FACTS PRESENTED HERE...

Oswald Visited Cuba Before J.F.K Murder; Castro, Reds Involved

Lee Harvey Oswald was in Cuba and saw Castro awhile before the assassination. He was an active Castro agent in the United States operating under the name A. J. Heidel, the same name he used in ordering the gun that killed President Kennedy.

Two days before the assassination, he got a letter in Dallas from an official of the Communist party, which ended with, "Stay in Dallas. Stick with it."

In a speech in Havana, Castro let it slip, when he remarked, "When Oswald was here the first time...and then checked himself."

Information has been presented to the FBI and the Warren Commission showing that both Oswald and Ruby were in Havana. The Dallas police have proof that not only that Oswald killed the president, but that Ruby was in the plot with him.

Castro began his assassination career in 1948 when he killed a student leader opposed to com-

munist in the University of Havana.

Cuban Intelligence Report

These facts were brought out and sources cited when a Cuban lawyer, holding a Doctor of Law degree from Havana and one of the leaders in the present movement to re-take Cuba visited here with Billy James Hargis, nationally known Christian Crusade leader.

Both were guests last Saturday at the I. A. Bird ranch, during a week-end series of addresses in San Angelo, in the Evangelical Methodist Church, Rev. Ernest R. Dewitt, pastor, and were interviewed by the Observer editor.

Exhibiting Spanish language Latin American newspapers and referring to intelligence reports of the Cuban organization, Dr. Carlos Bringuier traced Castro's communist connections at the time the New York Times was reporting that he was not a Communist. He stated that the Cuban Student Directorate, Cuban freedom organization, had submitted to the Warren Commission evidence of Castro's connection with President Kennedy's murderer.

Dr. Hargis showed a copy of a letter from a communist official to Oswald received in Dallas two days before the assassination. It closed with "Stay in Dallas. Stick with it."

The Cuban leader showed the audience a Spanish language newspaper from Central America quoting one of Castro's aides in a speech to a Panama crowd, "You don't have to use children. ALL YOU NEED IS A SNIPER WITH A TELESCOPIC SIGHT."

Bringuier said it is comparatively simple for anyone visiting the Cuban embassy in Mexico to get to Cuba in a small boat quickly. Authorities have already traced Oswald to the Cuban embassy in Mexico City some time before the assassination.

The Cuban attorney now lives in New Orleans. He is the man who held the radio debate with Oswald in New Orleans, in which Oswald took his stand openly as a communist.

Chief Justice Warren who heads the commission investigating the assassination said some time ago that matters were coming before the commission "so sensitive" that they may not be made public during our lifetime.
