Steers Tackle Bronte In Final Game Of '65

The Robert Lee Steers will wind up their 1965 football season Friday night when they invade the domain of the Bronte Longhorns, District 8-B winners. The Steers are out of the running for the championship, as Bronte has it won regardless of the outcome of the game Friday night, but a Robert Lee win would be a great moral victory for the Orange and Black. The game

this week will also decide the unofficial but hotly contested title of "Coke County Champions."

The Steers will go into the game with a 2-1-1 district record, compared to the Longhorns' 4-0-0. The Steers have a 3-5-1 season record, while the Longhorns sport a 7-2-0 season.

Funeral Services Held Sunday for Hugh S. Lewis

Funeral services were held Sunday at 3 p.m. in Robert Lee Baptist Church for Hugh S. Lewis, 86, who died at 10:15 p.m. Friday in West Coke Memorial Hospital. He had entered the hospital early Friday. He had been in failing health for several years.

The Rev. Bill Beaty, Baptist pastor, and Douglas Wilkes, Church of Christ minister, officiated. Burial was in Robert Lee Cemetery, directed by Williams Funeral Home.

Mr. Lewis was born Dec. 5, 1878, in Mansfield, La. He was married to Lexie James, Nov. 7, 1914, at Calallen. They lived in Ballinger for some time and moved from there to Robert Lee in 1935.

Immediately after arriving in Robert Lee, Mr. Lewis established a business, handling milk, ice and produce. He served as tax assessor-collector for the Robert Lee Independent School District 11 years, with his wife as office assistant. They retired in July 1961.

Mr. Lewis was a member of the Christian Church.

Survivors include his wife; a son, Robert Lee Postmaster Hugh S. Lewis Jr.; a daughter, Mrs. Cecil (Frances) Kemp of Bronte; one sister, Mrs. Maggie Creswell of Leaday; four grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Another son, Edward (Eddie) Lewis, was lost in action during World War II when his plane overshoot the runway and landed in the water near Wake Island off the coast of New Guinea.

Pallbearers were T. M. Wylie Jr., C. S. Brown, Fagan Parker, Fern Havins, David Key, E. C. Davis, Jack Walker and Henry Childress.

Highway Department Okays New Bronte Road

The Texas Highway Commission has approved reconstruction of Highway 158 between Robert Lee and Bronte. Announcement of the okay on the project came in a news release Wednesday morning.

The information stated that the 1967-68 Consolidated Highway Program will include purchase of right of way and reconstruction of Highway 158 from Robert Lee, east to Bronte, a distance of 11.9 miles. Some talk on widening and

straightening the highway has been heard the past several months, and, apparently the work will be part of the 1967-68 construction program. Traffic on Highway 158 be-

tween Bronte and Robert Lee is pretty heavy and some lengthy no-passing zones sometimes make travel slow.

Some other smaller projects for Coke County included in the program were announced as follows:

U. S. Highway 277 — Place asphalt seal coat on shoulders from Bronte to Tom Green County line, a distance of 13.4 miles.

State Highway 208 — Widen two bridges and approaches from 2.5 miles north of Tom Green County line, north, a distance of 1 mile.

State Highway 208 — Reconstruct highway from 4.2 miles south of Robert Lee, south, a distance of 1.1 miles.

Farm to Market Road 2333—Place asphalt seal coat from U. S. 277 to Runnels County line, a distance of 3.1 miles.

City Working To Get New Water Lines In

Mayor Robert Vaughan reported to the BCD Tuesday that the city is working hard toward providing water service to prospective new residents who have purchased lots in the area west of the Robert Lee school. He said pipe has been strung out and city officials hope to have it laid soon.

Meanwhile, the mayor said, water can be obtained by use of garden hoses for laying of new foundations. A number of Sun Oil Co. employees who will be moving from the company owned camps have purchased lots in this area and will either build or move houses to the site.

Supt. Jimmy Bickley spoke to the group concerning school problems. He pointed out that school facilities are inadequate for present enrollment and that any increase in number of students will only make the situation more serious. He said lunchroom and gym facilities are particularly in need of improvement.

