NOTES ON STATE DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION

"Mrs. B. St. George Tucker, member of the State Executive Committee, and myself took the 9:30 flight to Houston Monday morning. Mr. Dean Chenoweth was on the same flight. As we neared Austin it was rainy and rough so by the time we arrived at Houston every lady on the plane was air sick, but by the time we arrived at the hotel we were feeling fine.

"After picking up our credentials, tickets, etc., we met Mrs. Tucker's daughter, Mrs. Steph, the former Mrs. Pat Scott Massarano (Mrs. Steph's husband is editor of the Galveston paper), and we shared a suite together. At 3:00 the three of us attended a coffee given by Mrs. Connally at the Shamrock Hotel. At 4:30 I attended the Tom Green County Caucus and then at 5:00 we went to the 21st Congressional District Caucus. Judge Dibrell of Coleman led the prayer, Mr. Hal

Woodward was elected Chairman of this Caucus, and Mr. Pat Murphy and myself along with six others were put on a nominating committee. At this meeting there were 72 out of 86 votes present.

"This was the first convention that I had ever attended and I found it to be a real learning experience. Everything ran quite smoothly and very, very business like. I was instructed to cast Coke's two votes under the unit rule and I voted to support Gov. Connally to lead the Texas Democrats at the National Democratic

Convention in August.

"Mrs. Tucker, Mrs. Steph and myself also attended a party given by Byron Tunnell, Speaker of the House, at 6:00 Monday evening. Governor Connally also was a guest and again it was a pleasure to have a few words with him.

"Tuesday morning at the Convention Hall there were crowds and crowds of people but no demonstrations. All the issues were handled in a quiet business like way, and harmony was the keynote."

Our Home Circle

Although food is generally the largest single expense in a family budget, consumers can generally reduce the amount they spend by observing a few careful buying rules.

Here are suggestions that might help you:

Check weekly specials in food store advertisements, and prepare a grocery list before you shop.

Compare costs of buying foods in the various forms—fresh, frozen, or canned—or the weight of the package to determine best yields for the money. In order to make an intelligent choice among brands of the same product, test

different ones to see which one gives the greatest quality and number of servings for the money.

Shop carefully for low-cost foods within each major food group.

Use grades in making your purchases of food.

Take advantage of seasonal abundances. These foods will be at their peak of quality, and sometimes will be offered at lower prices.

Limit perishable food purchases to amounts that can be used while they are in top quality.

Prevent food waste by proper storage and by cooking methods that conserve nutrients.

Increase skills in cookery.

Consider family likes and dislikes when food shopping. Thrifty food buys pay off only if your family eats and enjoys the foods, the specialist reminds. Families in Coke County who are interested in more information on food budgets and meal planning are invited to call on me for further help.

REFRIGERATE EGGS—An egg is a high quality protein food. During summer months use eggs in a variety of ways to speed up meal preparation. Remember, the flavor and food value of white and brown eggs are the same. Now that warm weather is here, be especially careful about refrigeration. Buy eggs stored in a refrigerated case and transfer them as quickly as possible to your refrigerator. The grade shown on the carton indicates the quality.

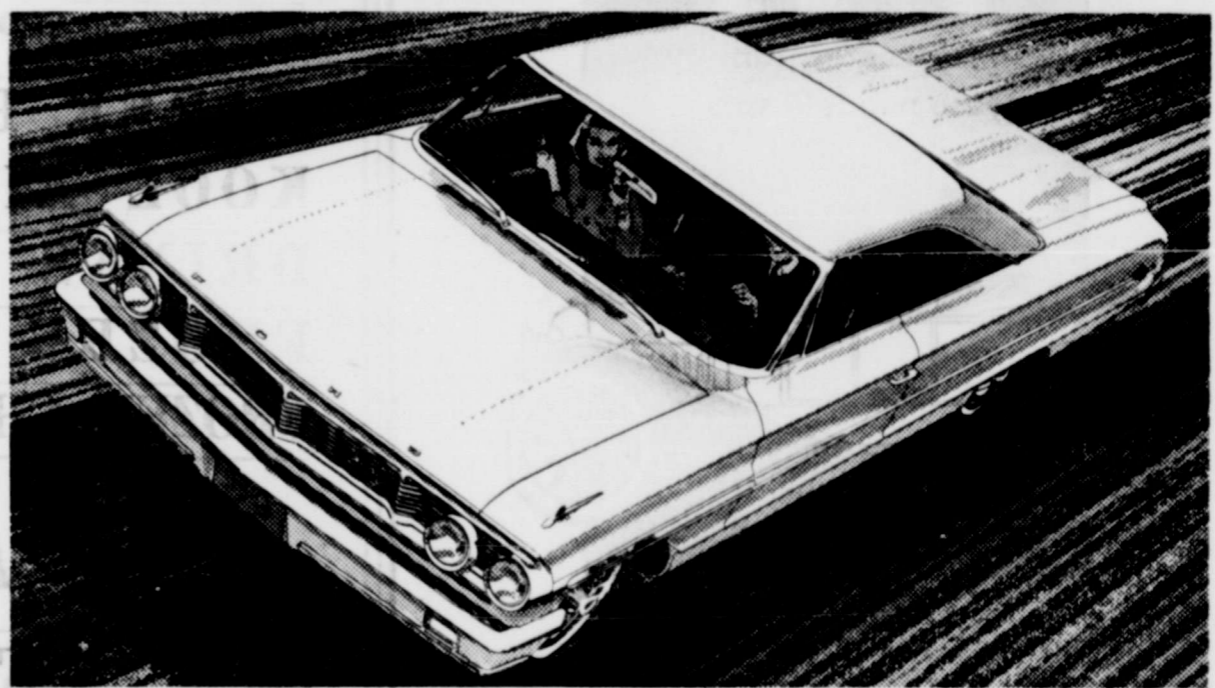

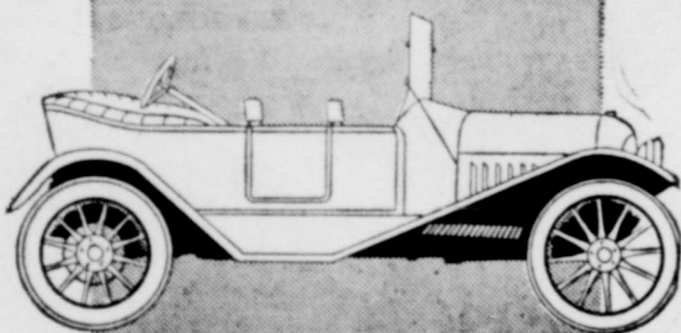
