MENARD SLIPS BY STEERS, 21-18 IN SEASON OPENER LAST FRIDAY

No excuses please! We lost by three points but gained much more in experience. With a practically new team from last year the Steers had to adjust to their positions and learning of their assignments.

With Menard's quick touchdown in the first quarter and the running of quarterback Po Ellis, who is a real speedster, the Steers were beaten by a fired up ball club. With a little more practice and experience, the Steers will be back at the top.

1st Quarter

Menard won the toss and elected to receive. Gary Williams' kick to about the 10 yard line was returned to the 48. Then on the first play, Ellis hit his left halfback with a pass which was deflected first and he raced to pay dirt, 52 yards away. The kick was good and Menard had an early 7 to 0 lead. The next eight minutes was taken up by numerous penalties which totaled 90 yards for both teams in the first quarter. Two minutes before the second quarter, Buddy Vosburg took a pitchback which was well executed and raced 26 yards to put Robert Lee in the scoring columns. Try for extra points was no good and at the end of the first quarter, the score was Menard 7, Robert Lee 6.

2nd Quarter

After a punt by Robert Lee to the 42 yard line, Menard put on a

sustained drive that took them to the 3 yard line. Ellis rolled to his left and hit his halfback again in the end zone for 6 points. Try for extra points was no good and Menard led 13 to 6.

Robert Lee received and Wink returned to the 45 yard line. Wink, on first down, pitched back to Williams, rolled out to the left himself and Williams hit him with a 29 yard pass and run play that went down to the 8 yard line. Then Robert Lee scored with Wink rolling to the right and hitting Williams with a short pass on the 5 yard line and he crossed over to put 6 more points on the scoreboard. Try for extra points was no good and the score was now 13 to 12 in favor of Menard.

The first half ended with Menard punting to the Steers as the whistle blew.

3rd Quarter

Robert Lee came storming back after the half and put on a drive which carried to the 8 yard line. A 25 yard pass to Gary Parker was a big factor in setting up the following touchdown. Williams took a pitchback from Wink around the right side and with a good hole over tackle he raced through for the score. Try for extra points failed and Robert Lee led 18 to 13. Skipworth kicked to the 22 yard line and the Yellowjackets return-

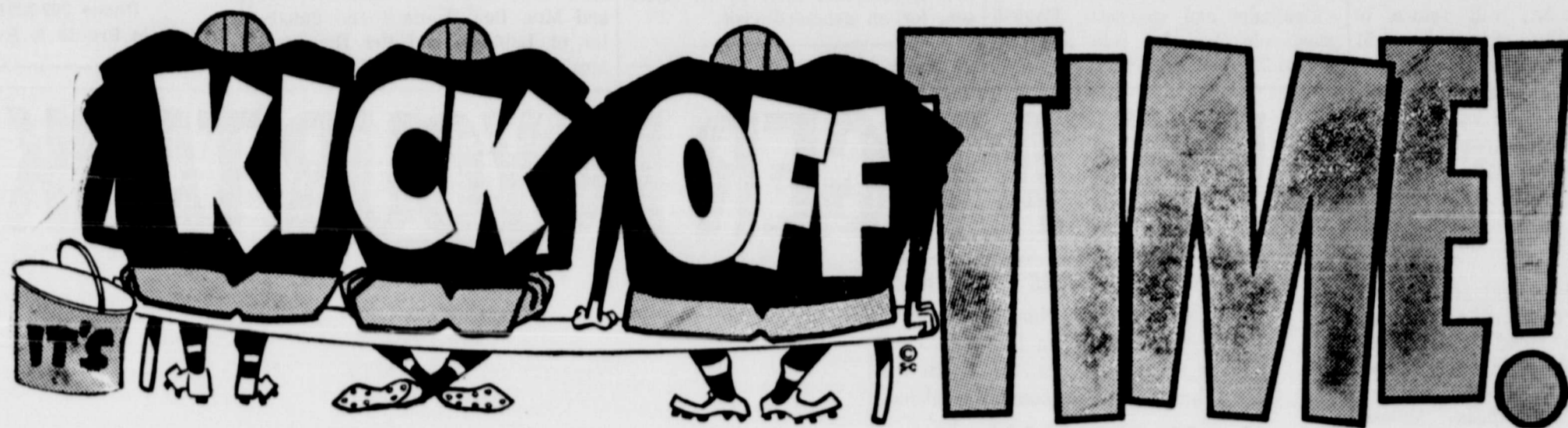

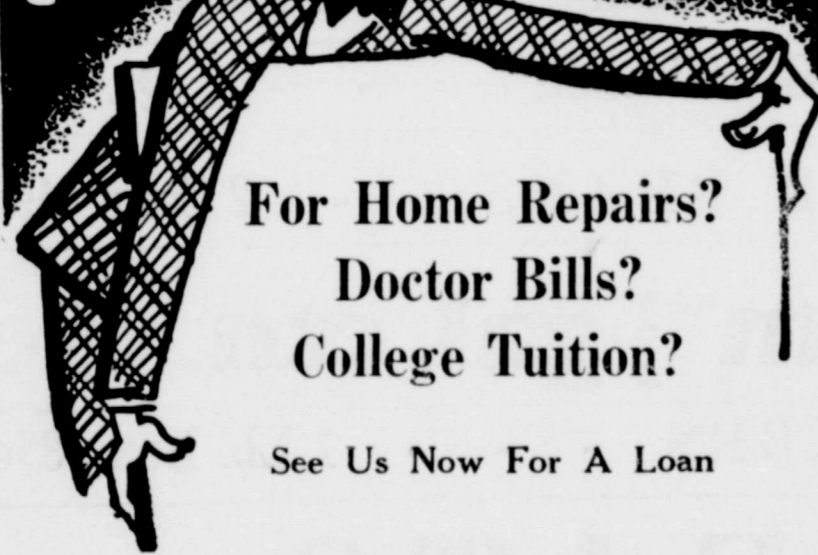