Bickley said that some repair work has been done in the hallway of the old building and that new heaters recently purchased were being installed Tuesday.

Bickley also pointed out that the school has been approved for approximately \$14,000 federal money under the Title I program for providing improved classroom facilities.

Gerald C. Allen, UCRA president, spoke to the group concerning a meeting held Monday to discuss enlargement of the UCRA, and Commissioner Fern Havins gave a brief report on street work which has been in progress the past week.

Sun Camps To Be Vacated By June

Approximately 45 families will be affected by the recent order of Sun Oil Company that their three camps in Coke County be disbanded by June 30, 1966. Only two houses remain in the Millican Camp west of Edith, with the remainder of the families living in the Jameson and Tubb Camps at Silver.

W. W. Koonce, gas plant superintendent at Silver, told the Observer this week that Sun employees who now live in the camps will be given first opportunity to purchase the houses. He said all houses purchased by employees must be moved by the June 30, 1966, date, and that the camps must be entirely vacated by Sept. 1, 1966.

Koonce and Jim Edison, area production superintendent, were in Dallas last week, when plans for disbanding the camps were discussed with company officials.

They reported that there is no restriction on where the Sun employees move. However, it is expected that most of them will move to Robert Lee or Colorado City. Koonce said that Sun's base of operations for the Silver and Edith areas will be located at Robert Lee.

A number of lots have been purchased recently in Robert Lee by Sun employees who anticipated that the camps would be closed.

End of an Era

Closing of the Sun Camps will mark the end of an era for the Silver area. The community was made up almost entirely of ranch families before discovery of the big oil field in 1946. Almost at once Sun began construction of homes for its employees. The influx of drilling crews and production workers brought service people and merchants to Silver and created a prosperous community of more than 200 families connected with the oil business, in addition to the old timers and other business people who moved in to take care of the needs of the community. Population of the area has dwindled somewhat in recent years, however, due to automated production and processing methods, and the low allowable set up by the Texas Railroad Commission.

After the 1946 discovery well, the No. 1 Allen Jameson, was brought in, drilling and production continued at a rapid pace. By 1948,

there were more than 60 producing wells in the area. Gas which came with the flush oil production was flared, and an imperative need was evident for some way to conserve the tremendous waste of gas.

In 1948, construction was begun on a gas processing and repressuring plant. The plant was built on property of Fred Jameson, two miles south of Silver. The \$2,000,000 plant was completed in July 1949, and started processing gas from about 150 wells, located at Silver, Edith, Bronte and west of Sanco.

An expansion program in 1954 and again in 1963 increased the capacity of the plant. Today it processes 55 million cubic feet of gas per day, turning the natural gas into propane, butane and natural gasoline. Daily output of refined products is approximately 170,000 gallons.

Today the plant serves 300 to 315 producing wells. Most of the crude oil is shipped out of the Silver area by pipeline.

The two bedroom homes in the Tubb and Jameson camps were built at a cost of \$7,500 to \$8,000 each.

County Agents News Column

Home is still the favorite place to be. I recently had the privilege of making a trip that took me into Western Pennsylvania. I thoroughly enjoyed the tour. The scenery was nice, the weather was good for traveling and we saw some very good farming and stock country, particularly in the cornbelt. Despite this, the open semi-arid spaces of our area looked very pleasing on our return home. The smog, crowded conditions and different atmosphere would be difficult for me to become adjusted to.

The Coke County cotton harvest is well underway now. The yield to date indicate we are having a better than average year. Some yields have been very good. All this after a spring that looked rather unpromising. We were dry and late getting any cotton started. But, the moisture that came later, plus the light damage by insects, changed our prospects. Though not a bumper crop, the yields to date are much better than were expected in the spring.

We have more and more interest in fertilizer or plant foods as time passes. This is good. We hope the trend will continue. Not all Coke County soils need fertilizing nor will the added yields be large every year. But, plant foods will help improve net returns on many Coke County farms or ranches. They particularly should be helpful on the older, sandy fields. Also, under grazing crops in the spring when moisture is available.

