Mrs. Lura Smith Funeral Services Held Thursday

Another of Robert Lee and Coke County's pioneers passed on last week when Mrs. Lura Trimble Smith, at the age of 85 died at 8:30 Wednesday morning in West Coke Hospital after an extended illness.

Funeral was held Thursday at Robert Lee Methodist Church.

She was born Lura Bell Vowell July 13, 1879 in Montague County and as a small child moved with her parents to the Robert Lee area before Coke County was organized, when this area still was part of Tom Green County.

Mrs. Smith lived in the Edith community before moving to Robert Lee. She was the last survivor of the large Levi Vowell family. A lifelong Methodist, she was a member of that church's WSCS. She also was a member of El Valle Garden Club.

She was married to E. (Monte) Trimble in San Angelo, Sept. 29, 1894. He died Dec. 18, 1936. She was married to J. J. S. Smith in July 1939. He died in 1953.

Survivors include three sons, Curtis W., Jack and M. E. Trimble, all of Robert Lee; three daughters, Mrs. Ernest (Alma) Varnadore of Del Norte, Colo.; Mrs. Jim (Josie) Russell of Lovington, N. M., and Mrs. Verna Donaghue of San Angelo; nine grandchildren and 14 great-grandchildren.

Editorial: After Election A Better Time To Kill Site

Suddenly the LOWER Colorado River Authority, a Federal agency, needs 90 days to get their marbles together for the hearing before the Texas Water Commission at Austin on the Robert Lee dam site.

Suddenly this editor realizes this postponement would put the hearing AFTER the election. Why?

The Lower Colorado Authority has known this dam was in the works for years. For at least six months they have known that Colorado River Municipal Water District would file an application to change their permit to this site.

We have though LCRA would not oppose this project — that they would let it alone. Now they need 90 more days to let it alone. Why? There can be but one answer. The Lower Colorado River Authority for some NEW reason, intends to kill the Robert Lee project or cut it down to the size of a duck pond.

This is something they can do more comfortably AFTER the election than BEFORE it.

The hearing should be held on October 19, the date it is set. The permit should be granted at that time. The Stacy project and the Menard project are two other dams. They can be decided in due time.

Steers Blank Menard, To Richland Springs

Pretty well geared and oiled for a machine with as many new parts fitted into the older mechanism. Coach Garland Davis's Steers didn't show much tension in clicking off a 20-0 win over the Menard Yellow Jackets in the traditional opener with the boys from down on the San Saba.

Glenn Roach has grown to Big Bill's size at center, and Terry Thetford was back in form at quarterback. Ricky Hatch got off to a good start, as did the whole string, for that matter, and the Steers didn't have to bring out front all their talent that undoubtedly will be in on the point making before the season ends.

PASS 37 YDS. TO GOAL

The first counter came with three minutes left in the 2nd quarter after both teams just footballled around on a fairly even basis. Thetford had put the ball to first down on the 37 yard line, the next play left it there with 2nd down and 10 to go, a pass was incomplete, then one from Thetford was good to Hatch clear over the goal line, and Dodson was over for the two count bonus, score 8-0.

There it stood at the half, when Billie Canon, Menard Band Teacher introduced his 40-piece band for

the mid-game feature. At the half, also Supt. Dorman Thomas accepted for the school the new clock-score board donated by the Quarterback Club and the firms and citizens of Robert Lee near the end of last year's season.

Dodson kicked long and low, the ball sithered to the Jackets goal, with a Jacket return to their 12. Menard never got back to their 30—lost the ball on downs, then Dodson plunged through left tackle, and powered, dodged and plowed his way from his 30 to the Jackets 30 for 40 yards. Then with 3rd down and 9 yards to go, Thetford connected one to Wink for a touchdown. Try for points stopped at the Jacket line, and it was 14-0.

PLAY SMOOTH ENOUGH

It was not a blood battle, and the play was smooth enough on both sides. The Steers recovered a Jacket fumble on the Steer 49, failed to make their 10, then Dodson kicked the ball dead over the goal line.

