VIRGINIA NATIVE. LEADER TEXAS SECESSION MOVEMENT. JOINED ARMY, ROSE TO CAPTAIN 15TH TEXAS INFANTRY COMPANY SERVING IN LOUISIANA, ARKANSAS, CHIEFLY TENNESSEE CAMPAIGNS. ELECTED TO STATE SUPREME COURT 1866. REMOVED BY RECONSTRUCTION MILITARY AUTHORITIES. DEFEATED GOVERNOR E. J. DAVIS 1873. BLOODLESS CONTROVERSY ENSUED. DAVIS RETIRED UNDER PROTEST MARKING POLITICAL END RECONSTRUCTION IN TEXAS. U. S. SENATOR 1877-1895.

A Memorial to Texans Who Served the Confederacy Erected by the State of Texas 1963.

On April 23, 1889, the first Coke County officers were installed, and the County came into being.

Today that event is commemorated with the dedication of a marker placed on the court house lawn through the work of the State Historical Commemoration Committee.

Named for the first governor of Texas elected in a free election following the Civil War, the program today honors that sturdy and able man who held out against the military reconstruction govern-

nor Davis, restored popular government to the state, and later served it in the United States Senate.

Somehow he seems to have lent his spirit to the County through the years.

Old timers as well as young will first meet at the court house to visit during the morning, coming at their will. Through the courtesy of the Robert Lee State Bank, those who were in the county on or before April 23, 1899 will be guests at the Recreation Hall for

the noon meal, where an appreciation program will be held.

The Board of Community Development postponed its Tuesday meeting to join in this luncheon. Senator Dorsey Hardeman and Mr. Elton Mims, on the afternoon program, along with several visitors, will also be guests.

The dedication program will be held on the court house lawn if weather permits, if not it will be in the court house. Those who were here in the founding years will also be given recognition at this program.

This is the first of several Jubilee events, opening a period of appreciation and remembrance for those who have made possible 75 years of local self government, and touching upon the county's present and future.

A complete review of the 75 years will be published in May, the Anniversary Edition of the newspaper, which turns its 75th leaf at the first of June.

Golf Course Planned By Private Endeavor

Program to build a nine-hole golf course in Robert Lee is getting under way, to be financed by membership fees and dues.

This private enterprise project has been talked for several years. Cumbie Ivey, Jr., in behalf of a possible membership of around 50, has announced a public meeting to be held Wednesday night at 7:30 at the court house for all

persons interested in the golf course.

Mr. Ivey said that verbal commitments from landowners on land considered as a possible location may pave the way for early construction.

Bronte began theirs with a 4-hole course, has recently expanded it to a 9-hole course, boasts a membership of 90 and still growing. Mr. Ivey pointed out.

A membership drive is planned here as soon as the details can be worked out. At this meeting a committee is to be formed to carry the project forward.

Robert Lee Takes 8 Firsts, Debate Puts Bronte Over

Robert Lee came out a close second with Bronte leading in total points at the District 73-B meet at Sterling City last Saturday.

Rita Tillman topped the list in ready writing, Linda Heuvel and Mary Beth Walker in typewriting, Raynelle Bloodworth and Rosalind Bradham in shorthand.

Robert McBroom was first in science, Linda McBroom and Diane Samuelson first in spelling and plain writing.

By The Editor)

On May 2, both Democratic and Republican primaries in Texas will select their candidates for the General Election in November. In Precinct 1, you can go either into the Democratic or the Republican Primary.

No Republican primary has been announced anywhere else in the county.

PARTIES ALL MIXED

But party lines are not what they used to be. In Congress there is a Democratic-Republican Liberal coalition, and there is a Democratic-Republican Conservative coalition.

Party lines are crossed so much in the voting there that it is impossible to read the Record or read the newspaper reports and know what is actually Democratic and what is Republican policy at any one time.

It is just something we have got to live with. To cry for an uncrossed party line now would be like sitting down by the railroad track and weeping for a steam locomotive. It just doesn't happen any more.

Everytime a President or one trying to be elected President makes a campaign speech he is inviting somebody to cross a party line and vote for him. Actually it is those who do cross over that

swing the nation-wide election. To be clearly understood, I must make it clear that I am not going into the Republican primary, much as I love and respect some who will do so.

But I reserve freedom of choice in November in the U.S. Senate and presidential race.

If that is not satisfactory to party leadership, if the county committee or the state committee will so notify me, I will publish their notification and get out.