No one can tell exactly how much plant food is exactly the right amount for a given field or crop. The best method known at the present to determine the needs of a field is a soil test. A number of operators have had their soils tested this year. We hope more will do so in the future. During the winter, the off season, is a good time to have the testing done. Then you can be ready when the warm season comes. If you need some instructions on taking a sample or a carton to mail a sample in, let us know. We have a supply of both. The testing costs \$2.00. This could be a very cheap investment.

The Coke County Fat Stock Show will be held at the showbarn in Robert Lee on January 10, 1966. We should have another big county show with 75 or more 4-H and FFA members participating.

Tom Green County will hold their first annual Pecan Show on December 9. Coke County residents and pecan enthusiasts are encouraged to enter the show. If you would like a copy of their rules, let me know. I have a few copies.

The votes on the 1966 upland cotton program will be held November 23. The county ASC office will announce the places and hours.

If quotas are approved by at least two-thirds of those voting, quotas and the new cotton program will be in effect.

The Coke County 4-H Club members will have their annual Achievement program Saturday night, at 6:30 p.m. in the Robert Lee School band hall. All 4-H club members are encouraged to attend and bring their parents.

Directors of the Colorado River Municipal Water District are scheduled tentatively to meet in Big Spring at 10 a.m. Nov. 23, Charles Perry, Odessa, president, said today.

The board will get a progress report on preparations for the dam across the Colorado River above Robert Lee. At this stage, surveying is approximately one-third complete, and the appraisals are being started with first contracts with landowners due soon.

At the meeting, groundwork for contracts with Midland regarding water from district facilities will be reviewed. If and to what extent Midland wishes to participate will have to be considered before the district firms its financing and pipeline plans.

The board is due to formally adopt the budget for 1966. Previously a proposed budget was approved and since the 30-day interval for bondholder reaction has passed without any objections, the budget likely will be finally adopted.

Steers Down Loraine, 37-0 In Homecoming Game

Homecoming night was a big success in every respect on this mild Friday night. The Steers mowed down the Loraine Bulldogs with an attack that moved well on the ground and in the air. The offensive line was still blocking well and the defense was double tough in the clinches. Every man on the squad saw action and showed high promise for the future.

First Quarter

The Steers won the toss again and elected to receive. The kick carried into the end zone and Wink killed it there for a touch back which brought it out to the 20. A quick 25 yard pass, Wink to Williams, carried to the Steer 45. The Steers moved to the Loraine 45 yard line and lost on the 4th down attempt. But the Bulldogs couldn't gain and were forced to punt which carried to the Steer 14 yard line. Wink returned it to the 22 and then the drive began; with Parker, Roe and Williams racking up big gains

through big holes. They carried it to the 5 yard line where Williams broke through for the TD. Williams hit Gaylon Pitcock with a pass for the extra points and the score was 8-0 for the Steers.

Glenn Roach kicked off to the 17 yard line and Loraine returned it to their 34. But the Steers held again and Loraine punted to the Steer 11 yard line. One play and the first quarter ended.

Second Quarter

The Steers drove all the way to the 27 yard line with the holes still being opened and from there, with a 2nd down and 6, Ray Roe burst into the open and scored another TD. Williams kick was good for the extra and the Steers had a 15-0 lead.

Drexile Skipworth kicked off and the ball traveled to the 13 yard line with only a short return by Loraine. The Bulldogs fumbled on the Steer 45 yard line and Wink came up with it. The Steers received a 15 yard penalty for holding and had to start again at their 30 yard

line. With a 1st and long yardage, Wink stepped back and hit Williams at the 50 yard line. Williams raced 50 yards more with a fine escort by Skipworth, Roe and Pitcock, and the Steers tallied again. The try for extras was no good this time and the Steers had a 21 to 0 lead.

Glenn Roach kicked off to the 12 and Loraine returned to the Loraine 32. The Steers held there for short yardage and the Bulldogs punted to the Steer 41. The Steers moved to the Loraine 40 and with two incomplete passes on 3rd and 4th downs the Bulldogs took over. Long pass, 35 yards carried to the Steer 27 yard line and a 1st and 10. Then on a short pass attempt, Donnie Devoll intercepted the ball and raced back to the Loraine 31 yard line before being hauled down. Then the Steers attempted a pass on 2nd and 6 and Loraine intercepted at the Loraine 13 and while the ball was being run back to the Loraine 21 the 1st half whistle blew and Robert Lee had a 21-0 halftime lead.

