The stout Hermleigh forward wall held the Steers to a minimum of yardage the first half of play before the difference in conditioning finally wore them down.

First Quarter

With Gartman, Wink, Vosburg, and Thetford taking turns and 2 first down drives, Vosburg busted through for the TD. Try for points was no good, and the Steers led 6 to 0.

Second Quarter

Hermleigh was forced to punt again, and the Steers took over on their own 35 yard line. In two carries, the Steers took the ball at the 50, a hard tackle caused a fumble and Hermleigh recovered.

Again the defense held, the Cardinals punted into the end zone, and the Steers took over on the 20 yard line. From here they drove to the Cardinals 38, with a long gainer — a 33 yard pass to Williams. But the Cardinals held again, taking over on downs, moved only 7 yards, and had to punt again.

Two Robert Lee Brothers In Last World War I Push

Forty-six years ago next Wednesday as a strange quiet came the roar of heavy artillery was still ringing in the ears of Freeman Clark of Robert Lee, back at Camp Coquedon, close to Paris.

As a radio operator drive he had been with a heavy artillery outfit that was laying down the barrages ahead of the infantry as they did in the heavy fighting of World War I.

Conda Clark, who had been up there with the infantry in the St. Mihiel drive, was wounded and in a hospital at LeHavre.

After that, Freeman spent six months in the Army of Occupation in eastern France.

With airplanes as observers radioing positions to the ground Freeman's heavy gun outfit could lay them in close.

Chism Brown also was with an outfit up in France at that time.

Democrats Win Landslide Vote

As the Observer went to press Wednesday morning it was evident that President Lyndon Johnson and the Democratic party has swept the nation in a landslide election, with a record number of votes cast.

Goldwater had carried six states with a total of 52 electoral, while Johnson had carried 482 electoral votes, with Hawaii not reported.

In Coke County 900 votes went to Johnson, 366 to Goldwater. Ralph Yarborough led George Bush, Republican, by 783 to 464. O. C. Fisher polled the highest number of votes of any opposed candidate—1082 to Claypool's 206. Governor Connally outran Crichton in the county with 997 to 246. In the state, Ralph Yarborough won the senatorial race, while two Republican Congressmen, Bruce Alger and Ed Foreman both lost their places in the House of Representatives.

States carried by Goldwater were Alabama, Arizona, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, and South-Carolina.

The deadline for records of conservation accomplishments of nominees to be submitted to county Extension Service offices for judging is next Feb. 1. Records of county winners will be sent to the regional committees in mid-February.

A top homemaker and five regional winners will be selected from among the outstanding district and regional candidates whose records are to be submitted to Mrs. Florence W. Low, Extension assistant director for home economics.

Nominees need not be enrolled in home demonstration club work.

The Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A&M University cooperates with the Fort Worth Press in the annual award program, a part of the "Save the Soil and Save Texas" campaign of the newspaper. Marvin Garrett, conservation editor for the newspaper, is general chairman for the campaign.

