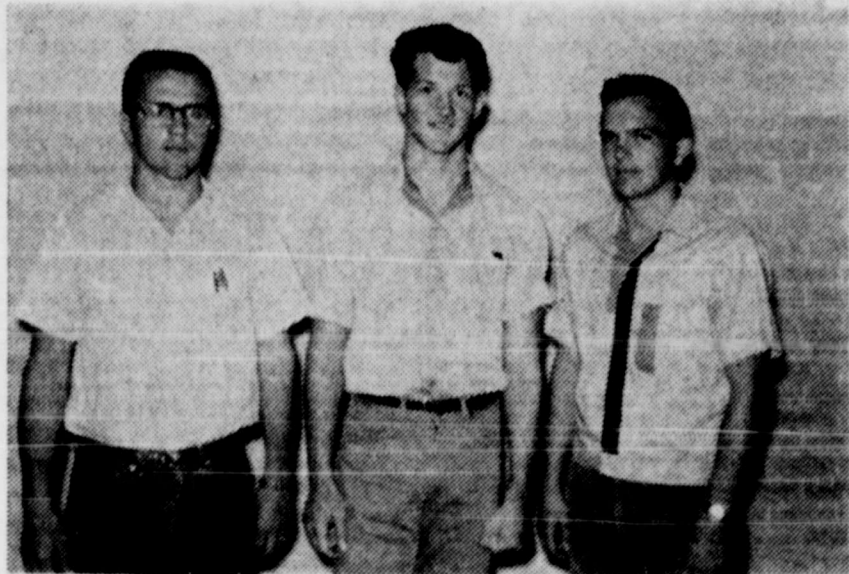

RL Trackmen Second At District 67-B Meet

Three Robert Lee High School athletes qualified last Saturday to compete in the regional Interscholastic League track meet which will be held April 24 in Big Spring. Terry Thetford, Dennis Gartman and Pistol Hood took three first places and two second places at the District 67-B meet at Big Spring. Robert Lee High

won second place in the meet with a total of 131 points.

Bronte took first place honors with 164 points, Forsan was third with 88, Garden City was fourth with 60, Water Valley was fifth with 30, and Sterling City wound up in sixth place with 21.

Meeting Called to Study Anti-Poverty Program

A large delegation of Coke County residents attended a meeting Tuesday night in Sweetwater which was set up to explain the workings of the President's anti-poverty program. The local citizens were interested in obtaining information on any possible assistance which might be received here for improvement of the economic situation.

County Judge W. W. Thetford announced Wednesday morning that he thought the County Committee on Progress, which is already functioning, would be a proper sponsor for the program

in Coke County.

Consequently, the chairman of the committee, E. F. Glenn of Bronte, has called a meeting of all members for 7:30 p.m., Tuesday, April 20, at the courthouse in Robert Lee.

Glenn urged that all members of the progress committee be present as plans made may be of extreme importance to the welfare of the county and its residents.

Glenn said the explanation of the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 (anti-poverty program) was very enlightening and he is hopeful that Coke County will be able to take advantage of some of the opportunities offered. He said portions of the program are very flexible and probably can be adapted to local conditions.

BCD Hears Report By Mrs. Jordan

Mrs. Georgia Jordan of San Angelo met with members of the Robert Lee BCD Tuesday at noon and discussed plans with the group to set up a Coke County group as part of the Southwest Texas Heart Association, headquartered in San Angelo.

Dr. Bennett A. Joiner of San Angelo is president of the regional association. A few of the needed officials of the Coke County organization have been appointed, including, Dr. John D. McDaniel, medical advisor; Mrs. Finis Millican, memorial gifts chairman; W. D. McAdams, board representative; and Mrs. J. M. Prine Jr., publicity chairman.

McAdams and Mrs. Jordan said Tuesday that they are hopeful a meeting can be called soon for all of Coke County to complete the organization of a local group and enlist as many members as possible.

Mrs. Jordan pointed out that the main purpose of the Heart Association is to distribute educational material and to finance research striving to find new facts, cures, etc., for use in fighting heart disease.