The Wasps made them a first down, from their 20, but Sparks recovered on the Yellow Jackets 38, then with 3d down and 6 to go, Terry shot one to Hatch, who ran around left on to the goal, but try for points was no good again, and the score was 20-0, where it remained to the end of the game.

The Jackets made one real threat to score after they went on the wing from nearly on their own goal line late in the fourth quarter, didn't connect with the first sharp tosses. But they kicked out to the center stripe, Thetford took a short toss and ran 35 yards around left end, then after McInnis recovered a Steer fumble, the Jackets tried their wing again, and Hatch intercepted.

JACKETS NEARLY DO

For awhile the Steers kept the play on Jacket ground when a fake play took the ball to the 44, a long pass to Woods was good on the Steer 13, another pass was completed to put the ball at goal to go, but the final Jacket toss was incomplete just at the instant the clock stopped, with the final count 20-0.

Coke County Vote Averages 40 Per Cent Republican

Coke County in 1956 voted Democratic 55.7 per cent with 690 votes; Republican 44.3 per cent, with 549 votes.

In 1960 the county voted Democratic 58.2 per cent with 799 votes; Republican 41.8 per cent with 575 votes.

In 1961 the vote was Democratic 64.2 per cent with 360 votes, Republican 35.8 per cent with 201 votes.

In 1962 it was Democratic 59.7% with 538 votes; Republican 40.3 per cent, with 363 votes.

A second look at these figures will reveal that Coke County has had more Republican votes in years of presidential elections, showing more dissatisfaction with National policies of the party than with the party inside the state.

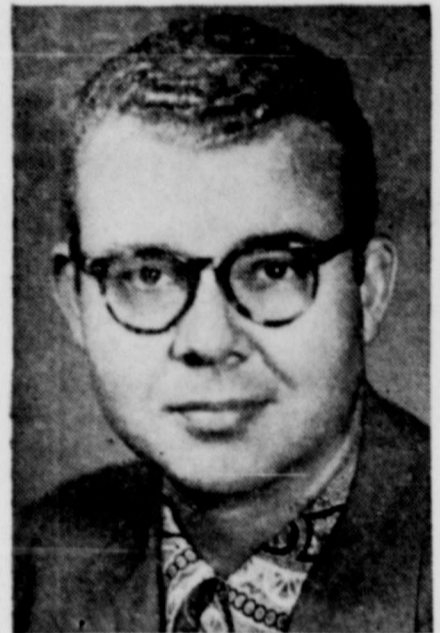

Bethel Baptist Mission Revival Begins Sunday

Farm Bureau Urges Law On Apportionment

WACO — (Spl.) — The President of the Texas Farm Bureau has urged both Texas Senators to press for legislation before Congress adjourns to reverse the Supreme Court's decision on apportionment of state legislatures.

