Public Invited To Attend Hospital Groundbreaking

A ground breaking ceremony at 10 a.m. Friday will kickoff a major construction job in Robert Lee. The ground breaking will be held at West Coke County Hospital and will be the beginning of a quarter-million dollar enlargement and remodeling program for the local hospital.

The public is invited to witness the ground breaking.

Construction of 20 new patient rooms, and other necessary facilities will be included in the project.

BDK Construction Co. of San Angelo was the successful bidder on the base proposal which includes the major part of the job. The firm's bid of \$214,370 was low among 11 bids received and opened April 27.

Funds for the improvement were provided by a bond issue voted by residents of the hospital district and supplemented by a Hill-Burton grant. The bond issue was supported better than 2-1 by voters.

Dorman Thomas Resigns As School Superintendent

It was announced Tuesday that Supt. Dorman Thomas has resigned as head of the Robert Lee Schools. His resignation was accepted at a meeting of trustees Monday night.

After serving three years as superintendent at Robert Lee, Thomas has accepted a similar

position at White Deer, located in the Panhandle between Amarillo and Pampa.

The superintendent said he regrets very much leaving here, but he added that the move will mean an advancement to a considerably larger school. White Deer is a Class A school with 230 students

enumerated for enrollment next school term. Thomas said in all probability, it will advance to Class AA after the coming school year. The Panhandle school has 46 teachers on its staff.

Thomas came to Robert Lee from Olton where he served as business manager. At White Deer he will replace Ray Schultz who will move to Olton as superintendent.

Thomas said the Robert Lee board of trustees is now taking applications caused by his resignation.

In an interview Tuesday afternoon, Thomas told The Observer: "We do hate to leave here, as we have enjoyed living here better than any place we have ever lived. However, I feel that this is an advancement in the educational field and, after all, that is the business I'm in. I would like to thank all the people of the Robert Lee area for the cooperation and courtesies they have shown me and my family. We all appreciate every favor you have shown us."

Thomas, his wife and four children plan to leave about July 1 for their new home.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Robbie Don Godwin of Houston and Clark Godwin of Robert Lee; two brothers, John Paul Godwin of McCamey and Lewis Godwin of Odessa; two sisters, Mrs. Willard Renfro of Ballinger and Mrs. Hart Phillips of Big Spring; and one grandson.

Crowd Comes From "All Over" To 11th Sanco Homecoming

"Neighbors" was the theme Sunday when the tabernacle at Sanco was well filled with former residents and their relatives and friends.

On Saturday night, at the community building, Tee Green, Arthur Tubb, and Rodney Mathers entertained with violin and guitar music. The story of the establishment of the 77-year-old community was also recounted.

Arthur Tubb related that his grandfather, Frank Tubb, started the first store at the old location, one mile east of the present site, which I. A. Bird had surveyed in 1907.

Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Durham who settled in a dugout near the mountain just east of Sanco, known as Durham's Peak, were the first postmasters. Mr. Durham served less than a year, then Miller Bird and after him, Crate

Bullion for almost a year, then Mrs. Durham took the office until 1907, when O. L. Tubb became postmaster, and the store and office were moved to the new site on Yellow Wolf creek.

Sunday morning Rev. Wilson Carwile keyed the 11th annual homecoming in reviewing Christian neighborliness. Special music included a solo by Edna Lea Killam and a trio, composed of H. L. Reid and daughters, Lvon and Marilyn.

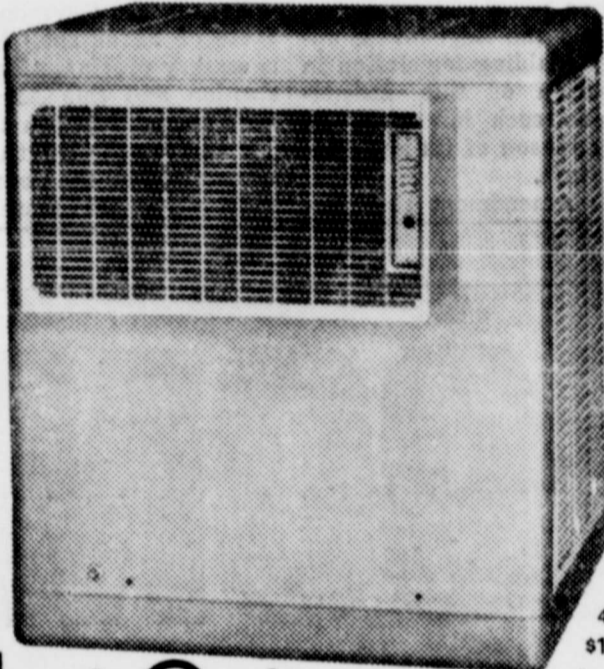

The weiner roast was held on the ranch of Mr. and Mrs. Joe McCutchen, adult leaders for the group. Twelve members, five adult leaders and two visitors attended.

Improve Gelatin Salads

Molded gelatin salads need not come out watery after freezing and thawing.

To avoid this, simply use one-fourth less liquid than usual.

When using lemon-flavored gelatin, for instance, use 1½ cups of water instead of 2 cups as recommended on the label. Not only will you avoid weeping salads, but the celery in them will also stay crisp.

Research on molded gelatin salads was done recently by food specialists at the New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station. To thaw frozen salads of this nature, thaw overnight in the refrigerator, they recommend.

How to Freeze Eggs

Now's the time to consider freezing a few eggs.

Frozen whole eggs are handy for scrambling or for cooking and baking. Be sure to use eggs of the highest quality. Prepare the eggs quickly, then freeze promptly.

Here's how to do it: Do not beat. Put blended eggs through a food mill or medium-mesh strainer. For each cupful of eggs. Add ½ tablespoon corn syrup or sugar — for eggs you will use in cakes and cookies — or ½ teaspoon salt — for eggs you will use in scrambling. This prevents the eggs from becoming gummy.

Now, place the prepared eggs in rigid moisture-proof containers. Put in each container only as much egg as you will use at one time. Five large eggs make one cup.

Allow a half-inch for expansion at the top of each half-pint or wide-top pint container; three-fourths inch in narrow-top containers.

You are ready to seal and

freeze the eggs at 0 degrees or lower. Stored at this temperature, the eggs will retain their quality for 9 to 12 months.

To thaw the eggs, place overnight in the refrigerator. Use within 24 hours. Then cook thoroughly.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members; to fix the membership in the House of Representatives at 150 members; to require apportionment of the Senate according to population; and to delete the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows:

"Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 39 members. The House of Representatives shall consist of 150 members.

"Section 25. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory according to population, as nearly as possible.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling legislation in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall be-

come effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the 7th day of September, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

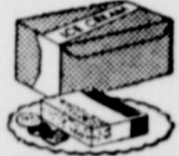
