Mr. Bird, a native of Coke County, returned to his home at Sanco following three years service in World War II, engaged in the ranching business, which he will continue to operate.

Mr. Oglesby stated that the identity of the newspaper will continue as a separate and distinct service to its readers and advertisers.

Oglesby was born in Grayson County, but moved to the Plains with his parents when a small child. The family lived in Lubbock and Sudan, and he began working for the Sudan News in 1937. Following graduation from high school there, he entered Texas Tech as a journalism student, working as a Linotype operator at the Tech Press, part

Early in 1942, Oglesby volunteered for Navy duty. He was called to active duty in 1943, at the end of his junior year in Texas Tech, and graduated from Midshipman School at Northwestern University in Chicago. He was then sent to the South Pacific, where he served 18 months on a small Navy transport.

Mrs. Oglesby, better known as Libby, grew up in the Westbrook community of Mitchell County. Her parents still live on and operate the family farm there. She is a graduate of Westbrook High School and has a degree in jour-



Here are current trends in the retail distribution of apparel.

Recent studies indicate an increase by consumers in mail order buying. Apparel buying tops the list of mail order purchases.

Sales of ten percent or more above a year ago have been reported by the "big four" mail order houses.

Appeals are in the terms of price — with a net saving of seven percent over its store price estimated by one mail order house. Other factors are the convenience of home shopping quick delivery, telephone orders, and fashion merchandise -including creations of leading designers.

Catalogs of the mail order firms have been tailored for more sophisticated audiences. The catalogs are larger and more attractive, and there are more color illustrations. The current trend is for an increase in the number of catalog order stores.

Other trends in apparel buying reported by trade representatives are an expansion of door-to-door selling, emphasizing the convenience it offers the suburban homemaker with young children. Expansion in the clothing and textiles field included door-to-door selling of fabrics, rugs and draperies.

Discounters are expanding again with an average of seven new discount stores a week estimated by the trade. Discounters tend to operate their own stores, and they do no seem eager to take over the shoe departments or the millinery departments.

The kind of cleanser you use on your bathroom fixtures can have a decided bearing on how well the finish lasts.

A harsh, gritty cleanser will soon scratch and mar the surface. Try this test to check the abrasiveness of a cleanser,

Put a small amount of cleanser between two pieces of glass. Rub them together. If the glass is scratched, the cleanser is too harsh to use on the bathroom fix-

The most energy-saving location for the home washer and dryer is at right angles to each other.

Studies have shown that the best location is to have the washer on the left and dryer on the right.

Allow a work space three feet deep and four feet wide in front of the washer. Allow one foot between the appliances. It's easier to do the laundry if there is enough room to work easily.

Other considerations in locating the laundry might be: 1. On the main floor, to save

The rate reduction, announced late last year by the Federal Communications Commission, extends the hours during which station to station late night rates and night rates are in effect.

For example, the late night rates which apply only to station to station interstate calls (formerly referred to as the "After 9" rates) are now in effect all day Sunday and from 8 p.m. to 4:30 a.m. Monday through Satfect from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. each day, now will be in effect all day Saturday (from 4:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. and from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Friday



A. J. Hemphill, district manager of the Fort Worth office of Dun & Bradstreet, Inc., today announced statement requests were mailed to 48 businesses in Coke County. He said figures obtained from a physical count of the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book for January 1965.

Hemphill noted that each January business concerns in all parts of the United States are asked by Dun & Bradstreet for copies of their financial statements. This year requests are being sent to nearly three millicn business concerns - to the corner grocery store worth a few thousand dollars as well as to businesses worth millions.

The Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book lists those manufacturers, wholesalers, and retailers who seek or grant commercial credit but it does not include some of the service and professional businesses such as beauty and barber shops, security dealers and real estate brokers. Therefore, the figures for total business in the United States spending several weeks with her would be higher than the three son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and million quoted above.

During the past year, Hemphill added. 28 changes were made in the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book listings of Coke County businesses, including nine names added, eight names deleted, and 11 changes in the ratings of continuing businesses. The changes occurring in Coke County are about even with the rest of the country where a change of business significance is counted every five seconds.

When the owner or officer of a business enterprise, or his accountant, fills in and mails his financial statement to Dun & Bradstreet, it becomes part of the credit report on his business and a factor in determining the credit rating of his business.

Back of each listing of a business in the Reference Book is a Dun & Bradstreet credit report. The report includes the following: a record of how the business is paying its bills; a history of the business (who owns it, who runs it, and how long it has been operating); a description of what the business does and how it does it; a financial section which usually includes the latest financial statement.
