Hearing Set for Monday On Enlarging UCRA

Word was received here Wednesday morning that a committee hearing will be held at 7:30 p.m. next Monday in Austin on the proposed legislation to enlarge the Upper Colorado River Authority to include 10 counties of this area.

The river authority now takes in Tom Green and Coke Counties, and the proposed enlarged district would add Coleman, Concho, Irion, McCulloch, Menard, Runnels, Schleicher, and Sterling counties.

If the bill creating the new district is approved by the Texas Legislature, it will have to be approved by voters of the counties involved in order to become effective.

Funeral Held for Frank McCabe, Coke Ranchman

Funeral services for Frank McCabe, 72, were held at 2 p.m. Tuesday at Robert Lee Baptist Church with the Rev. Bill Beatty, pastor, officiating. Burial was in McKenzie Cemetery under direction of Williams Funeral Home.

Mr. McCabe, Coke County ranchman and descendant of a pioneer ranching family, died at 4:45 p.m. Sunday at John Sealy Hospital in Galveston where he had been hospitalized about a month. He was a victim of leukemia and had been in ill health for 11 years.

He was born Dec. 16, 1892 in Coke County and was a life-long resident here.

His parents were the late Mr. and Mrs. John Q. McAdams, pioneer ranchers of the Divide community. His father began running cattle in the area in 1879, ten years before the county was organized, while it was still part of Tom Green County.

Mr. McCabe's mother came to the area in 1882 when the Divide ranch was established and was the first white woman to settle in that part of the country.

Mr. McCabe was married to Fern Chumley at Bronte on Oct. 20, 1912. She died in 1947, and he was married to Leola Clere March 10, 1949, in Big Spring.

Survivors include his wife; three sons, Victor McCabe of Colorado City, Wayne McCabe of Silver and J. F. McCabe, Jr., of Robert Lee; a brother, Fred McCabe of Robert Lee; three sisters, Mrs. Mark Chumley and Mrs. A. B. Sheppard of Robert Lee, and Mrs. W. M. Simpson of El Paso; five grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

Pallbearers were Gerald C. Allen, Cumbie Ivey Sr., F. C. Clark, Frank Tillman, Woodrow Gardner, Jesse Eads and Calvin Sparks, all of Robert Lee and J. D. Williams of Colorado City.

MRS. R. C. RUSSELL FALLS, SUSTAINS HIP FRACTURE

Rites Friday for Bryan Yarbrough, Former Teacher

Funeral services are scheduled for 3 p.m. Friday at First Methodist Church in Robert Lee for William Bryan Yarbrough, 68. Mr. Yarbrough died Wednesday morning in West Coke County Hospital where he had been a patient the past nine days. He had been in ill health for several years.

The Rev. Dempsey Salter, pastor, will conduct the last rites, and burial will be in Robert Lee Cemetery under direction of Williams Funeral Home.

Mr. Yarbrough was born July 30, 1896, in Cleburne. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Yarbrough and came to Coke County with his parents in 1904. He was married to the former Jessie Newton on Dec. 28, 1920, in Robert Lee by the Rev. R. B. Young.

He attended school at Denton State College, the University of Texas at Austin and was a 1936 graduate of Sul Ross College in Alpine, where he was a member of Alpha Chi. He majored in business economics and education administration.

A former teacher, Mr. Yarbrough taught ten years at Lockett, nine years at White Point, and was principal of Robert Lee High School for three years. He was also a former tax assessor of Coke County.

He was a member of the Hayrick Masonic Lodge of Robert Lee, and also the Woodmen of the World. He was a member of the original board when the Soil Conservation District was organized here. He also served a number of years on the board of the

Bob Vaughan Wins Trip to Mexico City

Anti-Poverty Program Studied By Coke County Group

A group of about 30 interested persons from all over Coke County met Tuesday night at the courthouse in Robert Lee to discuss and make plans to participate in the Economic Opportunity Program which has recently been put into effect by the Federal government.

Purpose of the program is to raise the standard of living of several million persons of this country who now have substandard incomes. Various facets of the program provide opportunity for these persons by giving them chances for jobs, for furthering their education, by providing funds for loans for use in assisting their business, and others.

The group at the Robert Lee meeting decided that an organization should be set up for the county as a whole and for each of the incorporated towns in the county. The county organization will consist of an executive committee with three groups from both the east and west sides of the county serving as subcommittees under it.