But there's going to have to be a way to keep independent thinking Texans free in the Democratic party, otherwise if people keep getting out there could come a time when a Democrat cannot be elected to office in Texas. There's a limit to how many the party can spare.

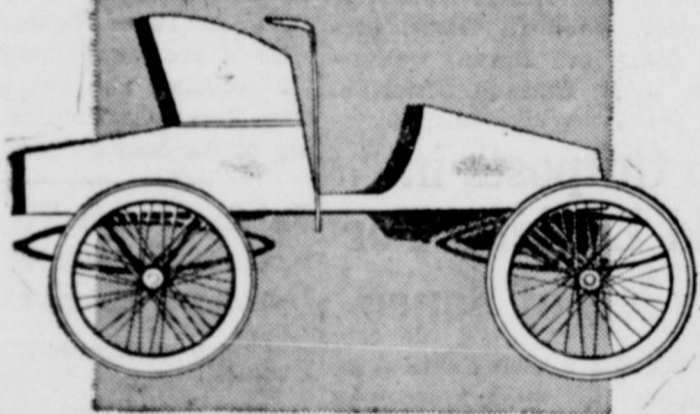

Some Things Medicine Can't Do, Often Needs Help

Editor's Note: The writer served three years as a chaplain in the Army of the United States, part of that time on duty with Brooke General Hospital, one of the world's greatest military hospitals.

During that duty he worked closely with Doctors of Medicine, Doctors of Psychiatry, as well as with the patients themselves.)

The stomach specialist sat with his legs crossed, on the other bed in the hospital room and talked informally with the patient.

"Where is your faith," he asked. The colonel stopped his automo-

bile and beckoned me to him.

"Chaplain," said he, "I certainly appreciate your help over at our place. Visit over there every bit you can. We need what you can do. Many of our patients have problems we doctors cannot touch and you can get at them when we can't."

He was the Doctor of Psychiatry in charge of the "closed ward" which was quite a hospital within itself. There they kept under lock the most disturbed patients—that is to say, the insane.

MEDICINE HAS LIMITATIONS

Said a civilian doctor: "Many people come to us with physical pains and distresses that no medicine on earth can heal. They are actually sick, no doubt about it. But we cannot find one single physical thing wrong with them. The symptoms come from nervous and emotional stresses, and the real remedy is beyond our reach."

Someone goes to see the doctor, with headaches, stomach upsets, back pains, spasms in muscles that control the digestive processes.

The basis of the trouble could be overwork, over worry, obscure nutritional defects, deep seated attitudes toward life—a troubled spi-

rit. There are too many people for him to set up a counselling service. He must deal with immediate cases. He must go on to the next patient.

Tranquilizers, narcotics, real or synthetic offer a temporary relief. But that temporary relief turns too often into permanent grief.

THE GREAT PHYSICIAN

Doctors have been frank to tell me that many of their patients would do better to go to their minister or to their God. Some doctors frankly tell the patient that. Others won't do it, feel that it would be futile. He or she couldn't sleep the night before, will not sleep tomorrow night.

The patient has duties to perform, work to do, a family to keep. Unknowingly, the patient brings the doctor to a quick way out. But it prolongs the problem, brings no healing.

"Where is your faith?" asked the stomach specialist. His conversation with that patient was all the medication that would help her at that time, and he knew it.

In those dark hours between midnight and dawn, many have turned to the Great Physician who can do for both the physician and the patient with a certain healing of the mind and spirit which the great doctors I have known frankly admit they cannot provide alone.

AIDS TO MEDICINE

Along with a faith to tie to, there are some other practical considerations if all concerned adhered to might save both the patient and the doctor a lot of worry.

One is that the human body will stand just so much work. There's a time for rest. Take it. If you don't, then the body will force you to it, and that isn't good. Look at your cat. He knows how to relax.

Then there is the element of nutrition, into which researchers

have been working faster than the medical schools have absorbed the fruits of this research. In great medical centers there are those who make a specialty of being consultant to physicians in this field.

Adele Davis is one of these. She has as much scientific training in this field as doctors have in medicine. Her book, "Let's Eat Right to Keep Fit" has been a help to a lot of people, including physicians.