Third Quarter

Drexile Skipworth kicked off to start the 2nd half. He got off a short kick to the 30 and the Steers stopped them at the Loraine 34. A pass moved to the Steer 35 and Loraine fumbled again at this point. However, they quickly got the ball back when they intercepted a pass on the Loraine 42. Then they fumbled again at the Steer 41 with Gaylon Pitcock recovering for the Steers.

The Steers moved to the Loraine 33 yard line where Wink tossed one over the middle to Skipworth, who went the remaining yards for another touchdown. Glenn Roach kicked the extra points and the score stood at 28-0.

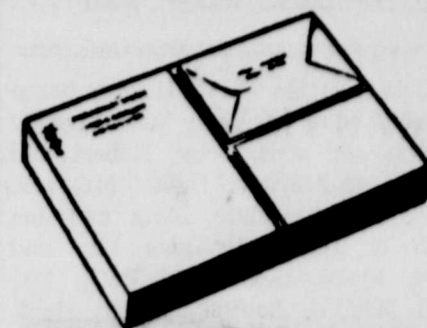
Tooter Fields did the honors this time kicking one down to the 9 yard line. Loraine returned it to their 25 where the Steers held again. With the punt carrying to their own 41, the ball rolled dead there. Robert Lee moved to the 31 in 3 plays and with 1st and

Fields boomed another kickoff to the 10 yard line, but the Bulldogs got a good runback to their 40. The Steers held and with the Bulldogs punting, Gary Williams broke through to partially block the ball and it was blown dead at the Steer 46. The Steers moved it to the Loraine 43 as the quarter ended.

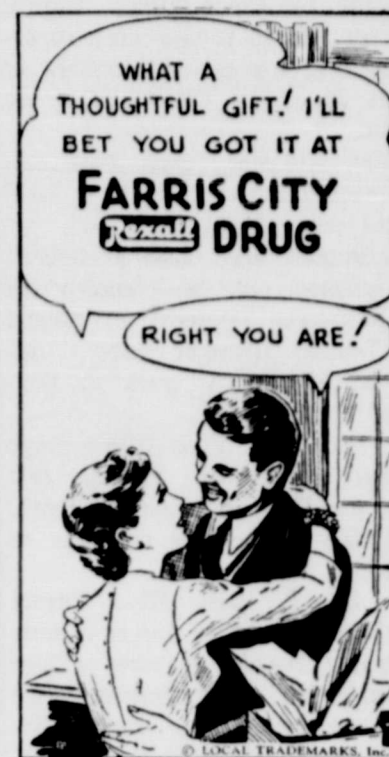

Action Starts on Enlarging UCRA

Action was started all over again Monday on the proposition of enlarging the Upper Colorado River Authority to include at least seven more West Texas counties along with its present members, Tom Green and Coke counties.

A meeting was held in San Angelo and representatives from five West Texas water authorities agreed to try to get a bill rewritten to enlarge the district and to secure local sponsors for construction of a dam at the confluence of the Colorado and Concho rivers (known as the Stacy site), and in Menard County on the San Saba River.

Gerald C. Allen of Robert Lee, UCRA president, was named chairman of a committee, representing all interested counties, to work for passage of the enlargement bill. Representatives from Mills and Lampasas counties were also present at the meeting and expressed interest of their counties in joining the proposed enlarged UCRA.

A bill to include the seven other counties in the water authority was passed by the last legislature, but the bill was vetoed by Governor John Connally because he objected to certain parts of the bill concerning police powers and water pollution.

Counties involved in the first bill included the two present member counties and Menard, Schleicher, Concho, Coleman, Runnels, Irion and Sterling counties.

The group agreed that they would request the City of San Angelo to act as sponsors for the Stacy Dam. Members of the Menard County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 agreed to serve as sponsors for the Menard dam.