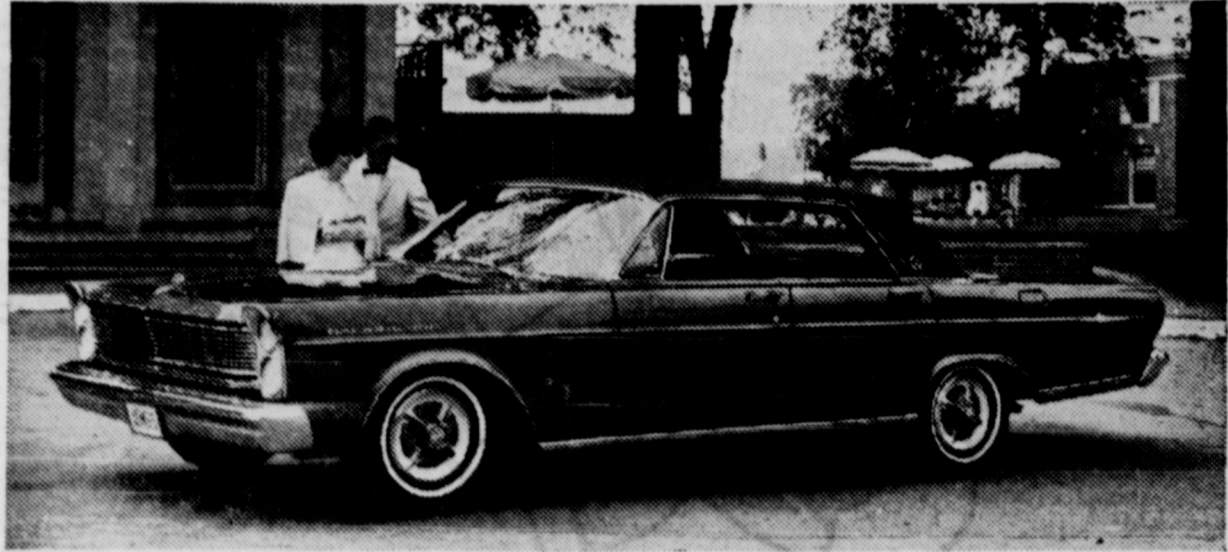
In a telegram to Senators Yarborough and Tower, C. H. DeVaney said, "Delay would create further confusion and jeopardize chances for ultimate reversal if a Constitutional amendment is necessary."

The Texas Farm Bureau believes, he said, in the "time-tested and successful pattern" of representation on an area basis in the U. S. Senate and on a population basis in the U. S. Senate.

"This provides a workable system of checks and balances which assures a truly representative government with consideration for minority and area interests," the state farm leader said.

DeVaney declared that at the time of adoption of the Constitution and subsequent amendments, "it was never presumed to authorize federal regulation of the apportionment of state legislatures."

The Texas Farm Bureau, of which DeVaney is president, has a membership of more than 90,000 farm and ranch families, and is organized in 200 counties.

Our State's rank in value of various commodities varies. Texas is first in cotton and grain sorghums, second in rice and cattle, fourth in value of sheep, fifth in peanuts and turkeys, sixth in eggs, seventh in broilers, ninth in the value of hay and tenth in value of wheat and dairy products produced.

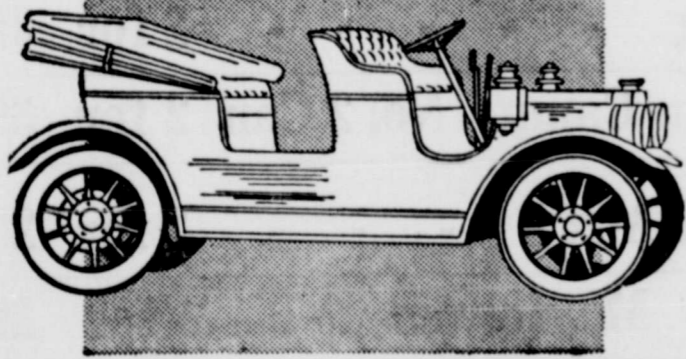
He was Congressman-at-Large from the entire State of Texas six years—from 1953 to 1959.

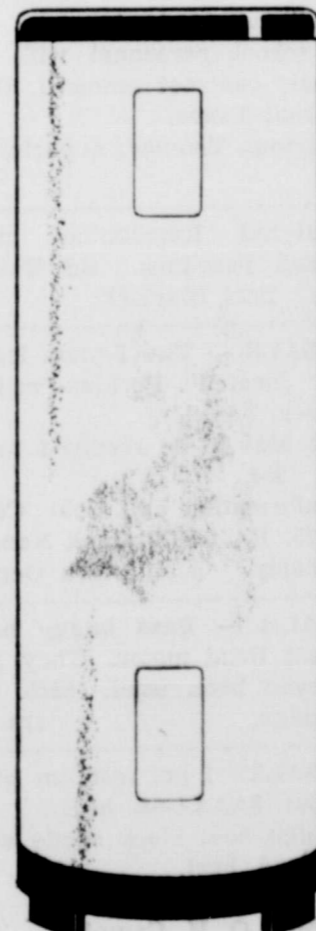

Notice is hereby given to whom concerned that the application of COLORADO RIVER MUNICIPAL WATER DISTRICT, P. O. Box 869, Big Spring, Texas, was received on the 17th day of July, 1964, in the office of the Texas Water Commission. Applicant seeks to amend its Application No. 2162, granted June 20, 1960, as follows:

