



Steaks in Spotlight

Steaks for outdoor grilling will be featured at some supermarkets as the Labor Day weekend rolls around.

Question: How can you keep a steak from curling during cooking? Answer: Slash the fat edges of

Q: How often should a steak be

A: Once is all that necessary. Broil until brown on first side, turn it and continue cooking the other side. Use tongs to turn the steak without piercing it. Jabbing a steak with a fork causes an undue loss in juices.

Q: When should a steak be salted-before or after grilling?

A: Salt each side after grilling. This is important because the seasoning may draw the flavorful juices to the surface and slow the browning process.

Q: How can you tell when a steak

A: Cut a slit in the steak with a sharp knife. Cut near the bone, if there is one. Look at the color inside. If it's red, it's rare; pink is

meat be sliced across the grain? A: Meat should be carved against the grain to give uniform slices for attractive serving. Also, slicing across the grain, or fibers, makes the meat easier to eat.