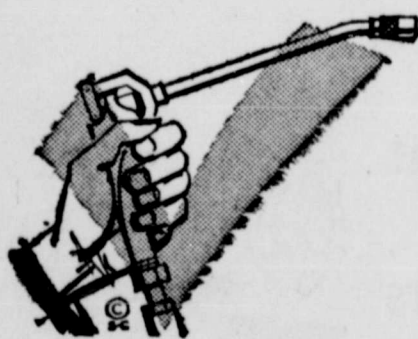

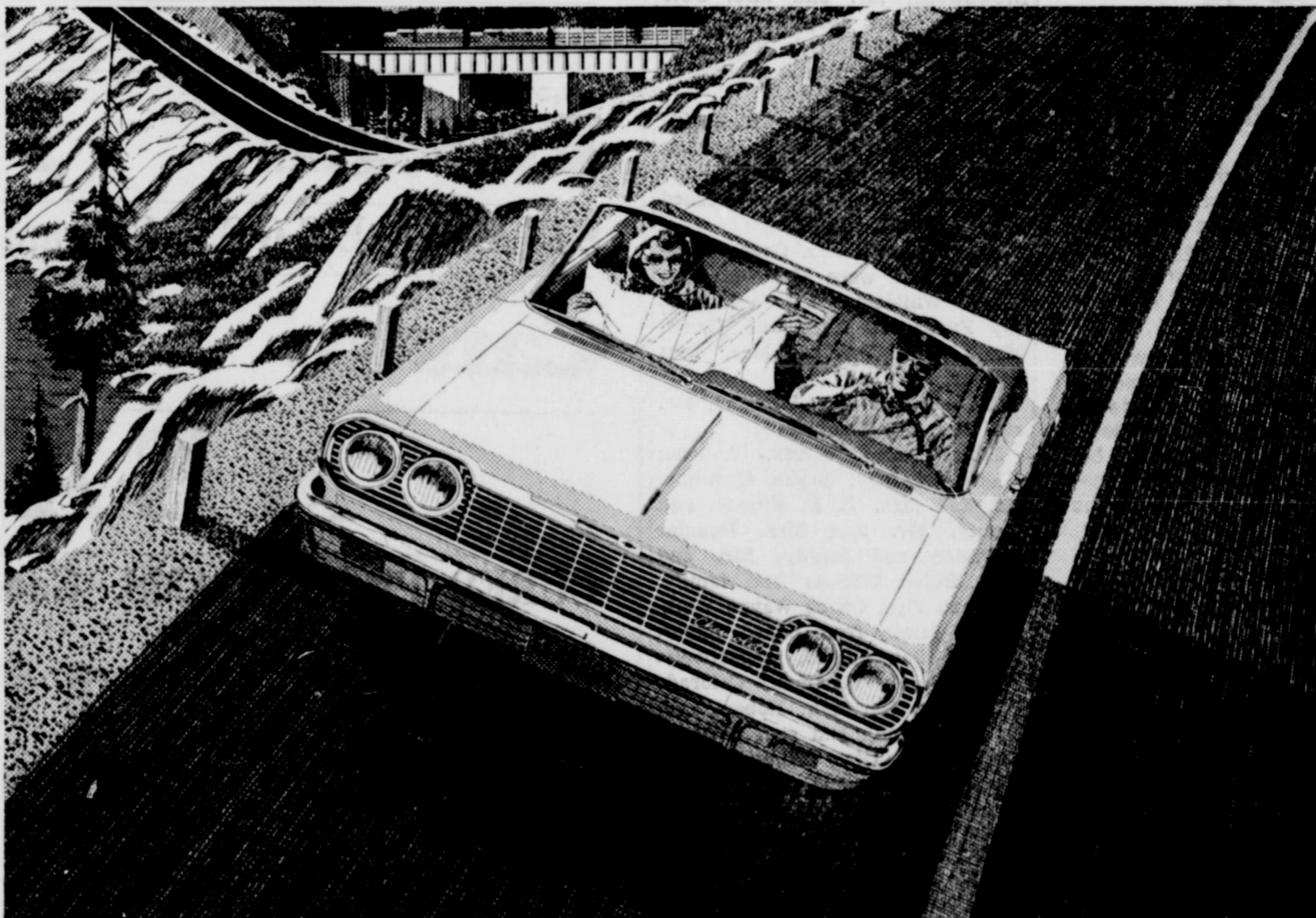

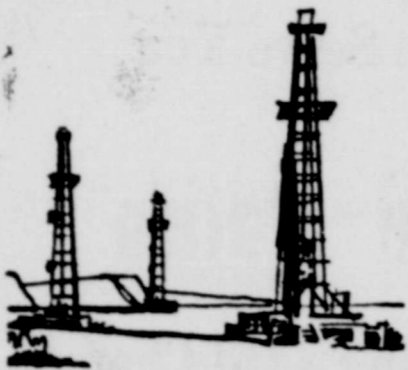
