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

WACO - (Spl.) - The President of the Texas Farm Bureau has urged both Texas Senators to press for legislation before Congress adjourns to reverse the Supreme Court's decision on apportionment of state legislatures.

In a telegram to Senators Yarborough and Tower, C. H. De-Vaney said, "Delay would create further confusion and jeopardize chances for ultimate reversal if a Constitutional amendment is necessary."

> Texas experienced its fifth straight screwworm free week. Arizona reported 13 cases, a slight increase. That area is being hot spotted at the present time.

> Despite our worm free period, we need to be watchful. The recent showers could change the situation if one case goes undetected.

Muddy water is a problem in some farm tanks or ponds. This is particularly true if an operator is trying to produce fish.

Several types of treatments have been used to clear water in farm tanks. You may be interested in one of the following:

- 1. Broadcast agricultural gypsum evenly over the tank surface at the rate of 100 pounds per acre-
- 2. Broadcast aluminum potassium sulfate (commercial alum crystals) on the pond at the rate of 10 pounds per acre-foot.
- 3. Broadcast hydrated lime on the tank at the rate of 30 pounds per acre-foot.
- 4. Broadcast mowed grass cuttings or hay on the tank at the rate of one to two tons per surface acre of water. This method is not usually successful when the water is excessively turbid.

### **Martin Dies Says** Johnson's Record


