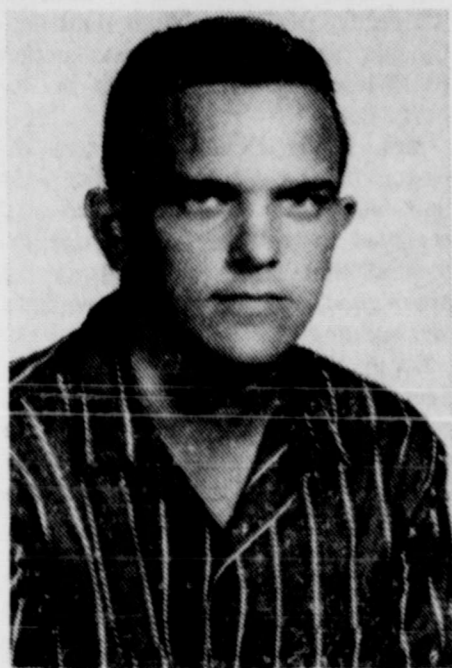

## Funeral Services Held Tuesday For Jahew Jameson, 62

Funeral services were held Tuesday at 3 p.m. from Silver Baptist Church for Jahew Jameson, 62, prominent Coke County rancher. Burial followed the services in McKenzieville Cemetery under direction of Williams Funeral Home.

Mr. Jameson was fatally injured in a car-pickup accident which occurred at 4:30 p.m. Sunday at the intersection of Highway 208 and Farm Road 1672, one mile east of Silver.

Mr. Jameson was born June 26, 1906, at Silver. He was married March 4, 1933, to Juanice Green and the couple lived in the Silver community and continued their ranching interests until his death. Mr. Jameson was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Jameson, who were among the earliest ranchers to settle in the area.

Survivors include his wife; three daughters, Mrs. Joe (Donna) Ash of Jacksboro, Mrs. Joe N. (Billie) Thorpe of Throckmorton, and Mrs. Clifford (Susie) Wilson of Robert Lee; four brothers, Edwin Jameson of Fritch, Homer and Allen Jameson of Silver, and Fred Jameson of San Angelo; three sisters, Mrs. Alice Humble of Midland, Mrs. Jettie Tubb of Blackwell, and Mrs. Clara Walker of San Angelo; and seven grandchildren.

Pallbearers were Wayne McCabe, J. P. Jameson, Myrie Jameson, Ramey Jameson, G. A. Jameson, Melvin Tubb, J. B. Walker and Maurice Duncan.

Investigating officials said Mr. Jameson was killed by the impact when the two vehicles collided. He was driving the pickup. The occupants of the car, Mr. and Mrs. William Black and Mr. and Mrs. W. D. McDaniel, all of San Angelo, were taken to San Angelo for treatment. Apparently Mr. McDaniel was the most seriously injured of the group.

## CRMWD Manager Tells Of Plans For RL Dam

O. H. Ivie, general manager of the Colorado River Municipal Water District, was guest speaker at Tuesday's BCD meeting. He told the 23 members and 11 other guests present about plans of his organization to build the big dam on the Colorado River near here.

He gave a lot of statistics on the size of the structure and spillway, and emphasized that employees of CRMWD want to be a part of this community as they work on the project during the next few years, and operate it for many years to come.

An accompanying story by Joe Pickle, editor of the Big Spring Herald and secretary of CRMWD, tells some of the information related by Ivie concerning progress and plans.

In pointing out the immensity of the dam and reservoir, Ivie said that the Robert Lee Lake will be the largest west of Possum Kingdom to California. It will contain 489,000 acre feet of storage capacity, which can supply 47 million gallons of water a day, and maintain a two year emergency supply.

## Steady Progress Being Made on Preliminary Work

Steady progress is being made toward the Colorado River Municipal Water District's new lake on the Colorado River just above Robert Lee.

Core drilling on the northwest flank of the dam site will be completed within another 10 days or two weeks, O. H. Ivie, CRMWD general manager, estimated. Findings so far have indicated no foundation problems.

Surveying crews, running lines at the damsite and around the perimeter of the lake basin at flood mark, are about 30 per cent through with their work, he said.

As these reports become available, information will be turned over to George Thompson of Sweetwater and Clyde Berry of Clyde for land appraisals. When these are reported to the district, negotiations for land purchases will begin.

Colorado State University at Fort Collins is well along on its scale model of the giant spillway for the lake, and within two months data from tests is due to begin flowing to the engineers, Freese, Nichols and Endress of Fort Worth.

District officials are giving preliminary studies to immediate pipeline requirements, and at the same time they are checking costs of financing the project.