It was decided that the executive committee for this program should consist of members of the executive committee of the Coke County Progress group which is already functioning. This committee presently is made up of E. F. Glenn of Bronte, Nolan Pentecost and Mrs. Willis Wayne Smith, both

of Robert Lee. Two more members are to be elected at a later date.

West Side Committees

The three subcommittees for the west side are made up as follows: School — Superintendent, two principals and teachers they select.

City — Mayor, two commissioners and Jesse Gloria.

Rural — Ben Boykin, Finnell Smith, Raymond Bloodworth and Mrs. Glenn Waldrop.

Committees From East Side

East side subcommittees will be made up as follows:

School — Superintendent, two principals and teachers they select.

City — Mayor, two councilmen

selected by mayor, and Gilbert Basquez.

Rural — LeDrew Arrott, R. C. Lasswell, James Allen and Mrs. C. E. Arrott.

The six subcommittees are to meet, decide which parts of the overall program for which they feel their areas have a need, work out a program for participation, and present the program to the executive committee for approval and forwarding on to proper authorities.

Operation Headstart

The group decided that immediate action should be taken to start a program this summer for pre-school children who may have trouble with first grade work next September. This program is, to

a large extent, for Latin American children who are lacking in knowledge of spoken English, but other children with other problems may also be helped. This part of the program is called Operation Headstart. Bronte, Robert Lee and Silver school administrators agreed to work out needed details for early submission of applications for help in setting up this program.

Other parts of the program, many of which will depend on the help and cooperation of school officials for successful operation, will be worked on by the six subcommittees, working either together or separately, as seems expedient.

The press release follows:

During its present 1965 Mediterranean cruise, USS CONE (DD-866) had the pleasure of visiting the port of San Remo, Italy, from January 20th to 26th. Its visit coincided with San Remo's annual festival Europa in Fiore (Europe in Flower.) Other ships present during the festival were the Italian frigate Cigno, the French destroyer d'estrees, and the British minesweeper Walkerton. Commander Destroyer Division Forty-two, Capt. W. J. Doyle, embarked in Cone, and Commanding Officer, Cdr. E. S. Haugen, exchanged informal visits with the mayor of San Remo and the commanding officers of the other vessels.

During its visit, the Cone's crew aided the people-to-people program. Thirteen Cone sailors donated blood to a San Remo hospital and a volunteer work group rebuilt a driveway for a boy's orphanage.

All the nations of Europe are invited to participate in the festival, which includes flower contests, folk dancing, and a large parade marking the end of the festival. For the first time in the festival's history, the United States was invited to participate. Chris Sheryl of the United States Travel Service in Rome made arrangements for Tom Hanlon of the Clark County Fair and Recreation Board in Las Vegas to come to San Remo in order to supervise the American entry in the festivals parade.

The United States Entry, a large flower covered Conestoga wagon, was to be ridden by American cowboys and cowgirls and escorted by several cowboys on horseback. CONE was asked to provide the cowboys and LTJG's Dick Kibbe and Tony Ditto, and Seaman James Burke and Joe Lara worked in conjunction with Hanlon. The cowgirls turned out to be three American girls living in Rome. The American float received a warm and enthusiastic response and was considered a great success... especially Joe Lara in his Indian costume. On the morning of the 26th, CONE weighed anchor and steamed for Golfe Juan, France.

I have gone to the old Vestal black smith shop in the wagon with my dad many times. My mother lives in Calif., will be 87 years old in June. Dad has been dead 20 years. I am Mrs. Dave Stubblefield, the former Thelma Bowman.

To The Observer,

Tonight a little girl will call "Gypsy" and then cry her heart out when Gypsy does not come. She, more than almost any other child, will miss her dog.

For more than three years, her dog had guarded her constantly, suffered snake bites and fangs of vicious dogs that ventured too near.

'Tis said by those who knew that the little dog, better than people, understood the child that it loved her and tended her without fail.

Gypsy, faithful, honest and loyal though she was, was disdained and hated and for no known reason. Her enemy struck and Gypsy died at her mistress's door.

Mrs. Lulu Ulmer, County Pioneer, Buried at Sanco

Mrs. Lulu Ulmer, 93, who with her husband M. B. Ulmer moved to Coke County in 1889 and homesteaded land at Sanco, died at 12:10 p.m. Saturday in Lewis Emergency Hospital in San Angelo after a long illness. She had lived in San Angelo 56 years.