Mrs. Jordan also reminded everyone that heart disease is still the number one killer of Americans, and as such, should be of great interest to every citizen of this country.

February is ordinarily the month for the Heart Drive for funds, but inasmuch as no campaign was carried on then, McAdams said he is hopeful that Coke County will in the next few weeks raise its quota of \$416. He said \$24 has been received as memorial gifts, but pointed out that amount is a long way from the goal. He said anyone who wishes to present memorial gifts should send them to Mrs. Millican at Robert Lee.

New Developments in Knits
A new process has been developed to keep cotton knits from shrinking when machine washed and dryer dried. This process involves compressing the fabric, making it highly resistant to shrinkage in normal laundering. Pac-nit and Permaknit are two well known processes. Investigations by the Good Housekeeping Institute show that these new processed knits shrink about one percent whereas conventional knits shrink up to ten percent — both were machine washed and dryer dried twenty times.

Some manufacturers using this process are: Carters, Coopers, E-Z, Gibbs, Hanes, Mac Dee, Modern Glove, Munsingwear, Spencers, and Stedman.

All knits still need proper laundering.

The use of warm (not hot) water and low to moderate setting on the dryer will result in less shrinkage. When using an automatic dryer for cotton knits, do not dry them bone dry. Remove garment just before completely dry and pat and pull them gently into shape.

Acrylic or nylon knits can be dried completely in a dryer with relatively little shrinkage. They

will wrinkle badly if left sitting in a dryer which has turned off. Wool knits are rarely machine washable...they need a special soap for cold water and they need to be blocked and dried flat.

Food Quality Needs Proper Care
The quality of food homemakers serve can be no better than the quality of food they buy — but it can be a lot worse.

Proper handling and storage of foods is important. Potatoes need careful storage, and they keep best in a cool, dry, dark, well-ventilated place. If put in a warm place, potatoes shrivel and sprout. In a cold place, the starch in potatoes changes to sugar.

Citrus fruits, melons and pineapples actually have better keeping quality when kept out of the refrigerator, at a room temperature of 60 to 70 degrees Fahrenheit.

It's advisable to refrigerate eggs in the original container or some other covered container because uncovered eggs lose moisture through their porous shells.

Salad dressings should be kept in the refrigerator unless they're used within a few days.

Even jellies, jams and peanut butter — once opened — keep best in the refrigerator.

I am giving you Kaye Roberts recipe for "Peachesy Pie" this week. Kaye won first place in

the Senior Favorite Food Show on March 27. She will enter her pie in the District Food Show on May 1, in San Angelo.

Peachesy Pie

Pie Crust
¾ cup shortening
2 cups sifted flour
1 teaspoon salt
½ cup peach syrup
Cut shortening into flour and salt. Add peach syrup and stir so that dough holds together. Roll dough out on floured surface until ¼ inch thick. Fit into 9-inch pie pan. Cut remaining dough into seven small circles with a biscuit cutter.

Peach Filling
1 One lb., 13 oz. can of cling peaches
½ cup sugar
2 tablespoons white corn syrup
1 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 tablespoons cornstarch
Drain peaches well and reserve syrup. Combine remaining ingredients and add to peach slices. Pour into unbaked pie crust.

Cheesecake Topping
2 eggs, slightly beaten
3 oz. package cream cheese
2 tablespoons peach syrup
1 tablespoon lemon juice
½ cup sour cream
1/3 cup sugar
Combine eggs, lemon juice, and peach syrup in small sauce pan. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until thickened. Blend softened cream cheese and sour cream; add to thickened mixture. Beat until smooth.

Pour over peach mixture in pie crust. Be careful doing this. Brush extra circles of dough with peach syrup and arrange on top of the pie, placing one circle in the center. Bake in a 400 degree oven for ten minutes. Cover edges with foil and bake at 350 degrees for 30 to 35 minutes. Cool before serving.