Previously, Ivie had estimated that it would be spring before bids for revenue bonds to finance the

The lake will have an average depth of 33 feet and at base of the dam will be 108 feet deep. Anyone who wishes to walk around the lake will have to travel 135 miles. Water will be backed up the river 18 miles, and the widest spot will be 19,000 feet.

The dam itself will be 136 feet high and 21,100 feet long. The spillway will have a diameter of 60 feet which will funnel into a tunnel 20 feet in diameter.

Ivie said the construction job here at Robert Lee will cost approximately \$14.1 million. Additional expense of tying the lake into pipelines will move the total cost up to about \$30 million.

Ivie said the water district has employed disinterested appraisers to acquire land rights needed for the lake. He said, "We want to be sure that land owners involved get a fair deal." He said negotiations with the State Highway Department for moving the Robert Lee-Sterling City highway, eight miles of which will be inundated, are scheduled for next week. He also mentioned that arrangements will have to be made with oil companies to take care of 32 oil wells which are located in the lake basin.

She was born Dec. 30, 1877 in Mississippi, and moved to Coke County in 1903. She was married to Wade T. Anderson, who died in 1902, and later to B. W. Bilbo who died in 1943. She was a member of the Church of Christ.

## Do You Want Your State Government Less Responsible?

Tuesday, Nov. 2, is an important day to all Texans, since we will decide for or against adding ten more amendments to the constitution of the state. Some of these proposed additions to the constitution have real merit, while others never should have been brought up in the first place.

The Observer opposes amendments four and ten — the ones which would give four year terms to the governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, comptroller of public accounts, treasurer, commissioner of the general land office, secretary of state, state legislators, and ANY statutory state officer, unless a term of office is specifically provided in the constitution.

The main reason we oppose these amendments is that they move the state government further away from the people. They double the time between accounting periods to the people by state officials. In other words, an official who is not doing his job to the satisfaction of his constituents could not be removed for four years instead of the present two.

Another thing we don't like about amendment four is that there is

no limit as to how many consecutive terms a governor or any other state official may succeed himself. Governor Connally himself expressed concern about unlimited terms for governor when he stated: "Such a Governor will completely dominate every Board, Commission and Authority in the state... dominate in the sense that he will have appointed at least once every single member of each Board and I am unalterably opposed to that in principle because the last thing that Texas needs is one man rule." (Dallas Morning News, Feb. 16, 1962.)

Amendment ten on the ballot, the one which would give legislators four year terms, is also repugnant to our form of government, by the people. Passage of this constitutional change would give Texas legislators a term twice as long as U. S. congressmen now have. Do you think our state legislators are so well qualified that they should not be called to an accounting at the polls more than once every four years?

Texas voters have usually been kind to officials who are doing a good responsible job. Two years ago Governor Connally won a sec-

ond term hands down over three opponents with hardly any campaign at all; Lt. Gov. Preston Smith had only token opposition in his race for a second term; Attorney General Waggoner Carr was unopposed. John C. White, commissioner of agriculture, and Jerry Sadier, commissioner of the general land office, were the only other state officials who had opponents. Both won handily. The only hotly contested race where a great deal of effort and money were expended two years ago was for U. S. senator, which already carries a six year term.

Longer terms for public officials inevitably can lead in only one direction: toward lack of responsible representation, toward indifference to public opinion and public wishes, toward a lackadaisical attitude of staying on the job, and toward a feeling that the job belongs to the official rather than the people.

We urge you to vote against 4 and 10 next Tuesday.

The other eight proposed amendments have some definite merit and deserve support.

# Steers Lose District Opener, 22-14

So close, but yet so far. The Steers were again defeated but they weren't outplayed this time. It looked as though it was going to be a victory, but the hands of fate or something prevented it again. The tension was there and pressure was heavy on the boys, but it just wasn't there when they needed it.

## 1ST QUARTER

The Steers received the opening kickoff and advanced the ball from their 40 to the Jayton 40. There the Jaybirds held and Williams had to punt with the ball going to the 15. Jayton could move only 7 yards in 3 tries, so they had to punt. The ball went to the 50 yard line where it was promptly killed. The Steers then moved 41 yards in short fashion with Vosburg going for 7 and 4 yards, Devoll racking up 6 and 8 yards, Williams for 18 and 8, the holes were there for the 5 and a cloud of dust and the Steers made use of them until they reached the 9 yard line and then it stalled. The Steers lost possession on the 9. Jayton punched it out to the 30 yard line where with a surprise long pass and run play they went 70 yards for the first TD. Try for extras was good and Jayton was ahead 8 to 0.

Shortly after the kickoff with Ro-

bert Lee in possession the first quarter ended.