Born March 27, 1872, in Williamson County, she was married to Mr. Ulmer in Lampasas. They went to Coke County on their honeymoon in 1889. They ranched at Sanco 20 years before moving to San Angelo. Mr. Ulmer died in 1918.

Funeral services were held Monday at Robert Massie Chapel in San Angelo. The Rev. F. H. Hamner, chaplain at West Texas Boys Ranch, officiated. Burial was in Sanco cemetery with nephews as pallbearers.

Survivors include five daughters, 13 grandchildren and 36 great-grandchildren.

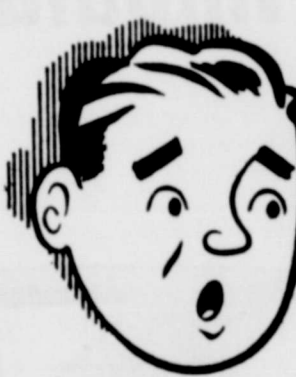

New Nonfat Dry Milk Standards

Have you noticed the difference in the quality of nonfat dry milk you buy today compared to that of a few years ago? If so, you realize it is far better than it was when it first appeared on food store shelves.

To conform with improvements the dairy industry has made, the U. S. Department of Agriculture has revised its grade standards on spray and roller process nonfat dry milk.

Under the new standards now in effect, USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service says that the "slump count level" of dry milk to which a U.S. grade may be assigned cannot exceed 200 million per gram. This direct microscopic clump test is used to evaluate the quality of raw material used, processing practices and sanitation in manufacturing. These new standards reduce the maximum clump count level by 50 million per gram.

This test is performed by C&MS in official grading of dry milk and by dry milk manufacturers in their quality improvement practices. No changes are being made in USDA grade designations. The shield-shaped design stating "U.S. Extra Grade" still identifies the top quality nonfat dry milk. "U.S. Standard Grade" is assigned to good, but lower quality milk. These grade standards assure you of the quality of dry milk you are buying.

Grading of nonfat dry milk is conducted by USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service at the request of processors, who pay for the service. More than 3 billion pounds of dry milk was graded last year.

Polycarbonate Film Package

Foods, seeds, tobacco and other products that you buy packaged in polycarbonate film are probably safer from insect damage than ever before.

Insects damage several million dollars worth of such products annually. In tests run by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, polycarbonate film packages gave more promising results than other film tested by entomologists.

Flour packaged in polycarbonate film was placed in a room filled with several million insects at the Stored-Product Insects Laboratory of USDA's Agricultural Research Service, Savannah, Georgia. Those packages withstood the insect seige over a period of 18 months — undamaged — while other packages in the test were riddled with hundreds of holes. Insects penetrated paper and cellulose acetate packages in only 3 months' storage time.

These packages were exposed to insects which commonly feed on stored products, and for which most flexible packaging materials offer little resistance. Included were caddisflies, cigarette beetles, lesser grain borers and rice weevils.

Since no insecticide was applied to the packages, entomologists have not yet determined why the insects leave polycarbonate alone. Therefore, this film may rank as an important contribution to the development of nonchemical methods to control insects.

Also, polycarbonate film is stronger, stretchier and more re-

sistant to bending and folding than cellulose acetate film, according to the researchers.

Orange Dream Pie

This is the second recipe from the 4-H Favorite Food Show. Daphne Roe, Senior Club member, won a blue ribbon on her exhibit. She will represent Coke County in the District Food Show on May 1 along with Kaye Roberts whose recipe I gave you last week.

Soften ½ cup butter with 3 table-

spoons sugar. Add 1 1/3 cups sifted flour and ¼ teaspoon salt. Mix just until a dough will form. (With electric mixer, use low speed.) Place ¼ cup of the mixture in a small pan for crumb topping.

Press remaining mixture evenly over bottom and sides of a 10-inch pie pan. Flute.

Bake at 375 degrees until light golden brown; crumbs 8 to 10 minutes; crust 10 to 12 minutes. Cool.

Orange Cheese Filling

Combine ¼ cup undiluted frozen orange juice and 1 envelope (1 tablespoon unflavored gelatin in top of double boiler.

Add 3 egg white, ½ cup sugar and ¼ teaspoon cream of tartar. Cook over boiling water, beating constantly, with electric mixer or rotary beater until stiff peaks form. Set aside.