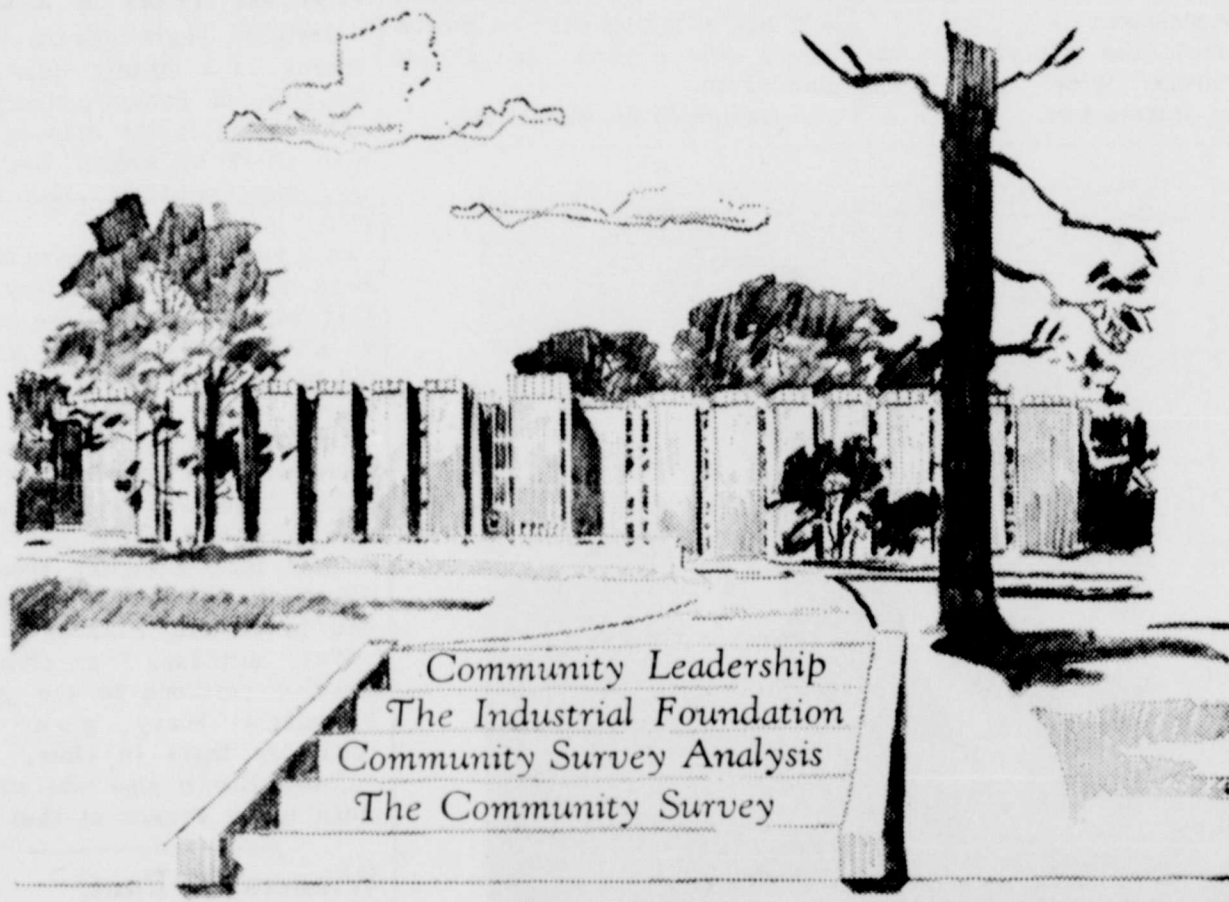

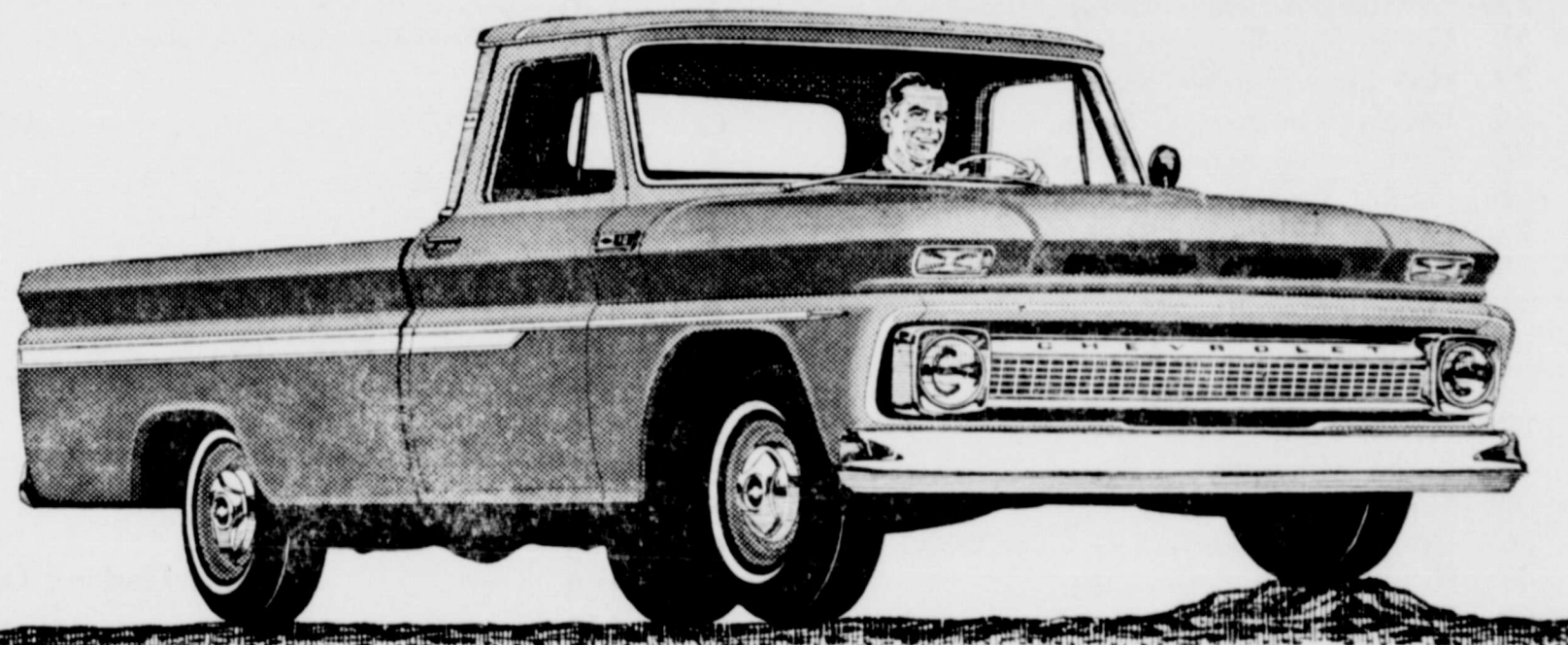
