mr. and Mrs. Jack Walker offered to donate land just east of the hospital.

Money was raised under the auspices of the BCD to pay expenses of bringing up the title, to buy a couple of adjoining lots, and to provide for grading the site.

The portion of the money already spent naturally could not be returned very well. The part that hasn't been spent could be returned.

But as one who made a small donation, I would not want this money back, as long as there is a prospect that the site could be used for a worthy purpose contributing toward the building of a medical center the town and area need here.

It is of course possible it yet might go toward a nursing home. If not, it could contribute toward the well being of the aged in some other way.

Doctor, Dentist Interested

Unofficially we have the information that a doctor and a dentist are interested in coming here. We understand that this could happen even before the hospital is enlarged.

A site for offices for doctor and dentist near the hospital would certainly, it seems to me, be an inducement to both. As hospital plans develop, this land might be needed, at least part of it, by the hospital.

We believe all those who put money into this would do well to stand by while the whole program develops. You will all be notified before the land or the money is put to any other use other than the nursing home project, and it will be done by agreement if it is done. We can be assured of that. What you and I are interested in is doing something good for humanity and the community. That yet can be done.

Hospital Enlargement

The Board of Trustees of the West Coke Memorial Hospital have been proceeding in what we consider a businesslike way. What they have done so far has not produced many headlines, but it has been necessary to any sound development program. Their first step was to set up the new administration and to hire an administrator. They have also taken steps to contact doctors and dentists that might be interested.

Whether or not the nursing home was to be built affected to some extent the route they would take on the new hospital building program.

We predict that when the Board does come to the public with a

"A six-month miracle" — this was the phrase used in the daily press to describe the on-schedule completion of Sun's big waterflood project in West Texas.

When Sun and the Colorado River Municipal Water District executed a contract on January 12 for CRMWD to furnish Sun up to 70,000 barrels of water per day starting July 1, it was the signal for "full speed ahead" for all involved in the project. The water was needed for Sun's proposed

five field waterflood project in the Coke-Mitchell-Nolan County area that is expected to recover an estimated 35 million barrels of oil.

To meet the July 1 deadline, Sun had to plan and build a water treating plant, pump stations and 37 miles of distribution lines. CRMWD had to arrange financing, get right-of-way easements, plan and lay 52.2 miles of 24 and 18 inch pipe from Lake J. B. Thomas to the Sun Water Treat-

ment Facility at Silver.

All this had to be done in less than six months. There were those who said it couldn't be done.—(From the Sun News, September, 1963.)

It was done, and men of Silver and Robert Lee, Sun Oil Company's Robert Lee Area, had a considerable hand in it.

proposal it will be a well worked out plan worthy of everyone's earnest consideration.

As our readers know, we have preferred voluntary financing for the hospital. Let's just say it wasn't done. But the present district operation as we believe the Board will carry it out is the nearest thing to a private capital operation we have been able to get. The bill setting it up does provide for private donations, memorials, endowments. That can still be done. If individuals and groups will not step in and raise the money, then I would not oppose a bond issue to enlarge the hospital under certain circumstances which I believe the Board will do their best to bring about.

One of these is the matter of another doctor, which we understand Dr. McDaniel has indicated would be needed if the enlargement comes.

The most eager would say, "Go ahead and build the hospital and then you can get the doctor." Others more conservative might say, "Get the doctor, then build the hospital."

Actually, we would applaud the Board for bringing the two projects along together, as well as taking the time to know what we will need, and to work out a complete proposal which they can come to us with and say, "This is what we propose, and we have the assurance an additional capable doctor will come when and if this is done."

Scientific Survey Of Coke Soils To Be Completed

A complete, farm-by farm survey of Coke County soils has begun, W. E. Jacoby, U. S. Soil Conservation Service, announced.

L. J. Barnhill, Soil Scientist, of the SCS from Robert Lee, will be in charge.

Power augers, spades, and other soil sampling equipment will be used to make the survey. The information found will be recorded on aerial photographs that were taken from a height of about 15,000 feet. When the survey is completed, these photographs will be made into a soils map of the county. This map will later be published with a report describing the soils and outlining uses for them.

This survey, according to Jacoby, is a part of the National Co-operative Soil Survey. It is a co-operative project of the U. S. Soil Conservation Service and the State Colleges of Agriculture. The purpose is to get a complete inventory of the agricultural land of the national and to learn as much about it as possible.

How much land do we have that is subject to wind and water erosion? How much damage has already occurred? These and many other questions will be answered by the survey, and will be of importance to the nation with its rapidly expanding population.

Every year our population increases nearly three million while at the same time we are losing over a million and a half acres of good land to erosion and to

the spread of cities, the building of highways, and other developments.

"Farmers in the Coke County Soil Conservation District are using soil maps as a basis for their soil conservation plans," Jacoby explained. Already 425 farmers and ranchers have made such plans that include crop rotations, grass waterways, and terraces.


most of all, these plans are based on the use of land in accordance with the way nature made it — for grass or cultivated crops, depending on the physical features of the land itself, Jacoby said. Barnhill expects to complete this soil survey in about three years.