County Agents News Column

Coke County has gone over the top in their drive for funds for the continuation of the Screw-worm Control Program. The goal was reached Tuesday morning with a contribution from the 194th operator. A total of \$2759.93 has been donated by 196 operators at the time of this writing.

The program officials are hoping that each operator will be able to help in the fund drive regardless of the county's drive status. There are areas, in the northern portion of the State particularly, where the county quotas will be difficult to reach.

More than 60 days have passed since the last screwworm case was identified in Texas. February and March were screwworm free months. Four cases have been identified in 1965 — all back in January.

The Coke County 4-H Club Soil Judging Team has been invited to participate in and has made plans to enter the International Land Judging Contest in Oklahoma City on April 28-29. The team placed second in the State Contest last year. Team members planning to make the trip are Doyle Robertson, C. L. Sparks, Lynsey White

and Gaylon Pitcock, all members of the Future Leaders 4-H Club of Robert Lee.

Trees and brush in farm fence rows can take a sizeable hunk of a farmer's income. Such vegetation robs moisture and nutrients from surrounding cropland and can result in reduced production on numerous acres.

Now is the time of the year to apply herbicides to these moisture and nutrient robbers, since labor is usually available during the next few months and working conditions are more desirable. Also, few broadleaf crops are growing which might be damaged from chemical drift.

Garlyn Hoffman, Extension Range Specialist, recommends 2, 4, 5-T for effective control. It should be mixed with diesel oil or kerosene and applied with a hand or back-type sprayer to cut-off tree stumps or trunk bases or in frills or notches to standing trees. A pound to 12 gallons of oil is sufficient for control of mesquite trees.

Monuron, a wettable powder, is excellent for ground application. One pound of the 80 percent powder in 10 gallons of water makes an effective solution. It should be sprayed on the root crown and soil surface in a six-inch band around the tree trunk until a gray film is visible.

Coke County Citizens Buy \$6,735 in Savings Bonds

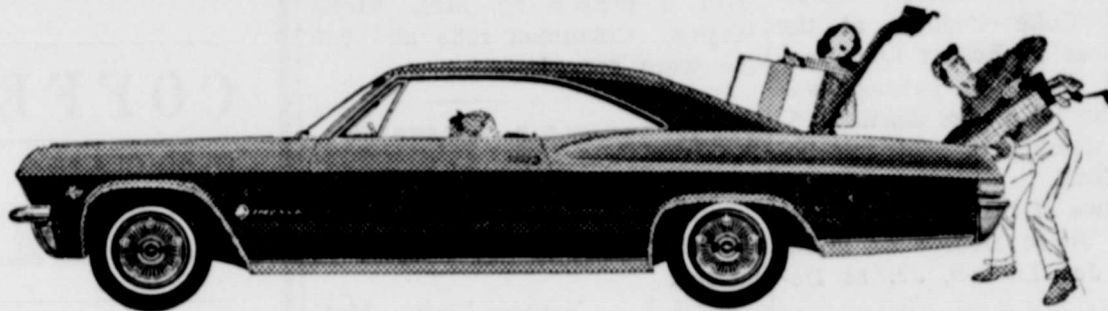

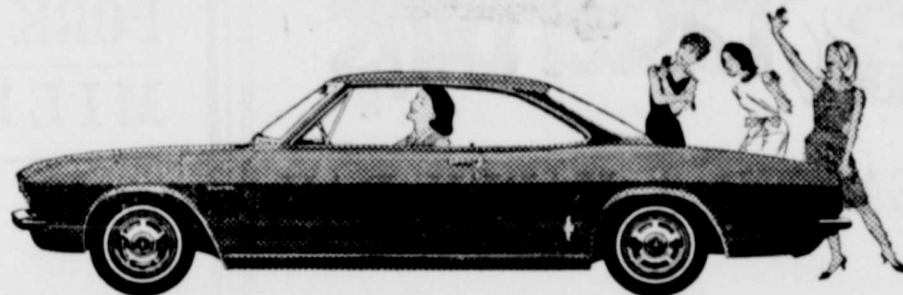