## 2ND QUARTER

This quarter was a checkmate as far as field position was. The Steers drove to the Jayton 35 yard line on a 48 yard drive but stalled again. Jayton then drove to the Steer 26 yard line and the Steers held. With the aid of a penalty the Steers moved to the 44 yard line with 1st and 10, there they punched and punched to the Jayton 37 only to fumble the ball away. Jayton was driving hard downfield as the half ended at the Steer 38 yard line.

## 3RD QUARTER

Jayton received the 2nd half kickoff and started their 1st and 10 situation at the Jayton 30 yard line. They ran two plays, then cut loose with their bomb again, a 63 yard aerial for a quick 2nd half TD. Try for extras was no good and now it read Jayton 14, Robert Lee 0.

The kickoff was returned to the Steer 35. On a pass attempt, the Jaybirds picked it off at the Jayton 45 yard line. Then they did it again. They moved to the 13 yard line and scored on another pass in the end zone. Try for points was good and now the score stood 22-0.

The kickoff was returned to the Steer 37 and the Jaybirds held right there and the Steers had to

punt. Williams boomed it high to the Jayton 40 and Jayton on their series of downs could move only 3 yards. They kicked to the Steer 33. Here the Steers came alive. They passed their way down to the 1 yard line where Wink punched over for the TD. Pass to Ray Roe for the extras was good and the score was shortened 22 to 8. Key play in this drive was Gaylon Pitcock's heads up play of a deflected pass and it was good for 42 yards. The quarter ended on the last play as the Steers scored.

## 4TH QUARTER

Drexiel Skipworth kicked off and put one downfield. It was returned to the Jayton 27. The Steers with new life held and the punt was returned to the Jayton 33 yard line. A 16 yard pass, Wink to Devoll, moved to the 17 yard line. Then they punched and punched until Buddy Vosburg went over from the one. Try for extra points were no good and it now read Jayton 22 - Steers 14.

Robert Lee had new life and was raring to go. They kicked off to the Jayton 24 and stopped them cold there. Jayton attempted a pass to get out of the hole and Ray Roe picked it off and returned it to the Jayton 23 yard line. The Steers were going strong, hitting the middle and a 7 yard pass moved the ball to the 2 yard line with 1st and goal to go. Then the bitter

end hit. The ball was fumbled, and it rolled into the end zone with a Jaybird recovering. Jayton took over at the 20 yard line and proceeded to run out the clock.

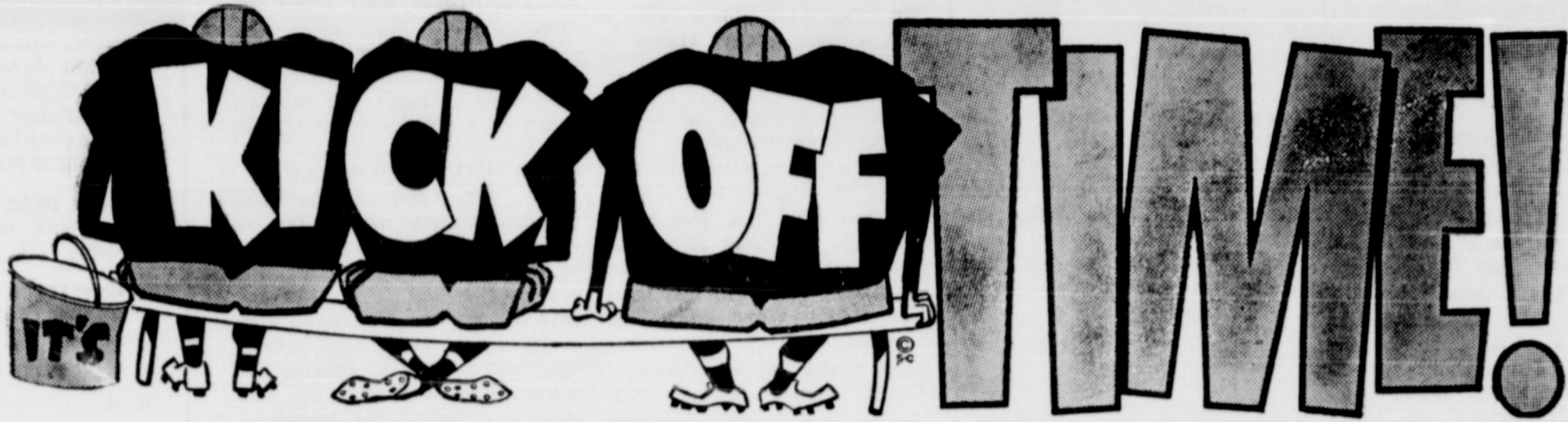