(1) To change the location of the dam from the point proposed in Application No. 2162 on the Colorado River in Mitchell County, to a point on the Colorado River in Coke County. The new location sought for the dam is approximately 2 miles west of Robert Lee, Texas, with station 74+00 on the centerline of the proposed dam located S 1° 05' E 10,645 feet from the southeast corner of Section 412, H & TC RR Co. Survey, Block 1-A, A-1676, Coke County, Texas;

(2) To increase the storage capacity of the dam and reservoir by a total of 85,060 acre-feet (from 403,700 acre-feet at the original Mitchell County dam site to 488,760 acre-feet at the proposed Coke County dam site);

(3) To divert the water to be appropriated at a point which bears S 15° 10' W 2011 feet from the southwest corner of H & TC RR Co. Survey, Block 1-A, A-1676, Coke County, Texas, on the left bank of the Colorado River, approximately 3.2 miles northwest from Robert Lee, Texas, and to increase the rate of diversion by 30,000 gallons per minute (from 40,000 gallons per minute authorized under Application No. 2162 to 70,000 gallons per minute);

(4) To change the amount of water authorized to be appropriated under Application No. 2162 for industrial use from 5,000 acre-feet of water per annum to 2,000 acre-feet of water per annum, and for mining use from 5,000 acre-feet of water per annum to 8,000 acre-feet of water per annum, but not changing the amount of 40,000 acre-feet of water per annum authorized to be appropriated for municipal use nor the total amount of 50,000 acre-feet of water authorized to be appropriated annually under said Application No. 2162.

(5) To add as an additional authorized use, the use in place in the reservoir of the total amount of water impounded therein for the purpose of recreation.

The place of use of the waters used for municipal, industrial and mining purposes will be in the following counties in the Colorado River watershed, but only in those portions thereof within the watershed of the Colorado River: Coke, Ector, Glasscock, Howard, Martin, Midland, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Scurry and Sterling Counties. Notice of this fact is hereby given to record appropriators in the Colorado River watershed, both within the watershed as a whole and within those portions of said watershed in the above-described counties in which the water is to be introduced and used.

Water which is diverted for municipal use but not consumed as a result thereof will be returned to the Colorado River and its tributaries at sites of the sewage treatment plants of cities served by the District within the above-named counties. Water which is

diverted for industrial use or mining use but not consumed as a result thereof will be returned to the Colorado River or its tributaries within the above-named counties.

Applicant further proposes to construct a system of low-flow pollution control diversion works in the channel of the Colorado River in Scurry and Mitchell Counties, and to use as part of its appropriation for mining purposes polluted waters there occurring, consisting of the salt water, oil field brines and commingled salt and fresh water.

Said application was accepted for filing by the Texas Water Commission on the 17th day of August, 1964, as Application No. 2162-A, and a hearing thereon will be held by the Texas Water Commission, in the office of the Commission at Austin, Texas, on MONDAY, OCTOBER 19, 1964, beginning at ten o'clock a.m., at which time and place all parties interested may appear and be heard. Those opposing the granting of said application should file written protests with the Commission and the applicant at least five days prior to hearing date, giving their reasons therefor and such other information as is required by Commission Rule 305.2. Such hearing will be conducted from time to time, and from place to place, if necessary, until such determination has been made relative to said application as the said Texas Water Commission may deem right, equitable and proper.
