Nov. 21, 1963 Congressman Says Country Better Off Because Congress Hasn't Done **Much Of What Has Been Proposed**

six weeks off, it begins to look next year. like the 88th Congress will end up in a blaze of confusion, with things that can be said about it is that it hasn't done anything. After all, it's not so much what is done up here-it's what is NOT done, that really counts.

In terms of failure to accomplish what the leadership set out to do, this Congress stands to break all records. The leadership promised Martin Luther King & Company a Civil Rights bill this year, come hell or highwater. But if one is passed before Santa Claus makes his annual calls it will be a miracle.

And there was the promise of a tax bill - this year. But now they're saying-more likely next

Federal aid for mass transportation, a domestic peace corps, a depression-type CCC, a job retraining program, an expanded ARA (WPA), increased pay for federal workers, and a dozen others that were put on the "must" list for 1963, face uncertain fates, to say the least.

So it may turn out that this "donothing" Congress will have done something worthy of notice-just by failing to act on most of a program which everyone knows is either premature, political, or non-essential. But we will have

And this one includes a raise of \$10,000 a year for members of Congress, an item to sort of ride piggy-back on the other raises, and cover enough people to pick up support. I am opposed to any increase for anyone - including members of Congress. We face a Right now, with Christmas only to wrestle with these same things \$10 billion deficit this year, and this is certainly no time to be Take, for example, the federal monkeying around with pay raises.

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



New double-faced fabrics have made their appearance this sea-

Two fabrics are now bonded together with an adhesive that makes the fabrics act as one This method of fabric bonding eliminates the cost of the complex weaving processes used in making reversible fabrics.

The bonded fabrics are used in many ways. Wood fabrics are anchored to an acetate tricot lining for suits, coats and dresses, and there is a denim fabric backed with terry cloth for sportswear. A woven wool coating is bonded to cotton poplin for raincoats, and a tweed reverses to pile for warm winter coats.

The double faced fabrics are available as piece goods.



As the oil is needed-if and when there is more demand and a better price, it is reasonable to suppose more marginal Ellenberger tries will be undertaken.

So far, in the main, veteran drillers and geologists have told the writer that in many cases small pockets of oil have occurred in Ellenberger wells, a little spurt, and that was it, or else salt water was so close in such abundance that separation was not economically feasible.

However, others in the business have held that an Ellenberger field would eventually be developed in the area.
