





Mr. Mahon was a tax accountant in Robert Lee for many years. He died at 5:30 a.m. Sunday in West Coke County Hospital where he had been a patient for five weeks.

He was born Oct. 3, 1892 in Amarillo and came to Robert Lee as a young man in 1918 with an oil well drilling crew from Burkburnett.


