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## Steers Tighten Up, Hold Longhorns To 20-15 Win

Bronte 20, Robert Lee 15.

Boy, what a game! When you want to see a good Class B football game, just put Robert Lee and Bronte on the same field and you'll see some head knocking. Bronte showed why they won district by their good defense and potent running fullback. The Steers played one of their finest games and an all out effort nearly put them past the Longhorns on this fine Friday night.

### First Quarter

Robert Lee received the opening kickoff and returned it only to the 9 yard line. With two running plays for short yardage, Williams quick kicked to the Bronte 35 yard line. Bronte quickly moved downfield and with the ball on the 16 yard line, Doug McCutchen swept left end for the T.D. The attempted kick for extra points was blocked and Bronte had a 6 to 0 lead. Bronte kicked off to the Steers and with Wink handing off to Ray Roe, he got to the Steer 31 yard line.

### Girls Take Pair From Ballinger

Robert Lee High School's girls basketball teams easily took a couple of games at Ballinger Monday. The A team won their score 46-24 and the B team came out on top of a 39-16 score.

Rhonda Gartman was high pointer for the A team with 19. She was followed by Kitten Dean, 11; Jeannie Hatch, 8; and Lois Heuvel, 8. Judy Gartman was high scorer on the B team with 21. Rhea Jean McCutchen had 11, Marsha Dodson, Sharon Walker and Elaine Fikes, 2 each, and Sue Percifull, 1.

Coach Bob Jameson said he was well pleased with the playing of the B team, noting that they really put the Ballinger girls' backs to the wall.

The Steers moved down to the Bronte 30 yard line and with an attempted pass, Bronte intercepted and returned to the Steer 30 yard line. On first down, McCutchen again swept end and scored from 30 yards out. With a fake kick and a pass, the Longhorns now led by 14 to 0.

Bronte kicked off to the Steers end zone and Wink only got out to the Steer 8 yard line before being brought down. But disaster struck and the Steers fumbled on the 5 yard line. But lady luck paid them back and Bronte fumbled on the 7 yard line. Buddy Vosburg recovered for the Steers. The Steers moved out to their own 20 as the first quarter ended.

### Second Quarter

The Steers couldn't go from here and were forced to punt and the Longhorns ended up with it on the Steer 33. But Robert Lee got tough and held the Longhorns at that point. Then with a sustained drive, the Steers went all the way to score with the final an 8 yard pass to Roe from Wink. Williams made the extra points and Bronte then led 14 to 8.

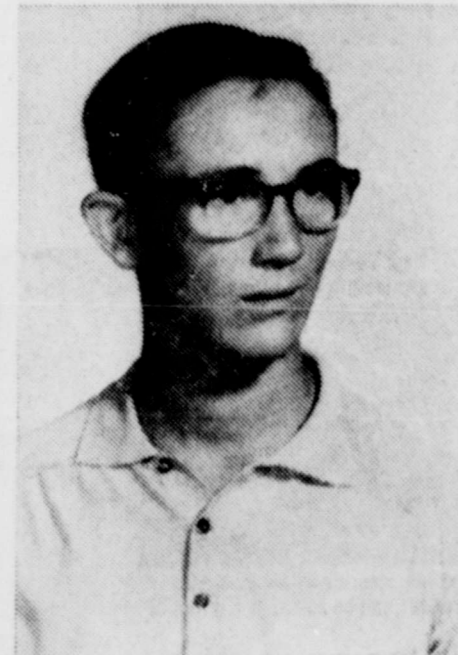
Skipworth kicked off to Bronte and with a return to their own 38, the Steers stiffened again and pushed them back to their own 29 as the half ended.

### Third Quarter

Williams kicked off to start the 3rd quarter and the ball was returned to the Bronte 43. But the Steers held again and Bronte punted to the Steer 18 yard line. The Steers drive to their own 36 was lost on downs. Bronte moved to the Steer 24 before McCutchen swept end again and went all the way for the T.D. The run for extra points was no good and Bronte upped their score to 20 to 8.

The Steers took the kick off with Roe returning to the Steer 34, and on a sustained drive, went all the way to score with Wink carrying it over from the 2 yard line. Key play on this drive was a beautiful reception of a pass by Gaylon Pitcock who had to fight for the ball which brought a 34 yard gain. Williams, Roe and Parker picked up

### Chicken Casserole Dishes

Stretch your food dollars with plentiful broilers.

You can get ten to twelve servings from a three-pound broiler using these recipes suggested by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

#### He-Man Chicken Casserole

Dip disjointed frying chicken in flour. Brown in hot fat until crispy. Drain on absorbent paper. Prepare smooth egg batter (using flour, salt, baking powder, butter and eggs). Pour batter into a greased baking dish. Place browned chicken in batter. Bake in moderate oven until batter is golden brown. Serve with giblet gravy.

#### Chicken Creole

Saute disjointed chicken until brown. In separate frying pan, saute diced bacon and ham. Add chopped onion to bacon and saute. Add tomatoes, chopped parsley, thyme and okra. Simmer. Add browned chicken and simmer until chicken is fork tender. Serve on bed of rice.

#### One-Meal Chicken Casserole

Rub fresh lemon into skin of disjointed frying chicken. Fry chicken in butter to a golden brown. Remove chicken, place in casserole and add small white potatoes, whole carrots, turnips, cut in inch and one-half cubes, and celery slices. Brown vegetables. Place vegetables in casserole on top of chicken. Prepare gravy from drippings. Add diced mushrooms to gravy and pour over vegetables and chicken. Tightly cover casserole. Bake in moderate oven about one hour. If desired one bay leaf may be placed on top of gravy during cooking. Be sure to remove bay leaf before serving.

#### Chicken Baked With Almonds

Saute disjointed, flour dredged frying chicken. Place in casserole. Baste generously with butter. Add about 1/4 cup water. Place tightly fitting cover on casserole and bake until fork tender. While chicken is baking, prepare sauce by sauteing onions in chicken drippings. Add chicken stock and medium white sauce in equal portions. Mix thoroughly. Add whole clove and bit of bay leaf. Cook about five minutes, stirring constantly until smooth. Add raisins and almonds. Mix beaten egg yolks with heavy cream and add to mixture. Serve over chicken on chow mein noodles.

Marketing of broilers are running about ten percent larger than last year at this time, so the Consumer and Marketing Service lists them as plentiful. Retail prices reflect these larger supplies.