Combine in medium saucepan: ¼ cup undiluted frozen orange juice, 3 egg yolks, ½ cup sugar, 1 teaspoon vanilla and ¼ teaspoon salt. Beat with electric mixer or rotary beater until light. Cook, stirring constantly, until smooth and thick. Remove from heat.

Add 1 cup (8 oz. pkg.) cream cheese; beat until smooth. Fold into gelatin-egg white mixture.

Chill until thickened but not set, about 30 minutes.

Beat 1 cup whipping cream until thick; fold into gelatin mixture.

Spoon into baked shell. Sprinkle with reserved crumbs. Chill at least two hours.

This pie will keep 3 or 4 days in the refrigerator. Cover carefully with foil or waxed paper.

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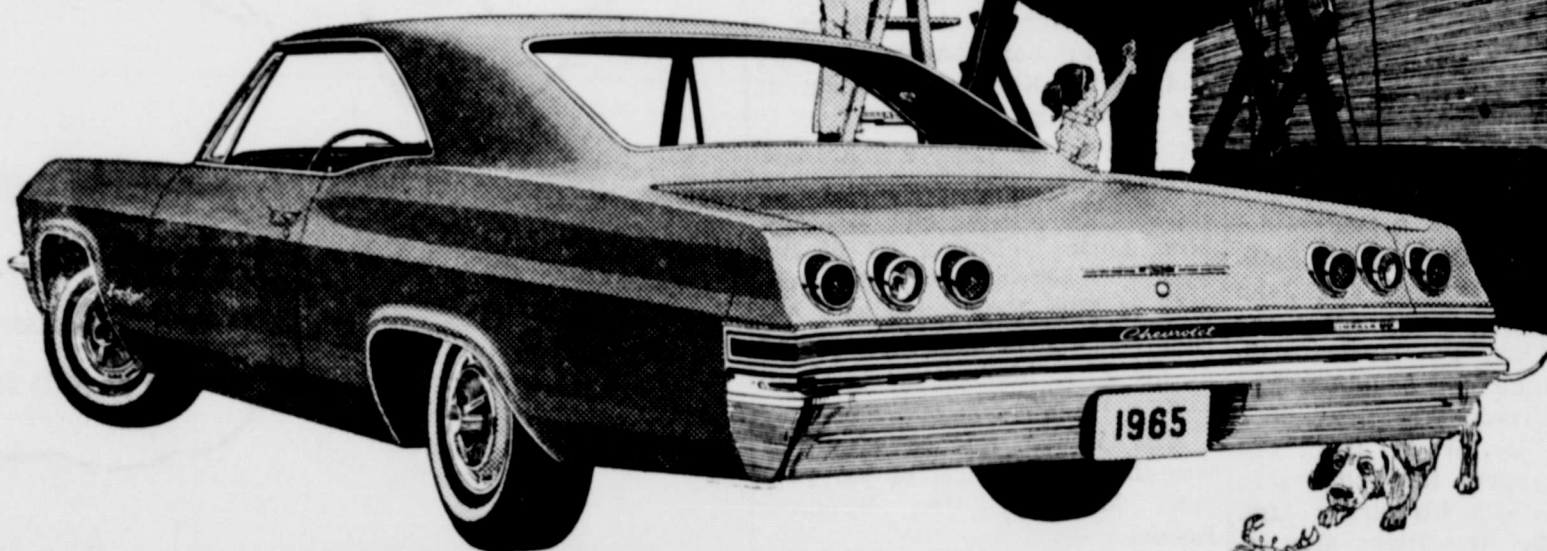

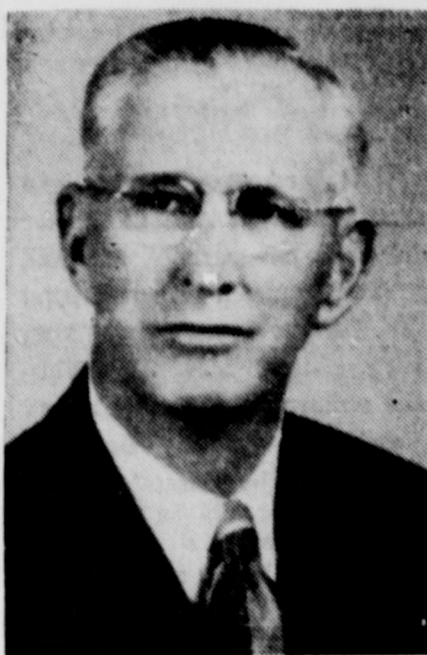
